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A RESOLUTION urging drug crime diversion programs.

WHEREAS, the United States has five percent of the world's population, yet our
state and federal prisoners make up 25 percent of the world's prisoners; and

WHEREAS, Kentucky ranks tenth among U.S. states in drug offense imprisonment
rates, but ranks 26th in population; and

6 WHEREAS, state incarceration rates for drug offenses have no statistically
7 significant relationship to rates of illicit drug use, drug overdose deaths, or drug arrests,
8 according to a study of public data by the PEW Charitable Trust; and

9 WHEREAS, the number of Kentuckians charged for felony drug offenses has 10 increased 22 percent over the past five years, and misdemeanor drug charges have 11 increased by 25 percent over that same period, according to the Administrative Office of 12 the Courts; and

WHEREAS, the Bureau of Justice Statistics estimates that half of state and federal
prisoners meet Diagnostic and Statistical Manual for Mental Disorders criteria for drug
abuse or dependence; and

WHEREAS, some public policy experts estimate that every dollar spent on drug
treatment returns seven dollars to the public coffers; and

WHEREAS, drug court participation through diversion agreements, deferred prosecutions, or conditional discharges of probation periods provided treatment and case management to almost 8000 of Kentuckians from the initial pilot programs in 1996 to the 113 counties offering drug court as of the 2016 fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, a growing number of public policy voices are speaking out for prearrest diversion to treatment, such as Law Enforcement Leaders to Reduce Crime and Incarceration and the Police, Treatment, and Community Collaborative;

- 26 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the
- 27 Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 1. The members of the House of Representatives applaud the outreach efforts of prosecutors, defense attorneys, courts, pretrial specialists, corrections professionals, and treatment providers to provide help to criminal defendants with substance use disorders. The members of the House of Representatives encourage all involved entities to greatly expand those efforts in the interest of public health and effective management of limited resources.

7 → Section 2. The members of the House of Representatives encourage local police
8 departments to consider diverting nonviolent offenders with substance use disorders away
9 from the criminal justice system and into community-based interventions.

Section 3. The Clerk of the House of Representatives is directed to transmit a
copy of this Resolution to the secretary of the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet, the
secretary of the Cabinet for Health and Family Services, the Kentucky Attorney General,
the Kentucky County Attorneys Association, the Kentucky Commonwealth Attorneys
Association, and the Kentucky Fraternal Order of Police.
