1		AN ACT relating to massage therapy.
2	Be it	t enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
3		→ Section 1. KRS 309.350 is amended to read as follows:
4	As u	used in KRS 309.350 to 309.364 unless the context otherwise requires:
5	(1)	"Board" means the Kentucky Board of Licensure for Massage Therapy;
6	(2)	"Board-approved massage program" means one which meets minimum standards
7		for training and curriculum as determined by the board;
8	(3)	"Compensation" means the direct or indirect payment, loan, advance, donation,
9		contribution, deposit, barter, gratuity, or gift of money or anything of value;
10	(4)	"Feldenkrais Method" means a system of somatic education in which touch and
11		words are used to eliminate faulty habits, learn new patterns of self-organization
12		and action, and improve a person's own functional movement patterns. The method
13		is based on principles of physics, biomechanics and an understanding of, or learning
14		about, human development. The practice is federally trademarked and requires
15		permission from the Feldenkrais Guild to use the term and methodology;
16	<u>(5)</u>	''Massage establishment'':
17		(a) Means any place of business that offers the practice of massage and where
18		the practice of massage is conducted on the premises of the business, or that
19		represents itself to the public by any title or description of services
20		incorporating the words "massage," "massage therapy," "massage
21		practitioner," "massagist," "masseur," "masseuse," or other words
22		identified by the board in administrative regulation. As used in this
23		paragraph, "place of business" includes any office, clinic, facility, salon,
24		spa, or other location where a person or persons engage in the practice of
25		massage; but
26		(b) Does not include:

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1. Any hospital, physician office, physical therapy facility, chiropractic

1	office, long-term care or rehabilitative facility, veterinarian office,
2	veterinarian mobile facility as described in KRS 321.205, massage
3	therapy training program approved by the board which has an onsite
4	student clinic, or athletic training facility, whether or not they employ,
5	contract with, or rent to massage therapists, or institutions of
6	secondary or higher education when massage therapy is practiced in
7	connection with employment related to athletic teams;
8	2. Any solo practitioner setting in which only one (1) licensed massage
9	therapist is employed, contracted, or self-employed for massage
10	therapy services; or
11	3. The residence of a therapist or an out-call location which is not
12	owned, rented, or leased by a massage therapist or massage entity,
13	unless the location is advertised as the therapist's or entity's place of
14	business;
15	(6) [(5)] "Massage therapist" means a person who is licensed by the board to
16	administer massage or massage therapy to the public for compensation;
17	(7)[(6)] "Polarity therapy" means diverse applications affecting the human energy
18	system. These applications include energetic approaches to somatic contact, verbal
19	facilitation, nutrition, exercise, and health education. Polarity therapy does not make
20	medical claims, diagnose physical ailments, or allow prescription of medications.
21	Standards for schools, education, and practice, the administration of a code of
22	ethics, and a registration process are provided by the American Polarity Therapy
23	Association. The practice of polarity therapy is federally trademarked;
24	(8) (7)] "Practice of massage therapy" means the application, by a massage therapist
25	licensed by the board, of a system of structured touch, pressure, movement, and
26	holding to the soft tissues of the human body with the intent to enhance or restore
27	the health and well-being of the client. The practice includes the external

1	application of water, heat, cold, lubricants, salt scrubs, or other topical preparations;
2	use of electromechanical devices that mimic or enhance the actions of the hands;
3	and determination of whether massage therapy is appropriate or contraindicated, or
4	whether referral to another health care practitioner is appropriate; and
5	(9)[(8)] "Trager Approach" means a form of movement education that uses subtle
6	directed movements and the skilled touch of a practitioner. The Trager Approach
7	combines physical movement with sensory awareness and internal imagery
8	designed to increase the client's self-awareness and generate physiological changes
9	in the body tissues so as to allow the client to experience a new way of moving his
10	or her body. The practice is federally trademarked.
11	→ Section 2. KRS 309.351 is amended to read as follows:
12	Massage therapists practicing under KRS 309.350 to 309.364 shall not perform any of the
13	following: diagnosis of illness or disease; high-velocity, low-amplitude thrust applied to a
14	joint; spinal or pelvic adjustment or chiropractic manipulation; application of
15	ultrasound; prescription of medication; or deep physical agent modalities, except
16	hydrotherapy methods and pulsed electromagnetic field therapy or microcurrent devices
17	for which the massage therapist has completed training required by the board;
18	application of ultrasound; or prescription of medication].
19	→ Section 3. KRS 309.354 is amended to read as follows:
20	(1) There is created a board to be known as the Kentucky Board of Licensure for
21	Massage Therapy, which shall be an independent agency.
22	(2) The Governor shall appoint seven (7) members to serve on the board with the
23	following representation:
24	(a) Five (5) members who are massage therapists licensed under KRS 309.350 to
25	309.364, who have been in the practice of massage therapy for at least five (5)
26	of the last seven (7) years, and who have been residents of Kentucky for at
27	least one (1) year;

1		(b) Of these five (5), at least one (1) but no more than two (2) shall own or direct
2		a board-approved massage therapy training program or be a designated
3		representative of a school owner or of a school director; and
4		(c) Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Governor and shall serve as
5		members at large who are neither licensed massage therapists nor spouses of
6		persons who are licensed, or have a direct or indirect interest in the profession
7		regulated under KRS 309.350 to 309.364. One (1) of the two (2) may hold a
8		license in another health care profession.
9	(3)	Appointments shall be for three (3) years with initial appointments as follows: three
10		(3) appointees shall serve three (3) year terms; two (2) shall serve two (2) year
11		terms; and two (2) shall serve one (1) year terms. The Governor shall assign terms
12		to initial members at his or her discretion.
13	(4)	The board shall elect initially, and annually thereafter, a chair, vice chair, and
14		secretary from its membership and shall meet at least once per year, and more often
15		as deemed necessary, at a time and at a place in Kentucky for the board to fulfill its
16		duties.
17	(5)	Each member of the board shall receive a per diem not to exceed one hundred
18		dollars (\$100) and other actual and necessary expenses for each day he or she is
19		actually engaged in the discharge of the board's official duties.
20	(6)	Upon recommendation of the board, the Governor may remove any member of the
21		board for a poor attendance record, neglect of duty, or malfeasance in office.
22		→ Section 4. KRS 309.355 is amended to read as follows:
23	(1)	The board shall administer and enforce the provisions of KRS 309.350 to 309.364
24		and shall have the responsibility to evaluate the qualifications of applicants for
25		licensure and to authorize issuing, renewing, suspending, and revoking licenses.
26	(2)	The board shall investigate alleged violations brought to its attention, conduct

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investigations, and schedule and conduct administrative hearings in accordance with

1		KRS Chapter 13B to enforce the provisions of KRS 309.350 to 309.364 and		
2		administrative regulations promulgated pursuant to KRS 309.350 to 309.364		
3		board shall have the authority to administer oaths, receive evidence, interview		
4		persons, and require the production of books, papers, documents, or other evidence.		
5		The board may institute civil and criminal proceedings against violators of KRS		
6		309.350 to 309.364. The Attorney General, Commonwealth's attorneys, and county		
7		attorneys shall assist the board in prosecuting violations of KRS 309.350 to		
8		309.364.		
9	(3)	The board may fine any massage establishment that employs or contracts		
10		unlicensed practitioners to do massage, or fails to report to the board any licensed		
11		massage therapist who violates KRS 309.350 to 309.364 or administrative		
12		regulations promulgated by the board in accordance with subsection (4) of		
13		Section 5 of this Act while in the employ of the establishment.		
14	<u>(4)</u>	The board shall promulgate administrative regulations, pursuant to KRS Chapter		
15		13A, to carry out and enforce provisions of KRS 309.350 to 309.364, including		
16		creating a code of ethics, standards of practice, standards of educational program		
17		curriculum and instructor qualification, and continuing education requirements for		
18		licensed massage therapists.		
19	<u>(5)</u> [(4)] The board shall keep a record of its proceedings and a register of all persons		
20		licensed as massage therapists. The register shall include the name, license number		
21		and date of issue, last known place of business, and residence of each licensee. The		
22		board shall publish annually a directory of licensed massage therapists and their		
23		places of business. The list shall be available to any Kentucky citizen upon request		
24		and payment of a fee not to exceed the cost of the publication.		
25	<u>(6)</u> [(5)] The board shall make an annual report to the Governor and the General		
26		Assembly, which shall contain an account of its duties performed, actions taken,		
27		and appropriate recommendations.		

1	<u>(7)</u> [(6)]	The board may seek an injunction in the Circuit Court of the county where the
2	alle	ged violation occurred against any individual who practices massage therapy in
3	the	Commonwealth without a license.
4	(8) The	board may employ staff as needed in the conduct of its duties and functions,
5	and	shall fix their compensation.
6	→ S	ection 5. KRS 309.357 is amended to read as follows:
7	(1) (a)	The board shall promulgate administrative regulations establishing a
8		reasonable schedule of fees and charges for the issuance and restoration of
9		licenses and certificates, and for the renewal of licenses and certificates
10		issued under KRS 309.350 to 309.364.
11	<u>(b)</u>	Former licensees with an expired license may have their licenses reinstated
12		upon payment of the renewal fee plus a reinstatement fee as promulgated by
13		administrative regulations of the board. If the reinstatement application is
14		made within five (5) years from the date of termination, applicants shall not
15		be required to submit to any examination as a condition for reinstatement.
16	<u>(c)</u>	A revoked license may not be reinstated or renewed. For a license that is
17		reinstated, the licensee shall pay the reinstatement fee and the renewal fee
18		as established by the board through administrative regulations.
19	<u>(d)</u>	A former licensee who fails to reinstate a license within five (5) years after
20		termination may not have it renewed, restored, or reinstated. A person may
21		apply for and obtain a new license by meeting the current requirements for
22		<u>licensure.</u>
23	<u>(e)</u>	The board may require that a person applying for a renewal or
24		reinstatement of licensure show evidence of completion of continuing
25		professional education as prescribed by the board in administrative
26		regulations.
27	The follo	owing fees shall be required of licensees and prospective applicants:

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(1) Application fee of fifty dollars (\$50), which shall be credited to the initial license

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2		fee for successful applicants;
3	(2)	Initial, nonrefundable license fee not to exceed one hundred twenty five dollars
4		(\$125);
5	(3)	Biennial renewal fees not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100);
6	(4)	Late renewal fees not to exceed one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) up to sixty (60)
7		days after expiration of license;
8	(5)	Sixty (60) to ninety (90) days after expiration of license, late renewal fees not to
9		exceed two hundred dollars (\$200); and
10	(6)	Beyond ninety (90) days after the expiration of a license:
11		(a) Late renewal fees not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200) if the applicant for
12		renewal can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the board that the applicant was
13		unable to renew in a timely manner due to circumstances beyond his or her
14		control; or
15		(b) The application and initial, nonrefundable license fees required by subsections
16		(1) and (2) of this section, accompanied by:
17		1. A new application for licensure; and
18		2. Proof of compliance with all of the requirements to practice massage
19		therapy specified in KRS 309.358.]
20		(f) If the board determines that the applicant practiced on an expired license, the
21		board may require one (1) continuing education credit per month of
22		expiration, at the discretion of the board.
23	<u>(2)</u>	Any licensed massage therapist who does not desire to meet the qualifications for
24		active license renewal shall, upon application and payment of an inactive renewal
25		fee, be issued an inactive license. The license shall not entitle the license holder
26		to use the term "licensed massage therapist," or to engage in the practice of
27		massage therapy. The inactive annual renewal fee shall be promulgated by the

1		board in administrative regulation.
2	<u>(3)</u>	To regain active status, the licensee shall, upon the submission of an application,
3		show completion of one (1) hour of continuing professional education for every
4		six (6) months the license has been in an inactive state, not to exceed five (5)
5		years. Waivers or extensions of continuing education may be approved at the
6		discretion of the board. Beyond five (5) years, the licensee shall meet the
7		requirements in Section 7 of this Act to regain active status.
8	<u>(4)</u>	The owner or manager of a massage establishment shall report to the board any
9		known violations of KRS 309.350 to 309.364 or administrative regulations
0		promulgated by the board committed by a licensed massage therapist. Failure to
1		report a violation shall be considered a violation for which the board may fine not
2		more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per incident.
3		→ Section 6. KRS 309.358 is amended to read as follows:
4	The	board may issue a license as a massage therapist to an applicant who:
5	(1)	Is eighteen (18) years of age or older;
6	(2)	Has paid the application fee and other fees required by the board;
7	(3)	Is a person of good moral character. All applicants shall submit a recent criminal
8		background check performed by means of a fingerprint check by the Department
9		of Kentucky State Police and the Federal Bureau of Investigation;
20	(4)	Has successfully completed:
21		(a) A course of study consisting of a minimum of six hundred (600) hours of
22		supervised instruction in a massage therapy training program approved by the
23		board; <u>or</u>
24		(b) An associate degree having a massage therapy emphasis which meets the
25		requirements of a massage therapy training program with supervised
26		technique instruction and is approved by the board; and
27	(5)	Has successfully passed an examination administered by the <i>Federation of State</i>

1		<u>Massage Therapy Boards, the</u> National Certification Board for Therapeutic				
2		Massage and Bodywork, or a certifying agency that has been approved by the				
3		National Commission for Certifying Agencies, or other examinations approved by				
4		the board.				
5		→ Section 7. KRS 309.361 is amended to read as follows:				
6	(1)	When renewing a license, each licensee shall document the successful completion				
7		of the required board-approved continuing education credits. <u>Twelve (12)</u> [Twenty-				
8		four (24)] hours of training shall be required for each two (2) year renewal period.				
9		Three (3) hours of the twelve (12) required shall be in ethics[A maximum of				
10		twelve (12) additional hours may be carried over into the next renewal period].				
11		Courses may include ethics, business practices, science, and techniques related to				
12		massage therapy.				
13	(2)	Waivers or extensions of continuing education may be approved at the discretion of				
14		the board.				
15		→ Section 8. KRS 309.362 is amended to read as follows:				
16	(1)	The board may deny or refuse to renew a license, may suspend or revoke a license,				
17		may issue an administrative reprimand, or may impose probationary conditions or				
18		fines not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) per violation[five hundred				
19		dollars (\$500)] when the licensee has engaged in unprofessional conduct that has				
20		endangered or is likely to endanger the health, welfare, or safety of the public.				
21		Unprofessional conduct shall include the following:				
22		(a) Obtaining or attempting to obtain a license by fraud, misrepresentation,				
23		concealment of material facts, or making a false statement to the board;				
24		(b) Being convicted of a felony in any court if the act or acts for which the				
25		licensee or applicant for license was convicted are determined by the board to				
26		have a direct bearing on whether the person is trustworthy to serve the public				
27		as a licensed massage therapist, if in accordance with KRS Chapter 335B.				

"Conviction," as used in this paragraph, shall include a finding or verdict of

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2			guilty, an admission of guilt, or a plea of nolo contendere in a court of law;
3		(c)	Violating any lawful order or administrative regulation promulgated by the
4			board;
5		(d)	Violating any provision of this chapter or administrative regulations
6			promulgated thereunder;
7		(e)	Having sexual contact as defined by KRS 510.010(7) with a client or having
8			engaged or attempted to engage in lewd or immoral conduct with any client or
9			patient;
10		(f)	Engaging in fraud or material deception in the delivery of professional
11			services, including reimbursement or advertising services, in a false or
12			misleading manner;
13		(g)	Evidence of gross negligence or gross incompetence in the practice of
14			massage therapy;
15		(h)	Violating the standards of practice or the code of ethics as promulgated by
16			administrative regulations;
17		(i)	Violating KRS 304.39-215; or
18		(j)	Engaging in conduct that is subject to the penalties under KRS 304.99-060(4)
19			or (5).
20	(2)	[Any	v licensed massage therapist who does not desire to meet the qualifications for
21		activ	re license renewal shall, upon application and payment of an inactive renewal
22		fee,	be issued an inactive license. The license shall not entitle the license holder to
23		use 1	the term "licensed massage therapist," nor to engage in the practice of massage
24		thera	py. The inactive renewal fee shall not exceed fifty dollars (\$50) annually.
25	(3)	To r	egain active status, the licensee shall upon application show completion of one
26		(1) k	our of continuing professional education for each month the license has been in
27		an ii	nactive state not to exceed five (5) years. Waivers or extensions of continuing

education may be approved at the discretion of the board. Beyond five (5) years, the

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2	licensee shall meet the requirements in KRS 309.358.
3	(4)]The board may, at its discretion, deny, refuse to renew, suspend or revoke a
4	license, or impose probationary conditions following an administrative hearing
5	pursuant to KRS Chapter 13B and in accordance with administrative regulations
6	promulgated by the board.
7	(3)[(5)] The surrender of a license shall not deprive the board of jurisdiction to
8	proceed with disciplinary actions under KRS 309.350 to 309.364.
9	→ Section 9. KRS 309.363 is amended to read as follows:
10	(1) A person, institution, or business entity offering a massage therapy program of
11	instruction shall file a completed application for a certificate of good standing with
12	the board on a form prescribed by the board and pay a fee as specified in KRS
13	309.357. The completed application shall provide proof acceptable to the board that
14	the following criteria have been met:
15	(a) The school is licensed to operate by the Kentucky Commission on Proprietary
16	Education, the Council on Postsecondary Education, or their equivalent in
17	another state;
18	(b) A curriculum statement showing clock hours devoted to each subject with the
19	following minimums:
20	1. One hundred twenty-five (125) hours of anatomy, physiology, or
21	kinesiology;
22	2. A two hundred (200) hour course to include massage theory, technique,
23	and practice focusing on gliding strokes, kneading, direct pressure, deep

6		(c) A	listing of instructional staff and their qualifications as follows:
7		1.	Instructors of the practical courses shall be licensed massage therapists
8			and shall have three (3) years of experience in the practice of massage
9			therapy;
10		2.	Instructors of science courses shall be either licensed massage therapists
11			with three (3) years of experience in the practice of massage therapy or
12			have certification or specific higher education in the subject they are
13			teaching; and
14		3.	Instructors in adjunctive courses shall have subject-specific education
15			and experience.
16	(2)	A scho	ol may be presumed to have met the qualifications in subsection (1)(b) and
17		(c) of th	his section if it holds a current designation of "Approved School" from the
18		<u>Nation</u>	al Certification Board of Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork or has the
19		designa	ation of "accredited" or "COMTA-endorsed curriculum" from the
20		Counci	Il for Massage Therapy Accreditation.
21	<u>(3)</u>	The bo	ard shall accept National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and
22		Bodyw	ork guidelines in approving continuing education.
23		→ Sect	ion 10. KRS 309.3631 is amended to read as follows:
24	(1)	A pers	on, institution, or business entity offering a massage therapy program of
25		instruct	ion shall renew a certificate of good standing annually.
26	(2)	During	the renewal process, the person, institution, or business entity shall submit
27		to the	board documentation of program updates, personnel changes, graduation

- 1 rates, and licensing examination rates.
- 2 (3) Application for the initial certificate of good standing and annual renewals shall
- 3 <u>include a fee prescribed by the board in administrative regulations.</u>
