2	Barren County is the birthplace of two recipients of the Medal of Honor, Sergeant
3	William Day and Corporal Richard Bush.
4	WHEREAS, the Medal of Honor is the United States of America's highest military
5	honor, awarded for personal acts of valor above and beyond the call of duty; and
6	WHEREAS, there have been 3,468 Medals of Honor awarded to the nation's
7	soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines, and coastguardsmen since the decoration's creation in
8	1861, approximately 1,000 of which have been awarded since World War I; and
9	WHEREAS, dozens of Kentuckians have been awarded our nation's highest
10	military honor, with two sons of Barren County included in that roll; and
11	WHEREAS, First Sergeant William L. Day, serving with Company E, 5th United
12	States Cavalry during the Indian Campaign of 1872-73, was awarded the Medal of Honor
13	for "Gallant conduct during campaigns and engagements with Apaches"; and
14	WHEREAS, Marine Corporal Richard Earl Bush, a native of Glasgow, received the
15	Medal of Honor for his gallantry on Mount Yaetake on Okinawa, Ryukyu Islands, 16
16	April, 1945; and
17	WHEREAS, Corporal Bush's award citation recounts his selfless actions on that
18	day: "Rallying his men forward with indomitable determination, Cpl. Bush boldly defied
19	the slashing fury of concentrated Japanese artillery fire pouring down from the gun-
20	studded mountain fortress to lead his squad up the face of the rocky precipice, sweep over
21	the ridge, and drive the defending troops from their deeply entrenched position. With his
22	unit, the first to break through to the inner defense of Mount Yaetake, he fought
23	relentlessly in the forefront of the action until seriously wounded and evacuated with
24	others under protecting rocks. Although prostrate under medical treatment when a
25	Japanese hand grenade landed in the midst of the group, Cpl. Bush, alert and courageous
26	in extremity as in battle, unhesitatingly pulled the deadly missile to himself and absorbed
27	the shattering violence of the exploding charge in his body, thereby saving his fellow

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marines from severe injury or death despite the certain peril to his own life... His constant
concern for the welfare of his men, his resolute spirit of self-sacrifice, and his unwavering
devotion to duty throughout the bitter conflict enhance and sustain the highest traditions
of the United States Naval Service"; and

5 WHEREAS, it is fitting and proper that these two sons of Barren County be 6 remembered for their service and sacrifice to this great nation;

## 8 Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

9 →Section 1. Within 30 days of the effective date of this Resolution, the
10 Transportation Cabinet shall erect permanent signs on United States Route 68 entering
11 Barren County that denote Barren County as the birthplace of two recipients of the Medal
12 of Honor, Sergeant William L. Day, and Corporal Richard E. Bush.
