| 1 | A RESOLUTION commemorating the centennial anniversary of Kentucky's |
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| 2 | ratification of the 19th Amendment on January 6, 1920. |
| 3 | WHEREAS, on June 4, 1919, the United States Congress passed and submitted to |
| 4 | the states for ratification the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution, |
| 5 | prohibiting the federal government and the states from denying the right to vote to United |
| 6 | States citizens on the basis of sex; and |
| 7 | WHEREAS, on August 18, 1920, the 19th Amendment was ratified as approved by |
| 8 | 36 state legislatures; and |
| 9 | WHEREAS, millions of women voted in national elections for the first time in |
| 10 | 1920; and |
| 11 | WHEREAS, the social and political movement to secure equal voting rights for |
| 12 | women originated at the historic Seneca Falls, New York Convention of 1848; and |
| 13 | WHEREAS, the resolution drafted at the convention stated that "it is the duty of |
| 14 | women of this country to secure to themselves their sacred right to the elective franchise"; |
| 15 | and |
| 16 | WHEREAS, in 1878, the women's suffrage proposal that would eventually become |
| 17 | the 19th Amendment would be introduced to Congress, failing several times over the |
| 18 | course of over 40 years before becoming the 19th Amendment; and |
| 19 | WHEREAS, Kentucky was one of the first states to grant women limited suffrage |
| 20 | rights, allowing female heads of household in rural areas the right to vote on taxes and |
| 21 | local school boards for the county "common school" system in 1838, serving as a national |
| 22 | model at the time. In 1894, women in Lexington, Covington, and Newport were allowed |
| 23 | to vote in school board elections, although the law was later rescinded; and |
| 24 | WHEREAS, Kentucky was a trailblazer for southern states in advocating for |
| 25 | women's suffrage; and |
| 26 | WHEREAS, in 1867, Glendale, Kentucky, formed a local women's suffrage |

association, the first of its kind in the South; and

WHEREAS, in 1881, the annual American Woman Suffrage Association
 convention was held in Louisville, the first convention held south of the Mason-Dixon
 line; and

4 WHEREAS, Kentucky women played a prominent role in the advancement of 5 women's suffrage. Virginia Perry, of Louisville, was vice president of the American 6 Equal Rights Association, a prominent national organization at the time. Mary Barr Clay, 7 of Richmond, was vice president of both the National Woman Suffrage Association and 8 the American Woman Suffrage Association. Mary Barr Clay was also instrumental in 9 having the American Woman Suffrage Association hold its first convention in the South. 10 Mary Clay's younger sister, Laura, founded the Kentucky Woman Suffrage Association, 11 the first statewide women's suffrage organization in the South; and

WHEREAS, on January 6, 1920, Kentucky became the 23rd state to ratify the 19thAmendment; and

WHEREAS, to ensure that Kentucky women would be able to vote in 1920, on
March 29, 1920, the legislature passed a law allowing women to vote in the 1920
presidential election; and

17 WHEREAS, in 1922, the first woman was elected to the Kentucky House of 18 Representatives; in 1923, the first woman was elected as Secretary of State; in 1926, the 19 first woman was elected to the United States House of Representatives to represent 20 Kentucky; in 1927, the first woman was elected as State Treasurer; in 1955, the first woman was elected as Auditor of Public Accounts; in 1967, the first woman and first 21 22 person of color was elected to the Kentucky Senate; in 1975, the first woman was elected 23 as Lieutenant Governor; in 1983, the first woman was elected as Governor; and in 2015, 24 the first woman of color was elected as Lieutenant Governor; and

WHEREAS, this body rightfully acknowledges the hard work, sacrifice, and dedication of the individuals and organizations instrumental in ensuring that women have the right to vote, participate in the political process, and have a voice in shaping the

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1 policies of this Commonwealth;

2 NOW, THEREFORE,

3 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the

4 Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 1. The members of the House of Representatives hereby honor the
Kentuckians who worked to make women's suffrage possible, upon the 100th anniversary
of Kentucky's ratification of the 19th Amendment.
