A RESOLUTION expressing opposition to President Biden's executive order on
 climate change and the use of social costs for calculating damages from emitting
 greenhouse gases.

WHEREAS, on January 20, 2021, President Biden signed Executive Order 13990
which directs federal agencies to measure the long-term economic damage arising from
an increase in specific greenhouse gases such as carbon and nitrogen-oxides; and

7 WHEREAS, this type of measurement is called the social or external cost of8 greenhouse gas pollution; and

9 WHEREAS, an Interagency Working Group on the Social Cost of Greenhouse 10 Gases created three separate cost metrics for carbon, nitrous-oxide, and methane, and 11 these metrics will be used in developing federal administrative regulations and rules 12 governing the agriculture, mining, energy, environmental, and transportation sectors; and

WHEREAS, measuring social costs greatly inflates the cost of emitting greenhouse
 gases which makes manufacturing and energy production more expensive; and

WHEREAS, imposing these unrealized economic costs on those sectors will curtail economic growth and reduce the potential for states to quickly recover from the devastating economic effects of the pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the effect of this executive order on Kentucky's agriculture sector alone will be wide-reaching as farmers contend with new regulations that attempts to mitigate the social costs of methane, sulfur-dioxide, nitrogen-oxides, and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) emissions associated with livestock wastes, equipment fuel usage, and applications of fertilizers and pesticides; and

WHEREAS, federal agencies using social costs as a method of developing regulation or rule arguably violates the separation of powers of the United States Constitution and thus far 12 states attorneys generals have sued the federal government to stop the implementation of Executive Order 13990;

27 NOW, THEREFORE,

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1 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the 2 Commonwealth of Kentucky:

3 → Section 1. Because of the disastrous financial implications of monetizing the
4 long-term damage caused by greenhouse gases on the United States economy, the
5 President of the United States of America is urged to withdraw Executive Order 13990.

Section 2. Given the impact of Executive Order 13990 on Kentucky's
manufacturing, mining, energy, and agriculture sectors, Attorney General Daniel
Cameron is urged to consider joining the other 12 state attorneys generals in suing the
federal government to stop the implementation of federal rules and regulations that will
impose social costs for emitting greenhouse gas emissions.
