A RESOLUTION relating to indigenous peoples.

WHEREAS, the idea of Indigenous Peoples' Day was first proposed in 1977 by the
International Conference on Discrimination Against the Indigenous Population in the
Americas, a delegation sponsored by First Nations leaders to the United Nations; and

5 WHEREAS, indigenous peoples have inhabited this continent since long before 6 their first contact with European settlers, have shared their knowledge of the land and its 7 resources, and have continued to play a vital role in the development of the 8 Commonwealth of Kentucky and the nation; and

9 WHEREAS, the Kentucky Native American Heritage Commission was created in 10 2004 and attached for administrative purposes to the Kentucky Heritage Council to 11 promote, in partnership with the Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet, awareness of 12 significant Native American influences within the historical and cultural experiences of 13 Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, in 1998, the Kentucky General Assembly enacted legislation, codified as KRS 2.230, establishing November of each year as "Native American Indian Month" and encouraging schools, clubs, civic, and religious organizations during each November to recognize the contributions of Native Americans with suitable ceremony and fellowship designed to promote greater understanding and brotherhood between Native Americans and non-Native American peoples of the Commonwealth of Kentucky; and

WHEREAS, under KRS 2.230, the Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky shall, prior to the first day of November of each year, issue a proclamation inviting and urging the people of Kentucky to observe Native American Indian Month with suitable ceremony and fellowship, and requiring the Kentucky Department of Education, Kentucky Heritage Council, and Kentucky Native American Heritage Commission to make information available to the people of Kentucky regarding the observance of Native American Indian Month; and

WHEREAS, despite Kentucky's recognition of indigenous peoples, there are

difficulties with fair treatment of indigenous peoples and inadequate acknowledgement of
 the historic destruction of our indigenous cultures; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to provide a more accurate record of American history, in 1990 representatives from 120 indigenous nations at the First Continental Conference on 500 Years of Indian Resistance unanimously passed a resolution to transform Columbus 6 Day into an occasion to recognize the contributions and plight of indigenous Americans; 7 and

8 WHEREAS, the United States endorsed the United Nations Declaration on the 9 Rights of Indigenous Peoples on December 16, 2010, which declares that indigenous 10 peoples have the right to the dignity and diversity of their cultures, traditions, histories, 11 and aspirations, which shall be reflected through public education and information, and 12 that states should take effective measures, in cooperation with indigenous peoples, to 13 combat prejudice and eliminate discrimination as well as promote tolerance, 14 understanding, and good relations among indigenous peoples and all other segments of 15 society;

16 NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

19 → Section 1. The House of Representatives recognizes the second Monday of 20 October of each year as Indigenous Peoples' Day in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and 21 encourages all citizens of the Commonwealth to acknowledge the historic sacrifices of 22 indigenous peoples and their contributions to the emergence and development of the 23 Commonwealth of Kentucky and the United States of America.

Section 2. The Clerk of the House of Representatives is directed to deliver a
