3		→SECTION 1. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 344 IS CREATED TO
4	REA	AD AS FOLLOWS:
5	<u>The</u>	General Assembly finds and declares the following:
6	<u>(1)</u>	Leading legal scholars concur that conflicts between same-sex marriage and
7		religious liberty are real and should be addressed through legislation;
8	<u>(2)</u>	After the legalization of same-sex marriage, a religious educational institution in
9		Massachusetts was threatened by the government with loss of accreditation
10		because of its sincerely held religious beliefs about marriage;
11	<u>(3)</u>	Citizens of the state hold a wide range of reasonable views on the issue of same-
12		sex marriage, and maintaining the state's commitment to religious freedom when
13		faced with these good-faith differences of opinion is vital;
14	<u>(4)</u>	Our nation has a long and honorable history of respecting and accommodating
15		the religious freedom of its people, dating from before the American Revolution
16		to the present. Laws have protected the right of Quakers and other pacifists to
17		serve the nation as noncombatants in times of war, the right of Jews and other
18		Sabbath observers to dedicate their time to God and family instead of work on
19		their Sabbath, and the right of religious organizations to provide charitable
20		services to the public consistent with their beliefs, by hiring individuals who share
21		<u>the same beliefs;</u>
22	<u>(5)</u>	Protecting religious freedom from government intrusion is a state interest of the
23		highest order. This legislation advances this interest by remedying, deterring, and
24		preventing government interference with religious exercise in a way that
25		complements the protections mandated by the state and federal constitutions;
26	<u>(6)</u>	Protecting the religious freedom of faith-based charities and educational
27		institutions serves the state's compelling interest in providing essential social

1	services to the poor and educational opportunities to the next generation. This is
2	consistent with the state's long tradition of cooperating with religious
3	organizations when providing these critical services;
4	(7) Kentucky adopted the Religious Freedom Restoration Act in 2013, when it
5	enacted KRS 446.350 making clear that it is unlawful to substantially burden a
6	person's exercise of religion, even if the burden results from a facially neutral
7	rule of general applicability, unless that application of the burden to the person is
8	both in furtherance of a compelling governmental interest, and the least
9	restrictive means of furthering that compelling governmental interest;
10	(8) Laws and government actions that protect the free exercise of religious beliefs
11	and moral convictions about marriage and human sexuality encourage private
12	citizens and institutions to demonstrate tolerance for those beliefs and convictions
13	and therefore contribute to a more respectful, diverse, and peaceful society; and
14	(9) In a pluralistic society in which people of good faith hold more than one (1) view
15	of marriage, it is possible for the government to recognize same-sex marriage
16	without forcing persons with sincerely held religious beliefs or moral convictions
17	<u>to conform.</u>
18	→ SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 344 IS CREATED TO

16	<u>(g)</u>	Refuse to hire or promote, force to resign, fire, demote, sanction, discipline,
17		materially alter the terms or conditions of employment, retaliate, or take
18		<u>other adverse employment action against a person employed or</u>
19		<u>commissioned by state government;</u>
20	<u>(3) ''R</u>	eligious organization'' means:
21	<u>(a)</u>	A house of worship, including but not limited to churches, synagogues,
22		shrines, mosques, and temples;
23	<u>(b)</u>	A religious group, corporation, association, school or educational
24		institution, ministry, order, society, or similar entity, regardless of whether it
25		is integrated or affiliated with a church or other house of worship; or
26	<u>(c)</u>	An officer, owner, employee, manager, religious leader, clergy, or minister
27		of an entity or organization described in this subsection;

1	(4) ''State benefit program'' means any program administered or funded by the state,
2	or by an agent on behalf of the state, providing cash payments, grants, contracts,
3	loans, or in-kind assistance; and
4	(5) "State government" means:
5	(a) The state or a political subdivision of the state;
6	(b) Any agency of the state or of a political subdivision of the state including a
7	department, bureau, board, commission, council, court, or public institution
8	of higher education;
9	(c) Any person acting under the color of state law;
10	(d) Any private person suing under or attempting to enforce a law, rule, or
11	regulation adopted by a government entity described in paragraph (a), (b),
12	or (e) of this subsection; or
13	(e) Any city, county, urban-county government, charter county government,
14	unified local government, consolidated local government, special district, or
15	any combination thereof of the Commonwealth.
16	→SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 344 IS CREATED TO

18	The sincerely held religious beliefs or moral convictions protected by Sections 1 to 6 of
19	this Act are the belief or convictions:
20	(1) Regarding the sex of the two (2) individuals who may enter into a marriage; and
21	(2) That male and man or female and woman refer to an individual's immutable
22	biological sex as objectively determined by anatomy and genetics by or at the time
23	<u>of birth.</u>
24	→SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 344 IS CREATED TO

26	(1) State government shall not take any discriminatory action against a religious
27	organization wholly or partially on the basis that the organization:

10	religious belief or moral conviction described in Section 3 of this Act; or
11	(c) Makes any decision concerning the sale, rental, occupancy of, or terms and
12	conditions of occupying a dwelling or other housing under its control, based
13	upon or in a manner consistent with a sincerely held religious belief or
14	moral conviction described in Section 3 of this Act.
15	(2) State government shall consider accredited, licensed, or certified any religious
16	organization that would otherwise be accredited, licensed, or certified,
17	respectively, for any purposes under state law but for a determination against
18	such religious organization wholly or partially on the basis that the religious
19	organization believes, speaks, or acts in accordance with a sincerely held
20	religious belief or moral conviction described in Section 3 of this Act.
21	→SECTION 5. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 344 IS CREATED TO
22	READ AS FOLLOWS:
23	(1) A religious organization may assert a violation of Sections 1 to 6 of this Act as a
24	<u>claim against state government in any judicial or administrative proceeding or as</u>
25	a defense in any judicial or administrative proceeding without regard to whether
26	the proceeding is brought by or in the name of state government, private person,
27	or any other party.

1	(2)	Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an action under Sections 1 to 6 of
2		this Act may be commenced, and relief may be granted, in a court of the state
3		without regard to whether the person commencing the action has sought or
4		exhausted available administrative remedies.
5	<u>(3)</u>	Any religious organization who successfully asserts a claim or defense under
6		Sections 1 to 6 of this Act may recover:
7		(a) Declaratory relief;
8		(b) Injunctive relief to prevent or remedy a violation of Sections 1 to 6 of this

10		(c) Compensatory damages for pecuniary and nonpecuniary losses;

20	<u>(5)</u>	Sovereign, governmental, and qualified immunities to suit and from liability are
21		waived and abolished to the extent of liability created by this section, and a
22		person may sue state government, except state courts, for damages allowed by this
23		section.
24	<u>(6)</u>	Notwithstanding subsection (5) of this section, Sections 1 to 6 of this Act do not
25		waive or abolish sovereign immunity to suit and from liability under the Eleventh
26		Amendment to the United States Constitution.
