15	educational institution, establishment, agency, organization, or corporation that

18	(5) "Commercial motor vehicle" has the same meaning as in KRS 281A.010;
19	(6) "Commission" means the Kentucky Commission on Proprietary Education;
20	(7) "Formal complaint" means a written statement filed on a form specified by the
21	commission in which the complainant alleges that a school has violated a
22	Kentucky statute or administrative regulation and has negatively impacted the
23	complainant, and resolution is requested by the commission;
24	(8) "License" means authorization issued by the commission to operate or to
25	contract to operate a proprietary school in Kentucky as described in this chapter
26	and does not reflect accreditation, supervision, endorsement, or recommendation
27	by the commission;

1	(9) "Person" means an individual, corporation, business trust, estate, partnership,
2	unincorporated association, two (2) or more of any of the foregoing having a
3	joint or common interest, or any other legal or commercial entity;
4	(10) ''Proprietary school'' or ''school'' means a privately owned for-profit educational
5	institution, establishment, agency, organization, or person offering or
6	administering a plan, course, or program of instruction in business, trade,
7	technical, industrial, or related areas for which a fee or tuition is charged
8	whether conducted in person, by mail, or by any other method, and does not
9	include:
10	(a) A school or educational institution supported entirely or partly by taxation
11	from either a local or state source;
12	(b) A parochial, denominational, or eleemosynary school or institution;
13	(c) A training program which offers instruction for payment by participants
14	primarily in pursuit of a hobby, recreation, or entertainment, and does not
15	result in the granting of postsecondary credits nor lead to an industry-
16	recognized credential, academic certificate, or degree;
17	(d) A course or courses of instruction or study sponsored by an employer for
18	the training and preparation of its own employees for the benefit of the
19	employer and without charge to the employee; or
20	(e) A school or educational institution licensed or approved by or a course or
21	courses of study or instruction sponsored by the Kentucky Board of
22	Barbering established by KRS 317.430, the Kentucky Board of Hairdressers
23	and Cosmetologists established by KRS 317A.030, the Kentucky Board of
24	Nursing established by KRS 314.121, the Kentucky Board of Embalmers
25	and Funeral Directors established by KRS 316.170, or the Kentucky
26	Council on Postsecondary Education established by KRS 164.011;
27	(11) "Resident" means any person who has established Kentucky as his or her state of

1		domicile. Proof of residency shall include but not be limited to a deed or property
2		tax bill, utility agreement or utility bill, or rental housing agreement; and
3	<u>(12)</u>	"School year" is beginning the first day of July and ending the thirtieth day of
4		June next following, except when approval shall be suspended or canceled
5		pursuant to the provisions herein.
6		→ Section 2. KRS 165A.330 is amended to read as follows:
7	(1)	No person shall conduct, operate, maintain, or establish a proprietary school as
8		herein defined or use any words which designate or tend to designate to the public
9		that the operator of the school is qualified to conduct, operate, and maintain the
10		school, unless he holds a valid current license from the commission.
11	(2)	Completed applications for a license shall be filed with the commission thirty (30)
12		working days prior to being considered by the commission.
13	(3)	Renewal applications shall be filed <u>annually</u> with the commission <u>forty-five (45)</u>
14		days prior to the [by May 15, prior to the June 30] expiration date.
15	(4)	The school owner shall notify the commission if any personnel involved in the

24	(1)	The Kentucky Commission on Proprietary Education is hereby created as an
25		independent agency of the Commonwealth and shall be attached to the Education
26		and Workforce Development Cabinet for administrative purposes. The commission
27		shall be composed of the following members:

9		this chapter and to support adequate staffing of commission
10		responsibilities. The fee structure shall be based on the gross revenue of
11		licensed schools, number of students enrolled, and whether the school is
12		located within the state or outside the state; and
13		<u>5.[6.]</u> The method for calculating placement rates that are to be disclosed
14		pursuant to this subsection.
15		(b) The commission shall have the authority to promulgate other administrative
16		regulations, in cooperation with the Kentucky Department of Education and
17		the Council on Postsecondary Education, as it deems necessary for the proper
18		administration of this chapter.
19	(7)	The commission shall hold meetings at least four (4) times a year and as frequently
20		as it deems necessary at the times and places within this state as the commission
21		may designate. The majority of the members shall constitute a quorum, and all
22		meetings shall be conducted in accordance with the Open Meetings Act, KRS

24	(8)	The commission may sue and be sued in its own name.

The chairperson of the complaint committee shall not be employed by, 8 have ownership interest in, or be otherwise affiliated with a licensed institution. 9 School representatives appointed pursuant to subsection (1)(a) or (b) of this section 10 shall not constitute a majority of the committee's membership. A committee 11 member shall not vote on a matter in which a conflict of interest exists. The 12 committee shall review each formal complaint and, if evidence supports an alleged 13 violation of this chapter or any administrative regulation promulgated thereunder, 14 the committee shall:
- 15 (a) Authorize an investigative report;
- 16 (b) Participate in informal procedures to resolve complaints;

 performance information, relating to the requirements of subsection (6)(a) of this

- 26 → Section 4. KRS 165A.350 is amended to read as follows:
- 27 (1) No person shall solicit or perform the services of an agent in this state for a

proprietary school, located either within or without this state, unless the school shall
 have been issued by the commission a *license*[certificate of approval or a certificate
 of registration] pursuant to KRS 165A.310 to 165A.410 and the person shall have
 been issued an agent's permit for said proprietary school.

- 5 (2) No person shall be issued an agent's permit unless he is an individual of good moral
 6 character as determined by the commission.
- 7 (3) Except as otherwise provided, no person shall be issued an agent's permit unless he
 8 shall make application upon forms to be provided by the commission, and unless
 9 the application shall be accompanied by a fee as established by the commission and
 10 a good and sufficient surety bond or other collateral as required by the commission
 11 but not less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
- 12 (4)(a) The surety bond or other collateral shall be conditioned by the commission to 13 recover all necessary administrative costs, including but not limited to costs 14 for the acquisition, permanent filing, and maintenance of student records of 15 the proprietary school or to provide indemnification to any student or enrollee 16 or the student's or enrollee's parent or guardian suffering loss or damage as a 17 result of any fraud or misrepresentation used in procuring his enrollment in a 18 course or courses of instruction or study offered or maintained by the 19 proprietary school, or as a result of the student being unable to complete the 20 course or courses because the proprietary school ceased operations. The 21 amount of liability on the surety bond or other collateral shall cover each 22 agent each school year, as the term "school year" is defined in KRS 165A.310. 23 Regardless of the number of years that an agent's bond is in force, the 24 aggregate liability of the surety bond shall not exceed the penal sum of the 25 bond. The surety bond may be continuous.
- (b) Any claimant may file with the commission a duly verified claim against an
 agent. The commission shall consider complaints in a timely manner after ten

(10) days' written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the
licensee of the complaint giving time and place of hearing thereon and if the
claim is found to be correct and due to the claimant, and if the commission
cannot effect a settlement by persuasion and conciliation, the commission
shall make a demand upon the principal on the bond and the surety thereon,
and if not paid shall bring an action on the bond in any court of record within
the State of Kentucky.

- 8 (5) The surety bond may be of blanket form to cover more than one (1) agent for a
 9 proprietary school, but it shall provide the required minimum coverage for each
 10 agent.
- 11 (6) A surety on the bond may be released therefrom after the surety shall make a written
 12 notice thereof directed to the commission at least thirty (30) days prior to release.
- 13 (7) The surety bond shall cover the period of the agent's permit, except when a suretyshall be released in the manner provided herein.
- 15 (8) Notwithstanding the provisions of other sections, the commission may issue an 16 agent's permit to each person who is an owner of more than ten percent (10%) legal 17 interest in a proprietary school located in this state and who is a resident of this 18 state, and no owner shall be required to pay the agent's permit fee or execute an 19 agent's surety bond as otherwise required by this section, if the proprietary school 20 shall have been issued a <u>license</u>[certificate of approval] pursuant to the provisions 21 of KRS 165A.310 to 165A.410.
- (9) The commission may issue a conditional license on a monthly basis for up to a nine(9) month period of time.
- (10) An agent's permit shall be suspended by operation of law when the agent is no
 longer covered by a surety bond or other collateral is withdrawn as required by KRS
 165A.310 to 165A.410; but the commission shall cause the agent to receive at least
 ten (10) days' written notice prior to the release of his surety to the effect that the

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permit shall be suspended by operation of law until another surety bond or other collateral shall be filed in the same manner and like amount as required by the commission.

- 4 (11) An agent's permit shall be valid for a period of one (1) school year as herein
 5 defined, except when suspended or canceled pursuant to these provisions. An
 6 agent's permit may be renewed in the same manner and under the same conditions
 7 prescribed for the issuance of an initial agent's permit.
- 8 (12) The owner or owners of the proprietary school shall be held responsible for all
 9 actions of their agents when performing their duties as agents.

10 → Section 5. KRS 165A.360 is amended to read as follows:

11 (1)No person shall maintain or operate a proprietary school located and doing business 12 within this state until said school shall have been issued a license[certificate of 13 approval] by the commission pursuant to the provisions of KRS 165A.310 to 14 165A.410. No person shall maintain or operate a proprietary school located without 15 this state and do business within this state until said school shall have been issued a 16 *license*[certificate of approval or a certificate of registration] by the commission 17 pursuant to the provisions of KRS 165A.310 to 165A.410. No license[certificate of 18 approval] shall be issued by the commission to any proprietary school which denies 19 enrollment in said school to any pupil, on account of race, color, or creed. Such indemnification 13 shall, in no case, exceed the advanced tuition paid or to be paid by said 14 student or students or any such parent or guardian and regardless of the 15 number of years that a school's bond is in force, the aggregate liability of the 16 surety bond shall, in no event, exceed the penal sum of the bond. The surety 17 bond may be continuous.

18 (b) Any claimant may file with the commission a duly verified claim against a 19 proprietary school. The commission shall consider complaints in a timely 20 manner after ten (10) days' written notice by certified mail, return receipt 21 requested, to such school of said complaint giving time and place of hearing 22 thereon and, if such claim is found to be correct and due to the claimant and if 23 the commission cannot effect a settlement by persuasion and conciliation, the 24 commission shall make a demand upon the principal on such bond and the 25 surety thereon, and if not paid may bring an action on such bond in any court 26 of record within the State of Kentucky.

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A surety on said bond may be released therefrom after said surety shall have made a (4)

- 3 (5) The surety bond shall cover the period of the <u>license[certificate]</u> except when said
 4 surety shall be released in the manner as provided by this section.
- (6) 5 (a) The *license*[certificate] shall be suspended by operation of law when said 6 proprietary school is no longer covered by a surety bond or other collateral as 7 required by this section; but the commission shall cause said proprietary 8 school to receive at least ten (10) days' written notice prior to the release of 9 said surety to the effect that said approval shall be suspended by operation of 10 law until another surety bond shall be filed in the same manner and like 11 amount as required for the initial surety bond.
- 12 (b) The <u>license</u>[certificate] shall be suspended by operation of law at any time any
 13 certified proprietary school shall deny enrollment in said school to any pupil,
 14 on account of race, color, or creed.
- 15 (7) The application for a *license*[certificate] shall be accompanied by such supporting
 documents as the commission may require. The application and accompanying data
 shall be certified as true and correct in content and policy by the chief executive
 officer of said proprietary school.
- 19 (8) A <u>license[certificate]</u> shall be valid for a period of one (1) school year. A
 20 <u>license[certificate]</u> may be renewed in the same manner and under the conditions
 21 prescribed by the commission.
- (9) <u>Licenses</u>[Certificates] are transferable to another owner. If a change of ownership
 occurs, the new owner shall within ten (10) days, reexecute and affirm the
 application for <u>license</u>[certificate of approval or certificate of registration] and the
 information therein, governing said <u>license</u>[certificate] in effect at the time of sale.
 The commission may establish a reasonable fee for the recording and processing of
 such changes.

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- (10) The bonding or other collateral requirements herein set forth may be reduced at the sole discretion of the commission upon a showing by the proprietary school that they are excessive in the case of any particular proprietary school.
- 4 (11) (a) Contracts by and between a proprietary school operating or doing business
 5 within this state and a student are voidable at the option of the student unless
 6 said school has been previously issued a <u>license</u>[certificate] by the
 7 commission.
- 8 (b) No proprietary school operating or doing business within this state shall be 9 entitled to any money collected from students, in whatever manner collected, 10 unless said school has been previously issued a <u>license</u>[certificate] by the 11 commission.
- (c) Contracts by and between a proprietary school operating or doing business
 within this state which are entered into prior to the issuance of a *license*[certificate] by the commission, shall be voidable at the option of the
 student notwithstanding any subsequent issuance of a *license*[certificate] to
 the school by the commission.
- 17 (d) Restitution of any money paid by a student under a contract voided pursuant
 18 to this section, may be obtained through action brought by the student in either
 19 District Court or Circuit Court in the county of the student's residence or other
 20 appropriate court, at the option of the student.

(1) No proprietary school located or doing business in this state shall be issued a *license*[certificate] under these provisions until the commission has determined that
the proprietary school is maintained, operated, or, in the event of a new proprietary
school, that the school, after a physical inspection of the premises, can be
reasonably maintained and operated, in substantial compliance with the following
minimum standards:

1 (a) That the instructional quality and content of each course or program of 2 instruction or study shall be adequate to provide reasonable education and 3 training to each enrolled student, and that the quality and content shall be 4 consistent with the public interest; 5 (b) That the proprietary school has adequate space, equipment, instructional 6 materials, and instructor personnel to provide *the authorized* training[and 7 preparation of the quality specified in paragraph (a) of this subsection; 8 (c) That the educational and experience qualifications of directors, administrators, 9 supervisors, and instructors are satisfactory in terms of the quality of 10 instruction specified in paragraph (a) of this subsection; 11 That the administrators shall hold a baccalaureate degree from an accredited (d)12 college or university, or demonstrate the appropriate training or experience 13 related to the responsibilities of the position as determined by the commission; 14 That the instructors shall hold a baccalaureate degree from an accredited (e) 15 college or university in the area of teaching responsibility, or demonstrate 16 appropriate training or experience related to the responsibilities of the position 17 as determined by the commission]; 18 That a copy of the course outline and a schedule of all tuition, [and] fees, (b) = (f)19 tuition refund schedules, program completion rates, and program placement 20 rates of the school's graduates for the preceding twelve (12) months be 21 furnished each student applicant prior to enrollment; 22 That, as defined by commission regulation, a diploma, associate degree, <u>(c)[(g)]</u> 23 certificate, or other appellation shall be awarded to the student upon 24 satisfactory completion of training by the proprietary school which indicates 25 that the course or courses of instruction or study had been satisfactorily 26 completed; 27 That adequate records shall be maintained on all personnel, including <u>(d)</u>[(h)]

24	may call for any or all of the above information at any time;

26	which is untrue, deceptive, or misleading and shall be able to document all

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1		[(n) That the chief executive officer, directors, owners, administrators, supervisors,

3		(\underline{i}) [(Θ)] That the proprietary school adheres to a tuition refund schedule as
4		presented in published form prior to enrollment[if the student shall

The investigation, appraisal, and evaluation shall include 20 but are not limited to inspection of all records, books, and facilities at reasonable 21 times and places without prior notice.

(3) If the commission determines upon investigation, appraisal, and evaluation that a
proprietary school located within this state is maintained and operated, or, in the
event of a new proprietary school, that the school can be reasonably maintained and
operated, in compliance with the minimum standards prescribed by this section, the
commission shall issue a *license*[certificate] to the proprietary school.

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If the commission determines that any school is not maintained and operated, or

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1 cannot be reasonably maintained and operated, in compliance with the minimum 2 standards prescribed by this section and the minimum requirements determined by the commission, or is in violation of Kentucky statutes or administrative 3 4 regulations, the commission, after notice and an opportunity for a hearing to be 5 conducted in accordance with KRS Chapter 13B, may deny the issuance of a 6 *license*[certificate] or may establish conditions in conformity with these provisions 7 which shall be met by the school prior to issuance of a *license*[certificate]. The 8 commission may issue a conditional license for up to a nine (9) month period of 9 time.

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→ Section 7. KRS 165A.390 is amended to read as follows:

(1) An agent's permit may be revoked by the commission for fraud or misrepresentation
in procuring or soliciting a student or prospective student for enrollment in a course
or courses of instruction or study offered or maintained by a proprietary school
located within or without this state. An agent's permit may be revoked by the
commission for a false or misleading written or oral statement in the application
therefor submitted by the applicant with the intent to mislead or conceal the truth.
