1	A RESOLUTION honoring the 20th anniversary of the University of Kentucky's
2	Reading Recovery University Training Center.
3	WHEREAS, in 2000-2001, Dr. Judy Embry, under the direction of Dean Shirley
4	Raines, College of Education, began the Training of Trainers at Texas Woman's
5	University in Denton, Texas; and
6	WHEREAS, after Dr. Embry's year-long training, she established the Reading
7	Recovery Center at the University of Kentucky in 2001 within the Collaborate Center for
8	Literacy Development; and
9	WHEREAS, Reading Recovery is an intense, short-term, early intervention
10	developed by Dr. Marie Clay of New Zealand, designed to support classroom instruction
11	for young, struggling literacy learners in the first grade; and
12	WHEREAS, students receive daily 30-minute lessons taught by a highly trained
13	teacher as a supplement to a comprehensive classroom literacy instruction for 12-20
14	weeks; and
15	WHEREAS, the goal of Reading Recovery is to assist the lowest literacy learners to
16	become independent readers and writers. The supplemental instruction continues until
17	students can function independently within the average reading range of their peers; and
18	WHEREAS, during the 2004 Legislative Session, Governor Ernie Fletcher, First
19	Lady Glenna Fletcher, and key legislators observed a Reading Recovery lesson and small
20	literacy groups at Hearn Elementary in Frankfort, Kentucky; and
21	WHEREAS, through the Governor's new initiative, Read to Achieve, a new wave of
22	early literacy grants added hundreds of teachers to assist young, struggling literacy
23	learners throughout Kentucky; and
24	WHEREAS, during 2008-2009, the Reading Recovery University Training Center
25	expanded literacy training for small group intervention through the Comprehensive
26	Intervention Model developed by Dr. Linda Dorn at the University of Arkansas; and
27	WHEREAS, the Comprehensive Intervention Model is a systemic approach to

literacy improvement. The goal of small-group interventions is to develop self-regulated,
 strategic readers and writers who are able to solve literacy problems with flexibility,
 efficiency, and understanding for K-3 students; and

WHEREAS, with the assistance of a new administration, Governor Steve Beshear
and first Lady Jane Beshear, with the help of Senators Dan Kelly and Jack Westwood
along with other key legislators, continued to champion literacy efforts for the children in
Kentucky through Read to Achieve and Reading Recovery; and

8 WHEREAS, the Reading Recovery University Training Center, under the direction 9 of Dean May John O'Hair at the College of Education and Dr. George Hruby, Executive 10 Director of the Collaborative Center for Literacy Development, trained an additional 11 Trainer, Dr. Linda Harmon, at the Ohio State University in 2011-2012; and

WHEREAS, the Reading Recovery University Training Center has provided training and professional development to Teacher Leaders to support their training of Special Education and English Language Learner teachers in the Literacy Lessons intervention. This literacy training supports specialist teachers in their work with special populations; and

WHEREAS, the Reading Recovery University Training Center continued to expand
in the field of technology. The center provided professional development around the use
of technology for all Teacher Leaders and by 2020, during the COVID-19 pandemic, our
Teacher Leaders and teachers were well-prepared to continue using technology for both
teacher and student learning; and

WHEREAS, over the past 20 years, the Reading Recovery University Training Center has provided ongoing professional development to 45 Teacher Leaders who trained 584 Reading Recovery teachers to provide intervention services to 54,341 first grade students in 481 schools within 129 school districts; and

WHEREAS, an additional 191,251 students in grades K-3 were served within small
group interventions by Reading Recovery/CIM teachers; and
