1	AN ACT relating to wagering and making an appropriation therefor.
2	Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
3	→SECTION 1. KRS CHAPTER 239 IS ESTABLISHED AND A NEW
4	SECTION THEREOF IS CREATED TO READ AS FOLLOWS:
5	As used in this chapter unless the context requires otherwise:
6	(1) "Adjusted gross revenue" means the total sum of entry fees collected by a fantasy
7	contest operator from all participants entering a fantasy contest, less winnings
8	paid to participants in the contest, multiplied by the resident percentage;
9	(2) "Beginner" means a fantasy sports contest player who has entered fewer than
10	fifty-one (51) contests offered by a single fantasy sports contest operator and who
11	does not otherwise meet the definition of highly experienced player;
12	(3) "Cabinet" means the Public Protection Cabinet;
13	(4) "Confidential information" means information related to the play of a fantasy
14	contest by fantasy contest participants obtained as a result of or by virtue of a
15	person's employment;
16	(5) "Entry fee" means the cash or cash equivalent that is required to be paid by a
17	fantasy contest participant to a fantasy contest operator in order to participate in
18	<u>a fantasy contest;</u>
19	(6) "Fantasy contest" means any fantasy or simulated game or contest that meets the
20	following conditions:
21	(a) The values of all prizes and awards offered to winning participants are
22	made known to the participants in advance of the contest;
23	(b) All winning outcomes reflect the relative knowledge and skill of the
24	participants and shall be determined predominantly by accumulated
25	statistical results of the performance of individuals, including athletes in the
26	case of sports events; and
27	(c) No winning outcome is based on:

1	<u>1.</u> Randomized or historical events;
2	2. The score, point spread, or any performance or performances of any
3	single actual team or combination of such teams; or
4	3. Solely on any single performance of an individual athlete or
5	participant in any single actual event;
6	(7) ''Fantasy contest operator'' or ''operator'' means a person who offers or
7	administers one (1) or more fantasy contests with an entry fee to the general
8	public, and awards a prize of value;
9	(8) "Fantasy contest participant" or "participant" means a person who participates
10	in a fantasy contest offered by a registrant;
11	(9) ''Highly experienced player'' means a person who has either:
12	(a) Entered more than one thousand (1,000) fantasy contests offered by a single
13	fantasy sports contest operator; or
14	(b) Won more than three (3) fantasy sports contest prizes valued at one
15	thousand dollars (\$1,000) or more from a single fantasy sports contest
16	operator. Upon making a determination that a player is a highly
17	experienced player, the fantasy sports contest operator shall continue to
18	classify the player as a highly experienced player indefinitely;
19	(10) "Immediate family" means a person's parents, grandparents, spouse, siblings,
20	children, or grandchildren residing in a home occupied by the person as a
21	primary residence;
22	(11) "Location percentage" means for each fantasy contest, the percentage, rounded
23	to the nearest tenth of a percent (0.1%) , of the total entry fees collected from
24	participants located in the Commonwealth divided by the total entry fees collected
25	from all participants in the fantasy contest;
26	(12) "Person" has the same meaning as in KRS 446.010;
27	(13) "Principal stockholder" means any person who, individually or together with his

1	or her spouse and immediate family members, beneficially owns or controls,
2	directly or indirectly, fifteen percent (15%) or more of the equity ownership of a
3	registrant or who, together with his or her spouse and immediate family
4	members, has the power to vote or cause the vote of fifteen percent (15%) or more
5	<u>of a registrant;</u>
6	(14) "Registered fantasy contest operator" or "registrant" means a fantasy contest
7	operator that has been issued a valid registration by the cabinet;
8	(15) "Script" means automating a manual act using a coding language online,
9	whereby a list of multiple commands may be executed without the user's
10	interaction;
11	(16) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Public Protection Cabinet; and
12	(17) "Wager" means a sum of money or representation of value that is risked on an
13	occurrence for which the outcome is uncertain.
14	→SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
15	READ AS FOLLOWS:
16	(1) No fantasy contest operator shall offer a fantasy contest to residents of the
17	Commonwealth without a valid registration issued by the cabinet, except that
18	fantasy contest operators with fewer than one hundred (100) participants located
19	in the Commonwealth in a calendar year shall be exempt from this requirement.
20	(2) Any person seeking to be registered as a fantasy contest operator shall submit an
21	application to the cabinet on a form prescribed by the cabinet as promulgated in
22	an administrative regulation, accompanied by payment of the required fee
23	established in subsection (4) of this section.
24	(3) The applicant shall provide the following information to the cabinet as a
25	prerequisite for registration:
26	(a) The name of the applicant;
27	(b) The location of the applicant's principal place of business;

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1	(c) A disclosure of ownership of the applicant including all directors, officers,
2	and principal stockholders;
3	(d) A designation of the responsible party who is the agent for the contest
4	operator for all communications with the cabinet;
5	(e) 1. The criminal record of all officers, general partners, and principal
6	stockholders of the applicant.
7	2. An applicant may not be eligible for registration or renewal as a
8	fantasy contest operator if the applicant or any of its officers, general
9	partners, or principal stockholders has been convicted of or has
10	entered a plea of nolo contendere or guilty to a felony; and
11	(f) Any other documentation the cabinet may require.
12	(4) (a) The initial registration fee for a fantasy contest operator shall be five
13	thousand dollars (\$5,000).
14	(b) The annual renewal fee for a fantasy contest operator shall be an amount
15	equal to the greater of:
16	1. Six percent (6%) of the adjusted gross revenues for the prior calendar
17	<u>year: or</u>
18	2. Five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
19	(c) The initial registration fee and the annual renewal fee shall be deposited
20	into the wagering administration fund established in Section 4 of this Act.
21	→SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
22	READ AS FOLLOWS:
23	(1) (a) The cabinet shall promulgate administrative regulations for the operation
24	of fantasy contests as necessary to enforce the provisions of this chapter, but the
25	cabinet shall not promulgate administrative regulations limiting or regulating:
26	1. Rules or the administration of an individual contest or contests;
27	2. The statistical makeup of a contest or contests; or

1	3. The digital platform of an operator.
2	(b) The cabinet shall promulgate the administrative regulations listing the
3	requirements for registration within thirty (30) days of the effective date of
4	this Act.
5	(2) The cabinet shall consider all applications for registration and shall issue a valid
6	registration to an applicant that meets the criteria set forth in Section 2 of this
7	Act and any administrative regulations promulgated by the cabinet.
8	(3) (a) The cabinet shall have thirty (30) days after receiving an initial application
9	to issue a registration or deny the application.
10	(b) The cabinet shall prepare and issue a written statement setting forth the
11	reasons why an application for registration has been denied.
12	(4) All fantasy contest operators who meet the requirements for registration shall be
13	registered by January 15, 2020.
14	(5) The cabinet may revoke, deny, or suspend the registration of a fantasy contest
15	operator if it finds that:
16	(a) Any partner, member, officer, principal stockholder, or director of the
17	operator has been convicted of a felony in this state, a felony in another
18	state which would be a felony if committed in this state, or a felony under
19	the laws of the United States. For purposes of this paragraph, the term
20	"convicted" means having been found guilty, regardless of adjudication of
21	<u>guilt, as a result of a jury verdict, nonjury trial, or entry of a plea of guilty</u>
22	<u>or nolo contendere; or</u>
23	(b) Any fantasy contest operator has:
24	1. Violated any order of the secretary or any of the provisions set forth in
25	this chapter;
26	2. Failed to meet the requirements for licensure under this chapter; or
27	3. Used fraud, misrepresentation, or deceit in applying for or attempting

1		to apply for a registration or otherwise in operating or offering to
2		operate a fantasy contest.
3	<u>(6)</u>	If it appears to the secretary, based upon credible evidence presented in a written
4		complaint, that a person is operating or offering to operate a fantasy contest
5		without being registered, the secretary may issue an order to cease and desist the
6		activity.
7	<u>(7)</u>	The secretary shall set forth in the order:
8		(a) The statutes and administrative regulations alleged to have been violated;
9		(b) The facts alleged to have constituted the violation; and
10		(c) The requirement that all unauthorized practices immediately cease.
11	<u>(8)</u>	(a) Within ten (10) days after service of the order to cease and desist, the person
12		may request a hearing on the question of whether acts or practices in
13		violation of this section have occurred. The hearing shall be conducted
14		pursuant to KRS Chapter 13B.
15		(b) The person may appeal the final order of the cabinet to the Franklin Circuit
16		Court within thirty (30) days of the hearing.
17	<u>(9)</u>	To ensure that the cabinet is not spending more than what is necessary to cover
18		administrative expenses, on June 30 of each year, the cabinet shall submit to the
19		Legislative Research Commission and the Interim Joint Committee on Licensing,
20		Occupations, and Administrative Regulations a written report detailing financial
21		transactions, including:
22		(a) The number of applications received;
23		(b) The number of applications approved;
24		(c) The number of applications denied;
25		(d) The amount of funds received from initial registration fees;
26		(e) The amount of funds received from annual renewal fees; and
27		(f) The amount of funds expended to enforce this chapter.

1	(10) KRS Chapters 230 and 528 shall not apply to fantasy contests operated in
2	accordance with this chapter.
3	→SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
4	READ AS FOLLOWS:
5	(1) (a) There is hereby established in the State Treasury a restricted account to be
6	known as the wagering administration fund. The fund shall consist of
7	moneys received from the money collected under Sections 2, 15, 19, and 42
8	of this Act and state appropriations.
9	(b) 1. Amounts deposited in the fund shall be used for administrative
10	expenses of the cabinet and shall be disbursed by the Finance and
11	Administration Cabinet upon the warrant of the Public Protection
12	<u>Cabinet.</u>
13	2. The remaining funds shall be used as follows:
14	a. Five percent (5%) of the funds remaining after the expenses
15	under subparagraph 1. of this paragraph shall be deposited in
16	the Kentucky problem gambling assistance fund established in
17	Section 5 of this Act; and
18	b. All remaining funds not allocated under subparagraph 1. of this
19	paragraph or subdivision a. of subparagraph 2. of this
20	paragraph shall be deposited in the Kentucky permanent pension
21	fund established in KRS 42.205.
22	3. Any interest accruing to the fund shall become a part of the fund and
23	shall not lapse.
24	(2) Notwithstanding KRS 45.229, fund amounts not expended at the close of a fiscal
25	year shall not lapse but shall be carried forward into the next fiscal year.
26	(3) Moneys deposited in the fund are hereby appropriated for the purposes set forth
27	in this section and shall not be appropriated or transferred by the General

1	Assembly for any other purposes.
2	→SECTION 5. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
3	READ AS FOLLOWS:
4	(1) (a) There is established in the State Treasury a revolving account to be known
5	as the Kentucky problem gambling assistance account.
6	(b) The account shall be administered by the director of the Division of
7	<u>Behavioral Health of the Department for Behavioral Health,</u>
8	Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities, and shall consist of moneys
9	distributed to it under Section 4 of this Act.
10	(c) Notwithstanding KRS 45.229, moneys remaining in the account at the close
11	of a fiscal year shall not lapse but shall carry forward into the succeeding
12	fiscal year. Interest earned on any moneys in the account shall accrue to the
13	account.
14	(d) Except for administrative expenses of the Division of Behavioral Health
15	relating to the account, which shall be limited to fifty thousand dollars
16	(\$50,000) per year, all moneys in the account are appropriated for, and
17	shall be used exclusively for the purposes of:
18	1. Providing support to agencies, groups, organizations, and persons that
19	provide education, assistance, and counseling to persons and families
20	experiencing difficulty as a result of addiction to alcohol or drugs, or
21	addictive or compulsive gambling;
22	2. Promoting public awareness of, and providing education about
23	addictions;
24	3. Establishing and funding programs to certify addiction counselors;
25	4. Promoting public awareness of assistance programs for addicts; and
26	5. Paying the costs and expenses associated with the treatment of
27	addictions.

1	(2)	The cabinet shall promulgate administrative regulations to establish criteria for
2		the expenditure of funds from the Kentucky addiction assistance account. The
3		administrative regulations shall:
4		(a) Establish standards for the types of agencies, groups, organizations, and
5		persons eligible to receive funding;
6		(b) Establish standards for the types of activities eligible for funding;
7		(c) Establish standards for the appropriate documentation of past performance
8		and the activities of agencies, groups, organizations, and persons requesting
9		<u>funding;</u>
10		(d) Establish standards for the development of performance measures or other
11		evidence of successful expenditure of awarded funds;
12		(e) Set forth procedures for the submission, evaluation, and review of
13		applications for funding;
14		(f) Set forth procedures for making funding awards to requesting entities who
15		have demonstrated the capability to efficiently and effectively provide the
16		necessary services;
17		(g) Establish requirements and procedures for the monitoring of funds
18		awarded, including requirements for the submission of reports and
19		documentation supporting expenditures; and
20		(h) Include any other provisions related to funding or the administration of the
21		account as determined by the cabinet.
22	<u>(3)</u>	On or before October 1, 2020, and every October 1 thereafter, the director of the
23		Division of Behavioral Health, in cooperation with the commissioner of the
24		Department for Behavioral Health, Developmental and Intellectual Disabilities
25		and the secretary, shall submit an annual report detailing activities and
26		expenditures associated with the Kentucky problem gambling assistance account
27		for the preceding fiscal year. The annual report shall be submitted to:

1	(a) The Legislative Research Commission; and
2	(b) The Governor.
3	→ SECTION 6. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
4	READ AS FOLLOWS:
5	(1) (a) A registrant offering fantasy contests shall annually submit its records to a
6	<u>certified public accountant to perform an annual independent audit</u>
7	consistent with the standards of the American Institute of Certified Public
8	Accountants to ensure compliance with all of the requirements in this
9	<u>chapter.</u>
10	(b) The registrant shall pay all costs of the audit. The audit shall cover one (1)
11	<u>fiscal year.</u>
12	(2) (a) Each registrant shall keep daily records of its operations and shall maintain
13	the records for at least six (6) years.
14	(b) The records shall sufficiently detail all financial transactions to determine
15	compliance with the requirements of this chapter and shall be available for
16	audit and inspection by the cabinet during the registrant's regular business
17	hours.
18	→SECTION 7. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 239 IS CREATED TO
19	READ AS FOLLOWS:
20	(1) A registrant shall implement commercially reasonable procedures for the conduct
21	of fantasy contests requiring an entry fee that are intended to:
22	(a) Prevent the registrant, its employees, and the immediate family of employees
23	from competing in any public fantasy contest with a cash prize offered by
24	any fantasy contest operator;
25	(b) Prevent sharing of confidential information with third parties that could
26	affect fantasy contest play until that information is made publicly available;
27	(c) Verify that each fantasy contest participant in each fantasy contest is

1	eighteen (18) years of age or older;
2	(d) Prevent an individual who is a participant or game official in an actual
3	sporting event or competition from participating in any fantasy contest that
4	is determined in whole or in part on the performance of that individual, the
5	individual's actual team, or the accumulated statistical results of the
6	sporting event or competition in which the individual is a participant or
7	<u>contest official;</u>
8	(e) Allow an individual, upon request, to exclude himself or herself from
9	entering a fantasy contest upon request and provide reasonable steps to
10	prevent that person from entering the fantasy contests offered by the fantasy
11	<u>contest operator;</u>
12	(f) Disclose the number of entries that a participant may submit to each
13	fantasy contest;
14	(g) Provide reasonable steps to prevent participants from submitting more than
15	the allowable number of entries;
16	(h) 1. In any contest involving more than one hundred (100) entries, prevent
17	a participant from submitting more than the lesser of:
18	a. Three percent (3%) or more of all entries; or
19	b. One hundred fifty (150) entries.
20	2. Notwithstanding subparagraph 1. of this paragraph, a registrant may
21	establish contests in which there are no restrictions on the number of
22	<u>entries if:</u>
23	a. The registrant clearly discloses that there are no limits on the
24	number of entries by each participant in the contest; and
25	b. That the entry fee is fifty dollars (\$50) or more per entry;
26	(i) Segregate participants' funds from operational funds or maintain a reserve
27	in the form of cash, cash equivalents, payment processor reserves, payment

1		processor receivables, an irrevocable letter of credit, a bond, an escrow
2		account approved by the cabinet, or a combination thereof, in the amount of
3		the deposits in participants' accounts for benefit and protection of the funds
4		held in those accounts;
5		(j) Distinguish highly experienced participants and beginner participants and
6		ensure that highly experienced participants are conspicuously identified to
7		all participants;
8		(k) Prohibit the use of external scripts in fantasy contests that give a participant
9		an unfair advantage over other participants and make all authorized scripts
10		readily available to all fantasy contest participants;
11		(1) Clearly and conspicuously disclose all rules that govern its contests,
12		including the material terms of each promotional offer at the time the offer
13		is advertised; and
14		(m) Use technologically reasonable measures to limit each fantasy contest
15		participant to one (1) active account with that operator.
16	<u>(2)</u>	A registrant shall not conduct, operate, or offer a fantasy contest that:
17		(a) Utilizes:
18		1. Video or mechanical reels or symbols or any other depictions of slot
19		machines, poker, blackjack, craps, or roulette; or
20		2. Any device that qualifies as or replicates contest activities that
21		constitute gaming; or
22		(b) Includes a university, college, high school, or youth athletic contest or
23		<u>event.</u>
24	<u>(3)</u>	Officers and directors of registrants along with their immediate family are
25		prohibited from competing in any fantasy contest offered by any fantasy contest
26		operator in which the operator offers a cash prize.
27	<u>(4)</u>	(a) Any person who knowingly violates any provision of this chapter shall:

1		1. For the first offense, be liable for a civil penalty of not less than one
2		thousand dollars (\$1,000) nor more than five thousand dollars
3		(\$5,000) for each act or omission that constitutes a violation; or
4		2. a. For a second or subsequent offense, be liable for a civil penalty
5		of not less than five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and not more than
6		twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000); or
7		b. Revocation of registration at the discretion of the secretary.
8		(b) A civil penalty assessed under this subsection shall accrue to the
9		Commonwealth and may be recovered in a civil action brought by the
10		<u>cabinet.</u>
11		(c) Nothing in this chapter shall deprive an aggrieved participant of any
12		personal right of redress.
13		Section 8. KRS 230.210 is amended to read as follows:
14	As u	sed in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:
15	(1)	"Advance deposit account wagering" means a form of [pari-mutuel] wagering in
16		which an individual may establish an account with a person or entity licensed by the
17		racing commission, and may place a pari-mutuel or sports wager through that
18		account that is permitted by law;
19	(2)	"Advance deposit account wagering licensee" means a person or entity licensed by
20		the racing commission to conduct advance deposit account wagering and accept
21		deposits and wagers, issue a receipt or other confirmation to the account holder
22		evidencing such deposits and wagers, and transfer credits and debits to and from
23		accounts;
24	(3)	"Appaloosa race" or "Appaloosa racing" means that form of horse racing in which
25		each horse participating in the race is registered with the Appaloosa Horse Club of
26		Moscow, Idaho, and is mounted by a jockey;
27	(4)	"Arabian" means a horse that is registered with the Arabian Horse Registry of

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1		Denver, Colorado;
2	(5)	"Association" means any person licensed by the Kentucky Horse Racing
3		Commission under KRS 230.300 and engaged in the conduct of a recognized horse
4		race meeting;
5	(6)	"Harness race" or "harness racing" means trotting and pacing races of the
6		standardbred horses;
7	(7)	"Horse race meeting" means horse racing run at an association licensed and
8		regulated by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission, and may include
9		Thoroughbred, harness, Appaloosa, Arabian, paint, and quarter horse racing;
10	(8)	"Host track" means the track conducting racing and offering its racing for intertrack
11		wagering, or, in the case of interstate wagering, means the Kentucky track
12		conducting racing and offering simulcasts of races conducted in other states or
13		foreign countries;
14	(9)	"Intertrack wagering" means pari-mutuel wagering on simulcast horse races from a
15		host track by patrons at a receiving track;
16	(10)	"Interstate wagering" means pari-mutuel wagering on simulcast horse races from a
17		track located in another state or foreign country by patrons at a receiving track or
18		simulcast facility;
19	(11)	"Kentucky quarter horse, paint horse, Appaloosa, and Arabian purse fund" means a
20		purse fund established to receive funds as specified in KRS 230.3771 for purse
21		programs established in KRS 230.446 to supplement purses for quarter horse, paint
22		horse, Appaloosa, and Arabian horse races. The purse program shall be
23		administered by the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission;
24	(12)	"Kentucky resident" means:
25		(a) An individual domiciled within this state;
26		(b) An individual who maintains a place of abode in this state and spends, in the

27 aggregate, more than one hundred eighty-three (183) days of the calendar year

1			in this state; or
2		(c)	An individual who lists a Kentucky address as his or her principal place of
3			residence when applying for an account to participate in advance deposit
4			account wagering;
5	(13)	"Pair	nt horse" means a horse registered with the American Paint Horse Association
6		of Fo	ort Worth, Texas;
7	(14)	"Prir	ncipal" means any of the following individuals associated with a partnership,
8		trust	, association, limited liability company, or corporation that is licensed to
9		cond	luct a horse race meeting or an applicant for a license to conduct a horse race
10		meet	ting:
11		(a)	The chairman and all members of the board of directors of a corporation;
12		(b)	All partners of a partnership and all participating members of a limited
13			liability company;
14		(c)	All trustees and trust beneficiaries of an association;
15		(d)	The president or chief executive officer and all other officers, managers, and
16			employees who have policy-making or fiduciary responsibility within the
17			organization;
18		(e)	All stockholders or other individuals who own, hold, or control, either directly
19			or indirectly, five percent (5%) or more of stock or financial interest in the
20			collective organization; and
21		(f)	Any other employee, agent, guardian, personal representative, or lender or
22			holder of indebtedness who has the power to exercise a significant influence
23			over the applicant's or licensee's operation;
24	(15)	''Pro	ofessional sports venue" means a facility, including but not limited to an
25		<u>indo</u>	or arena, outdoor stadium, or race track where professional sporting events
26		are	held under the auspices of a professional league recognized by the racing
27		<u>com</u>	mission under Section 10 of this Act;

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- (16) "Quarter horse" means a horse that is registered with the American Quarter Horse
 Association of Amarillo, Texas;
- 3 (17)[(16)] "Racing commission" means the Kentucky Horse Racing Commission;

(18)[(17)] "Receiving track" means a track where simulcasts are displayed for wagering 4 5 purposes. A track that submits an application for intertrack wagering shall meet all 6 the regulatory criteria for granting an association license of the same breed as the 7 host track, and shall have a heated and air-conditioned facility that meets all state 8 and local life safety code requirements and seats a number of patrons at least equal 9 to the average daily attendance for intertrack wagering on the requested breed in the 10 county in which the track is located during the immediately preceding calendar year; 11 (19)[(18)] "Simulcast facility" means any facility approved pursuant to the provisions of 12 KRS 230.380 to simulcast racing and conduct pari-mutuel wagering;

- 13 (20)[(19)] "Simulcasting" means the telecast of live audio and visual signals of horse
 14 races for the purpose of pari-mutuel wagering;
- 15 (21)[(20)] "Sports wagering" means the placing of wagers on the outcomes of
- 16 professional sports contests and other events as authorized by the racing

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- commission at tracks and through advanced deposit wagering as authorized by
- 18 *this chapter and Section 19 of this Act;*
- 19 (22) "Telephone account wagering" means a form of pari-mutuel wagering where an
 20 individual may deposit money in an account at a track and may place a wager by
 21 direct telephone call or by communication through other electronic media owned by
 22 the holder of the account to the track;
- (23)[(21)] "Thoroughbred race" or "Thoroughbred racing" means a form of horse racing
 in which each horse participating in the race is a Thoroughbred, (i.e., meeting the
 requirements of and registered with The Jockey Club of New York) and is mounted
 by a jockey; and
- 27 (24)[(22)] "Track" means any association duly licensed by the Kentucky Horse Racing

1	Commission to conduct horse racing. "Track" shall include any facility or real
2	property that is owned, leased, or purchased by a track within the same geographic
3	area within a sixty (60) mile radius of a track but not contiguous to track premises,
4	upon racing commission approval, and provided the noncontiguous property is not

- 14 (2) The board shall adopt rules to establish a system of verifying the validity of tickets

However, a holder of a 11 pull-tab lottery ticket shall claim a prize within the time period and in the 12 manner printed on the ticket. If a valid claim is not made for a prize within the 13 applicable period, the prize shall constitute an unclaimed prize for purposes of 14 subsection (3) of this section.

(f) No prize shall be paid upon a *lottery* ticket purchased or sold in violation of
this chapter. Any such prize shall constitute an unclaimed prize for purposes
of subsection (3) of this section.

(3) Any unclaimed <u>lottery</u> prize money may be retained by the corporation and added to
the pool from which future prizes are to be awarded or used for special prize
promotions, or may be appropriated by the General Assembly directly from the
corporation for any public purpose. For fiscal years 2000-2001 and 2001-2002, any
unclaimed <u>lottery</u> prize money in excess of six million dollars (\$6,000,000) shall be
transferred to the affordable housing trust fund established by KRS 198A.710.

24 (4) The corporation is discharged of all liability upon payment of a prize.

25 (5) No *lottery* ticket shall be purchased by and no *lottery or online poker* prize shall be
26 paid to any of the following persons:

(a) Any member of the board of directors, officers, or employees of the

The Circuit 12 Court shall issue an order approving a voluntary assignment, specifying the exact 13 dollar amount of each prize payment or payments assigned, or any portion thereof, 14 the dates of the payments being assigned, the name of the assignor as it appears on 15 the lottery claim form or the full legal name of the assignor if different than the 16 name as it appears on the lottery claim form, and the full legal name of the assignee 17 to whom the assigned payments will be made, and directing the corporation to make 18 the specified payments to the assignee, if all of the following conditions have been 19 met:

- A court order approving a voluntary assignment under subsection (6) of this section,

 referred to in this subsection as the "Service," of a revenue ruling or other
 public ruling of the Service, which rules that, based upon the right of
 assignment provided in subsection (6) of this section, Kentucky lottery
 prizewinners who do not assign any prize payments would be subject to an
 immediate income tax liability for the value of the entire prize rather than
 annual income tax liability for each installment when paid; or

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→ Section 39. KRS 154A.120 is amended to read as follows:

2 (1)The corporation shall conduct all procurements in accordance with procedures 3 which are not inconsistent with the provisions of KRS Chapter 45A, and this 4 chapter, this chapter being deemed to control in the event that, and to the extent 5 that, any provision in this chapter is expressly inconsistent with any provision of 6 KRS Chapter 45A; or the corporation shall adopt administrative regulations 7 establishing its procurement procedures. If the corporation elects to promulgate 8 administrative regulations establishing its procurement procedures rather than 9 conduct procurements in accordance with the provisions of KRS Chapter 45A, the 10 corporation may include sections of KRS Chapter 45A as part of its administrative 11 regulations. However, major lottery-specific or online poker-specific procurements 12 for personal service contracts shall not be subject to the requirements of KRS 13 45A.695(2)(b), due to the unique operational activities conducted for state 14 government by the corporation as recognized in KRS 154A.020. The corporation's 15 procurement procedures or administrative regulations shall be designed to provide 16 for the purchase of supplies, equipment, services, and construction items that 17 provide the greatest long term benefit to the state, the greatest integrity for the 18 corporation, and the best service and products, for the public.

19 (2) In its bidding and negotiation processes, the corporation may do its own bidding
20 and procurement, or may utilize the services of the Finance and Administration
21 Cabinet, or a combination thereof. The president of the corporation may, in lieu of
22 the secretary of finance, declare an emergency for purchasing purposes.

→ Section 40. KRS 154A.130 is amended to read as follows:

All money received by the corporation from the sale of lottery tickets and all other
 sources, *except from the proceeds of online poker*, shall be deposited into a
 corporate operating account. The corporation is authorized to use all money in the
 corporate operating account for the purposes of paying prizes and the necessary

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1 expenses of the corporation and dividends to the state. The corporation shall 2 allocate the amount to be paid by the corporation to prize winners. The amount in 3 the corporate operating account which the corporation anticipates will be available 4 for the payment of prizes on an annuity basis may be invested in direct United 5 States Treasury obligations. These instruments may be in varying maturities with 6 respect to payment of annuities and may be in book-entry form. Monthly, no later 7 than the last business day of the succeeding month, the corporation shall transfer to 8 a lottery trust fund the amount of net revenues which the corporation determines are 9 surplus to its needs. These funds shall be held in trust until 1990 at which time the 10 General Assembly shall determine the manner in which the funds will be allocated 11 and appropriated. The net revenues shall be determined by deducting from gross 12 revenues the payment costs incurred in the operation and administration of the 13 lottery, including the expenses of the corporation and the costs resulting from any 14 contract or contracts entered into for promotional, advertising, or operational 15 services or for the purchase or lease of lottery equipment and materials, fixed 16 capital outlays, and the payment of prizes to the holders of winning tickets. After 17 the start-up costs are paid, it is the intent of the Legislature that it shall be the goal 18 of the corporation to transfer each year thirty-five percent (35%) of gross revenues 19 to the general fund for the purposes stated above.

20 (2)A Kentucky lottery trust account is established in the State Treasury. Net lottery 21 revenues shall be credited to this restricted account as provided in subsection (1) of 22 this section. Moneys credited to the Kentucky lottery trust account shall be invested 23 by the state in accordance with state investment practices and all earnings from the 24 investments shall accrue to this account. No moneys shall be allotted or expended 25 from this account unless pursuant to an appropriation by the General Assembly, 26 except that moneys as are needed shall be transferred to the general fund pursuant to 27 the provisions of the Acts of the Extraordinary Session of the 1988 General

1		Assembly. Moneys in the Kentucky lottery trust account shall not lapse at the close
2		of the state fiscal year.
3	(3)	Each fiscal year, three million dollars (\$3,000,000) from net lottery revenues from

All audits shall be filed with 9 the Governor, the President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of 10 Representatives. The corporation shall reimburse the Auditor of Public Accounts 11 for the reasonable costs of any audits performed by him. The corporation shall 12 cooperate with the Auditor of Public Accounts by giving employees designated by 13 any of them access to facilities of the corporation for the purpose of efficient 14 compliance with their respective responsibilities. With respect to any 15 reimbursement that the corporation is required to pay to any agency, the corporation 16 shall enter into an agreement with that agency under which the corporation shall pay 17 to the agency an amount reasonably anticipated to cover the reimbursable expenses 18 in advance of the expenses being incurred.

19 (6) By no later than December 31 of each year, in an advertisement at least one-fourth
20 (1/4) of a page in size, the Kentucky Lottery Corporation shall publish the following
21 information in every general-circulation daily newspaper published in Kentucky:

- (a) The statements of revenue, expenses, and changes in retained earnings as
 shown in the most recent annual audit report. It shall be explained that the
 transfer of dividends is the amount of lottery earnings transferred to the
 general fund;
- 26 (b) A statement identifying the auditing firm;
- 27 (c) A telephone number which citizens may call to obtain a complete copy of the

18		under KRS Chapter 239, KRS Chapter 154A, or KRS Chapter 230, he fails to halt		
19		or abate or attempt to halt or abate such use within a reasonable period of time.		
20	(2)	Permitting gambling is a Class B misdemeanor.		
21		→Section 49. KRS 528.080 is amended to read as follows:		
22	(1)	A person is guilty of possession of a gambling device when, with knowledge of the		
23		character thereof, he manufactures, sells, transports, places or possesses a gambling		
24		device or conducts or negotiates any transaction affecting or designed to affect		
25		ownership, custody or use of any gambling device not authorized under KRS		
26		Chapter 239, KRS Chapter 154A, or KRS Chapter 230, believing that it is to be		
27		used in the advancement of unlawful gambling activity.		

1 (2) Possession of a gambling device is a Class A misdemeanor.
