1	A RESOLUTION declaring September 18 as Farmer Suicide Prevention Day in the
2	Commonwealth.

WHEREAS, National Farm Safety and Health Week, September 15 to 21, annually promotes the safety and health of the millions of farmers and farm workers who play a part in producing the food, fiber, feed, and fuel for this nation and the world as a whole; and

WHEREAS, during Farm Safety and Health Week, it is appropriate to set aside
Wednesday, September 18, as a day to bring attention to a concern in the farming
community and beyond, that of rising farmer suicide rates; and

WHEREAS, most members of this Honorable Body well know the economic,physical, and emotional challenges inherent in farming; and

WHEREAS, farmers deal with multiple stresses and uncertainties, such as financial concerns revolving around equipment costs, borrowing, mortgages, rent, and insurance; economic uncertainties; crop and livestock losses; the whims of the weather; risks of chemical exposures or work-related injuries; changing federal regulations; and personal and family concerns; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Agriculture forecasted that in 2018,
net farm income, a broad measure of profits, would decrease by \$9.1 billion from 2017 to
an estimated \$66.3 billion, after increasing \$13.8 billion in 2017; and

20 WHEREAS, net farm income has been on a downward trend since 2013 with the 21 exception of 2017; and

WHEREAS, the University of Kentucky's Department of Agricultural Economics predicted that Kentucky agricultural cash receipts would be relatively stable in 2018 at \$5.7 billion, matching the 2017 level, but well below the record \$6.4 billion in 2014; and WHEREAS, some farm sectors in the state are faring well, poultry and horses as

WHEREAS, some farm sectors in the state are faring well, poultry and horses as
examples, while others are struggling, particularly dairy; and

27 WHEREAS, the number of Grade A permitted dairy farms in the state decreased

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1 from 600 at the beginning of 2018 to 513 by year's end, an apparent outgrowth of
2 declining milk prices; and

WHEREAS, mental health experts have observed that mental health and behavioral
health are major concerns in farming communities, in light of the state of the farm
industry in recent years; and

6 WHEREAS, because of the self-reliant and independent nature of farmers, they 7 oftentimes may be reluctant to seek help for anxiety or depression brought on by the 8 everyday pressures of farming; and

9 WHEREAS, Kentucky's suicide rate ranks 20th in the nation, according to data
10 compiled by the American Association of Suicidology; and

WHEREAS, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention data show the suicide rate
for male farmers, ranchers, and other agricultural managers is double that of the general
population; and

WHEREAS, the anxieties affecting farmers are prevalent nationwide, prompting the United States Congress to allocate \$10 million in annual funding through the Farm Bill for the Farm and Ranch Stress Assistance Network, ultimately making funding available nationwide to provide stress counseling and referrals for assistance as necessary to those engaged in farming, ranching, and other agriculture-related programs; and

WHEREAS, farmer crisis helplines to provide assistance for distressed farmers and
their families operate in several states; and

WHEREAS, it would be appropriate in Kentucky to establish a "one-stop shop" for farmers to contact for assistance and consultation in sorting out financial, legal, and other problems they may be facing, with behavioral and mental help available as well;

24 NOW, THEREFORE,

25 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the 26 Commonwealth of Kentucky:

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→ Section 1. The House of Representatives recognizes September 18 as Farmer

1 Suicide Prevention Day in Kentucky.

Section 2. The House of Representatives urges the appropriate state agencies,
and state colleges and universities to work with agricultural-related entities,
agribusinesses, corporations, and nonprofits to examine the feasibility of establishing an
office to serve as a central point of contact for farmers facing financial difficulties, legal
issues, and other problems.
