7			subsection. Eligible industry-recognized certifications, licensures,
8			or credentials shall not be limited to those earned in conjunction
9			with a minimum sequence of courses. Each high school shall
10			publicly report the credits, hours, and credentials on an annual

14	(c)	1.	Beginning with data from the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 school years,
15			the accountability system performance for each district, school, and
16			student subgroup determined by the state indicators shall be based on a
17			combination of annual performance, hereinafter called "status," and
18			improvement over time, hereinafter called "change."
19		2.	Status and change shall receive equal weight in determining overall
20			performance. For all students as a group and separately for individual
21			subgroups, status shall be determined, beginning with the data from the
22			2020-2021 academic year, by using the current year performance and
23			change shall be determined, beginning with the data from the 2021-2022
24			academic year, by using the difference in performance from the prior to
25			current year, except change shall be based on the difference in
26			performance for the prior three (3) years for the purpose of determining
27			the lowest-performing five percent (5%) of schools under KRS

2		3. For each state indicator, there shall be five (5) status levels ranging from
3		very high to very low and five (5) change levels ranging from increased
4		significantly to declined significantly.
5		4. The percentile cut scores for status and change levels shall be based on
6		distribution and shall be approved by the Kentucky Department of
7		Education and the Local Superintendents Advisory Council. The cut
8		scores shall remain in place for at least six (6) years unless existing cut
9		scores no longer support meaningful differentiation of schools as
10		required by the federal Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015, Pub. L. No.
11		114-95, or its successor.
12	(d)	Beginning in the fall of 2022, the Kentucky Department of Education shall
13		develop an online display of the accountability system results hereinafter
14		called a "dashboard." A color-coded performance level for each state indicator
15		shall be displayed in a straightforward manner on the dashboard for overall
16		performance, status, and change by district, school, and individual subgroups.
17		Overall performance shall aggregate all available data for the state indicators.
18	(e)	Based on data from the Kentucky Center for Education and Workforce
19		Statistics, each local workforce investment board, in conjunction with local
20		economic development organizations from its state regional sector, shall
21		annually compile a list of industry-recognized certifications, licensures, and
22		credentials specific to the state and regional workforce area, rank them by

The Kentucky Department of Education shall pay for the cost of an 2 assessment taken by a high school student for attaining an industry-3 recognized certification, credential, or licensure if the student 4 consecutively completes at least two (2) related career pathway courses 5 approved by the department prior to taking the assessment.
- 6 2. If a high school student has not completed the two (2) course 7 requirement described in subparagraph 1. of this paragraph but meets performance-based experience eligibility and passes an assessment, the 8 9 department shall provide a weighted reimbursement amount to the 10 school district for the cost of the assessment based on the level of 11 demand of the certificate, credential, or license earned. The Kentucky 12 Board of Education shall promulgate regulations establishing the 13 performance-based experience eligibility requirements and weighted 14 reimbursement amounts.

- 24 (5) After receiving the advice of the Education Assessment and Accountability Review
- 25 Subcommittee, the Office of Education Accountability; the School Curriculum,
- 26 Assessment, and Accountability Council; and the *department's technical advisory*
- 27 <u>committee[National Technical Advisory Panel on Assessment and Accountability]</u>,

Upon appeal, an administrative hearing shall be 18 conducted in accordance with KRS Chapter 13B. The state board may adjust a 19 performance judgment on appeal when evidence of unusual circumstances warrants 20 the conclusion that the performance judgment is based on fraud or a mistake in 21 computations, is arbitrary, is lacking any reasonable basis, or when there are 22 significant new circumstances occurring during the three (3) year assessment period 23 which are beyond the control of the appellant school or school district.

24 (7) Advice and recommendations provided by the department's technical advisory
 25 committee shall be summarized and reported by the department by July 1 and

11		Upon receipt of the report, the Office of Education Accountability shall forward
12		the report to the Education Assessment and Accountability Review Subcommittee
13		and the co-chairs of the Interim Joint Committee on Education.
14		Section 2. KRS 156.160 is amended to read as follows:
15	(1)	With the advice of the Local Superintendents Advisory Council, the Kentucky
16		Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations establishing
17		standards which school districts shall meet in student, program, service, and
18		operational performance. These regulations shall comply with the expected
19		outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. Administrative
20		regulations shall be promulgated for the following:
21		(a) Courses of study for the different grades and kinds of common schools
22		identifying the common curriculum content directly tied to the goals,
23		outcomes, and assessment strategies developed under KRS 158.645,

- (b) Courses of study or educational experiences available to students in all middle
 and high schools to fulfill the prerequisites for courses in advanced science
 and mathematics as defined in KRS 158.845;
- 15 (c) The acquisition and use of educational equipment for the schools as
 16 recommended by the Council for Education Technology;
- The minimum requirements for high school graduation in light of the expected 17 (d) outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. The minimum 18 19 requirements shall not include achieving any postsecondary readiness 20 indicator as described in KRS 158.6455 or any minimum score on a statewide 21 assessment administered under KRS 158.6453. Student scores from any 22 assessment administered under KRS 158.6453 that are determined by the 23 department's technical advisory committee[National Technical Advisory 24 Panel] to be valid and reliable at the individual level shall be included on the 25 student transcript. The *department's technical advisory committee*[National 26 Technical Advisory Panel shall submit its determination to the commissioner 27 of education and the Legislative Research Commission;

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- (e) The requirements for an alternative high school diploma for students with disabilities whose individualized education program indicates that, in accordance with 20 U.S.C. sec. 1414(d)(1)(A):
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1. The student cannot participate in the regular statewide assessment; and

- 2. 5 An appropriate alternate assessment has been selected for the student 6 based upon a modified curriculum and an individualized course of study; 7 Taking and keeping a school census, and the forms, blanks, and software to be (f) 8 used in taking and keeping the census and in compiling the required reports. 9 The board shall create a statewide student identification numbering system 10 based on students' Social Security numbers. The system shall provide a 11 student identification number similar to, but distinct from, the Social Security 12 number, for each student who does not have a Social Security number or 13 whose parents or guardians choose not to disclose the Social Security number 14 for the student;
- (g) Sanitary and protective construction of public school buildings, toilets,
 physical equipment of school grounds, school buildings, and classrooms. With
 respect to physical standards of sanitary and protective construction for school

- 4. The recommendations shall be published on the Web site established in 6 7 this subsection for the purpose of gathering additional feedback from the 8 public. The commissioner shall subsequently present the 9 recommendations and the public feedback to the Interim Joint Committee on Education. 10
- 115.The commissioner shall subsequently provide a report to the standards12and assessments process review committee summarizing the process13conducted under this subsection and the resulting recommendations. The14report shall include but not be limited to the timeline of the review15process, public feedback, and responses from the Interim Joint16Committee on Education.
- After receiving the commissioner's report, the standards and assessments 17 6. process review committee shall either concur that stakeholders have had 18 19 adequate opportunity to provide input on standards and the 20 corresponding alignment of state assessments or find the input process 21 deficient. If the process is found deficient, the recommendations may be 22 returned to the appropriate standards and assessments review committee 23 for review as described in subparagraph 3. of this paragraph. If the 24 process is found sufficient, the recommendations shall be forwarded 25 without amendment to the Kentucky Board of Education.
- (h) The Kentucky Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations
 in accordance with KRS Chapter 13A as may be needed for the administration

1		of the review process, including staggering the timing and sequence of the
2		review process by subject area and remuneration of the review committees
3		and advisory panels described in paragraphs (c) and (d) of this subsection.

22		3. Help all students use higher-order thinking and communication skills.
23	(k)	The Education Professional Standards Board in cooperation with the

25		shall coordinate information and training sessions for faculty and staff in all of

27		standards. The Education Professional Standards Board shall ensure that each

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- teacher preparation program includes use of the academic standards in the pre service education programs and that all teacher interns will have experience

- 8 (3) (a) The Kentucky Board of Education shall be responsible for creating and 9 implementing a balanced statewide assessment program that measures the 10 students', schools', and districts' achievement of the goals set forth in KRS 11 158.645 and 158.6451, to ensure compliance with the federal Every Student 12 Succeeds Act of 2015, Pub. L. No. 114-95, or its successor, and to ensure 13 school accountability.
- 14 (b) The board shall revise the annual statewide assessment program as needed in 15 accordance with revised academic standards and corresponding assessment 16 alignment adjustments approved by the board under subsection (2) of this 17 section.
- 18 (c) The statewide assessments shall not include any academic standards not
 19 approved by the board under subsection (2) of this section.
- 20 (d) The board shall seek the advice of the Office of Education Accountability; the 21 School Curriculum, Assessment, and Accountability Council; the Education 22 Assessment and Accountability Review Subcommittee, and the *department's* technical advisory committee[National Technical Advisory Panel on 23 24 Assessment and Accountability] in the development of the assessment 25 program. The statewide assessment program shall not include measurement of 26 a student's ability to become a self-sufficient individual or to become a 27 responsible member of a family, work group, or community.

2			composed of annual student summative tests, which may include a
3			combination of multiple competency-based assessment and performance

15			6. Ensure school and district accountability for student achievement of the
16			goals set forth in KRS 158.645 and 158.6451, except the statewide
17			assessment program shall not include measurement of a student's ability
18			to become a self-sufficient individual or to become a responsible
19			member of a family, work group, or community.
20	(5)	The	state student assessments shall include the following components:
21		(a)	Elementary and middle grades requirements are:
22			1. A criterion-referenced test each in mathematics and reading in grades
23			three (3) through eight (8) that is valid and reliable for an individual
24			student and that measures the depth and breadth of Kentucky's academic
25			content standards;
26			2. A criterion-referenced test each in science and social studies that is valid
27			and reliable for an individual student as necessary to measure the depth

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1		and breadth of Kentucky's academic content standards to be
2		administered one (1) time within the elementary and middle grades,

15		2. A criterion-referenced test in social studies that is valid and reliable for
16		an individual student as necessary to measure the depth and breadth of
17		Kentucky's academic content standards to be administered one (1) time
18		within the high school grades;
19		3. An on-demand assessment of student writing to be administered one (1)
20		time within the high school grades;
21		4. An editing and mechanics test relating to writing, using multiple choice
22		and constructed response items, to be administered one (1) time within
23		the high school grades; and
24		5. A college admissions examination to assess English, reading,
25		mathematics, and science in the spring of grade ten (10) and the spring
26		of grade eleven (11);
27	(c)	The Kentucky Board of Education shall add any other component necessary to

1			comply with the Every Student Succeeds Act of 2015, Pub. L. No. 114-95, or
2			its successor, as determined by the United States Department of Education;
3		(d)	The criterion-referenced components required in this subsection shall be
4			composed of constructed response items and multiple choice items;
5		(e)	The Kentucky Board of Education may incorporate end-of-course
6			examinations into the assessment program to be used in lieu of requirements
7			for criterion-referenced tests required under paragraph (b) of this subsection;
8			and
9		(f)	The results of the assessment program developed under this subsection shall
10			be used by schools and districts to determine appropriate instructional
11			modifications for all students in order for students to make continuous
12			progress, including that needed by advanced learners.
13	(6)	Each	school district shall administer the statewide student assessment during the
14		last	fourteen (14) days of school in the district's instructional calendar. The
15		Kent	tucky Board of Education may change the testing window to allow for
16		inno	vative assessment systems or other online test administration and shall
17		pron	nulgate administrative regulations that minimize the number of days of testing
18		and	outline the procedures to be used during the testing process to ensure test
19		secu	rity, including procedures for testing makeup days, and to comply with federal

20 assessment requirements.

21 (7) A student enrolled in a district-operated or district-contracted alternative program
 22 shall participate in the appropriate assessments required by this section.

(8) A local school district may select and use commercial interim or formative
assessments or develop and use its own formative assessments to provide data on
how well its students are growing toward mastery of Kentucky academic standards,
so long as the district's local school board develops a policy minimizing the
reduction in instructional time related to the administration of the interim

7		develop their own diagnostic procedures. The results shall be used to inform the

9	(10)	The state board shall ensure that a technically sound longitudinal comparison of the		
10		asse	ssment results for the same students shall be made available.	
11	(11)	The	following provisions shall apply to the college admissions examinations	
12		desc	ribed in subsection (5)(b)5. of this section:	
13		(a)	The cost of both college admissions examinations administered to students in	
14			high school shall be paid for by the Kentucky Department of Education. The	
15			costs of additional college admissions examinations shall be the responsibility

6 (12) Kentucky teachers shall have a significant role in providing feedback about the
7 design of the assessments, except for the college admissions exams described in
8 subsection (5)(b)5. of this section. The assessments shall be designed to:

- 9 (a) Measure grade appropriate core academic content, basic skills, and higher10 order thinking skills and their application;
- (b) Provide valid and reliable scores for schools. If scores are reported for
 students individually, they shall be valid and reliable;
- 13 (c) Minimize the time spent by teachers and students on assessment; and
- 14 (d) Assess Kentucky academic standards only.

15 (13) The results from assessment under subsections (3) and (5) of this section shall be 16 reported to the school districts and schools no later than seventy-five (75) days 17 following the last day the assessment can be administered. Assessment reports 18 provided to the school districts and schools shall include an electronic copy of an 19 operational subset of test items from each assessment administered to their students 20 and the results for each of those test items by student and by school.

(14) The Department of Education shall gather information to establish the validity of the assessment and accountability program. It shall develop a biennial plan for validation studies that shall include but not be limited to the consistency of student results across multiple measures, the congruence of school scores with documented improvements in instructional practice and the school learning environment, and the potential for all scores to yield fair, consistent, and accurate student performance level and school accountability decisions. Validation activities shall take place in a

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timely manner and shall include a review of the accuracy of scores assigned to students and schools, as well as of the testing materials. The plan shall be submitted to the Commission by July 1 of the first year of each biennium. A summary of the findings shall be submitted to the Legislative Research Commission by September 1 of the second year of the biennium.

6 (15) The Department of Education and the state board shall offer optional assistance to
7 local school districts and schools in developing and using continuous assessment
8 strategies needed to assure student progress. The continuous assessment shall
9 provide diagnostic information to improve instruction to meet the needs of
10 individual students.

(16) The Administration Code for Kentucky's Assessment Program shall include prohibitions of inappropriate test preparation activities by school district employees charged with test administration and oversight, including but not limited to the issue of teachers being required to do test practice in lieu of regular classroom instruction and test practice outside the normal work day. The code shall include disciplinary sanctions that may be taken toward a school or individuals.

(17) The Kentucky Board of Education, after the Department of Education has received
advice from the Office of Education Accountability; the School Curriculum,
Assessment, and Accountability Council; and the *department's technical advisory committee*[National Technical Advisory Panel on Assessment and Accountability],
shall promulgate an administrative regulation under KRS Chapter 13A to establish
the components of a reporting structure for assessments administered under this
section. The reporting structure shall include the following components:

(a) A school report card that clearly communicates with parents and the public
about school performance. The school report card shall be sent to the parents
of the students of the districts, and information on electronic access to a
summary of the results for the district shall be published in the newspaper

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- with the largest circulation in the county. It shall include but not be limited to
 the following components reported by race, gender, and disability when
 appropriate:
- 4 1. Student academic achievement, including the results from each of the
 5 assessments administered under this section;
- 6 2. For Advanced Placement, Cambridge Advanced International, and 7 International Baccalaureate, the courses offered, the number of students enrolled, completing, and taking the examination for each course, and 8 9 the percentage of examinees receiving a score of three (3) or better on AP examinations, a score of "e" or better on Cambridge Advanced 10 11 International examinations, or a score of four (4) or better on IB 12 examinations. The data shall be disaggregated by gender, race, students 13 with disabilities, and economic status;
- Nonacademic achievement, including the school's attendance, retention,
 graduation rates, and student transition to postsecondary;
- 16 4. School learning environment, including measures of parental
 17 involvement; and
- 18 5. Any other school performance data required by the Every Student
 19 Succeeds Act of 2015, Pub. L. No. 114-95, or its successor;
- (b) An individual student report to parents for each student in grades three (3)
 through eight (8) summarizing the student's skills in reading, science, social
 studies, and mathematics. The school's staff shall develop a plan for
 accelerated learning for any student with identified deficiencies or strengths;
 and
- (c) A student's highest scores on the college admissions assessments administered
 under subsection (5)(b)5. of this section.
- 27 (18) (a) Beginning in fiscal year 2017-2018, and every six (6) years thereafter, the

1 Kentucky Department of Education shall implement a comprehensive process 2 for reviewing and revising the academic standards in visual and performing 3 arts and practical living skills and career studies for all levels and in foreign 4 language for middle and high schools. The department shall develop review 5 committees for the standards for each of the content areas that include 6 representation from certified specialist public school teachers and 7 postsecondary teachers in those subject areas.

8 (b) The academic standards in practical living skills for elementary, middle, and 9 high school levels shall include a focus on drug abuse prevention, with an 10 emphasis on the prescription drug epidemic and the connection between 11 prescription opioid abuse and addiction to other drugs, such as heroin and 12 synthetic drugs.

13 (c) The department shall provide to all schools guidelines for programs that 14 incorporate the adopted academic standards in visual and performing arts and 15 practical living and career studies. The department shall provide to middle and 16 high schools guidelines for including a foreign language program. The 17 guidelines shall address program length and time, courses offered, staffing, 18 resources, and facilities.

(d) The Kentucky Department of Education, in consultation with certified public
school teachers of visual and performing arts, may develop program standards
for the visual and performing arts.

(19) The Kentucky Department of Education shall provide to all schools guidelines for
including an effective writing program within the curriculum. Each school-based
decision making council or, if there is no school council, a committee appointed by
the principal, shall adopt policies that determine the writing program for its school
and submit it to the Department of Education for review and comment. The writing
program shall incorporate a variety of language resources, technological tools, and

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multiple opportunities for students to develop complex communication skills for a variety of purposes.

- 3 The Kentucky Department of Education, in consultation with the review (20) (a) 4 committees described in subsection (18) of this section, shall develop a school 5 profile report to be used by all schools to document how they will address the 6 adopted academic standards in their implementation of the programs as 7 described in subsection (18) of this section, which may include student 8 opportunities and experiences in extracurricular activities. The department 9 shall include the essential workplace ethics program on the school profile 10 report.
- 11 (b) By October 1 of each year, each school principal shall complete the school 12 profile report, which shall be signed by the members of the school council, or 13 the principal if no school council exists, and the superintendent. The report 14 shall be electronically transmitted to the Kentucky Department of Education, 15 and the original shall be maintained on file at the local board office and made 16 available to the public upon request. The department shall include a link to 17 each school's profile report on its Web site.
- 18 (c) If a school staff member, student, or a student's parent has concerns regarding
 19 deficiencies in a school's implementation of the programs described in
 20 subsection (18) of this section, he or she may submit a written inquiry to the
 21 school council.
