Programs offered or facilitated by the department shall be at 14 locations and times convenient to local school personnel and shall be made 15 accessible through the use of technology when appropriate. They shall include 16 programs that: address the goals for Kentucky schools as stated in KRS 158.6451, 17 including reducing the achievement gaps as determined by an equity analysis of the 18 disaggregated student performance data from the state assessment program 19 developed under KRS 158.6453; engage educators in effective learning processes 20 and foster collegiality and collaboration; and provide support for staff to incorporate 21 newly acquired skills into their work through practicing the skills, gathering 22 information about the results, and reflecting on their efforts. Professional 23 development programs shall be made available to teachers based on their needs 24 which shall include but not be limited to the following areas:

(a) Strategies to reduce the achievement gaps among various groups of students
and to provide continuous progress;

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(b) Curriculum content and methods of instruction for each content area,

- 1 including differentiated instruction; 2 School-based decision making; (c) 3 Assessment literacy; (d) 4 (e) Integration of performance-based student assessment into daily classroom 5 instruction; 6 (f) Nongraded primary programs; 7 Research-based instructional practices; (g) 8 (h) Instructional uses of technology; 9 (i) Curriculum design to serve the needs of students with diverse learning styles 10 and skills and of students of diverse cultures; 11 (i) Instruction in reading, including phonics, phonemic awareness, 12 comprehension, fluency, and vocabulary; 13 (k) Educational leadership; and 14 (1) Strategies to incorporate character education throughout the curriculum. 15 (4) The department shall assist school personnel in assessing the impact of professional 16 development on their instructional practices and student learning. 17 Upon the request of a school district or school council, the department shall assist (5) 18 districts and school councils] with the development of long-term school and district 19 improvement plans that include multiple strategies for professional development 20 based on the assessment of needs at the school level. 21 (a) Professional development strategies may include but are not limited to 22 participation in subject matter academies, teacher networks, training institutes, 23 workshops, seminars, and study groups; collegial planning; action research; 24 mentoring programs; appropriate university courses; and other forms of 25 professional development. (b) 26 In planning the use of up to the four (4) days for professional development

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under KRS 158.070, school councils and districts *may*[shall] give priority to

1 programs that increase teachers' understanding of curriculum content and 2 methods of instruction appropriate for each content area based on individual 3 school plans. The district may use up to one (1) day to provide district-wide 4 training and training that is mandated by state or federal law. Only those 5 employees identified in the mandate or affected by the mandate shall be 6 required to attend the training.

7 State funds allocated for professional development shall be used to support (c) 8 professional development initiatives that are consistent with local school 9 improvement and professional development plans and teachers' individual 10 growth plans. The funds may be used throughout the year for all staff, 11 including classified and certified staff and parents on school councils or 12 committees. 

Included in the school 13 council formula shall be an allocation for professional development that is at least 14 sixty-five percent (65%) of the district's per pupil state allocation for professional 15 development for each student in average daily attendance in the school. The school 16 council shall plan professional development in compliance with requirements 17 specified in KRS 156.095, except as provided in KRS 158.649. School councils of 18 small schools shall be encouraged to work with other school councils to maximize 19 professional development opportunities.

20 (9) (a) No board member, superintendent of schools, district employee, or member of 21 a school council shall intentionally engage in a pattern of practice which is 22 detrimental to the successful implementation of or circumvents the intent of 23 school-based decision making to allow the professional staff members of a 24 school and parents to be involved in the decision making process in working 25 toward meeting the educational goals established in KRS 158.645 and 26 158.6451 or to make decisions in areas of policy assigned to a school council 27 pursuant to paragraph (i) of subsection (2) of this section.

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- 1 (b) An affected party who believes a violation of this subsection has occurred may 2 file a written complaint with the Office of Education Accountability. The 3 office shall investigate the complaint and resolve the conflict, if possible, or 4 forward the matter to the Kentucky Board of Education.
- 5 (c) The Kentucky Board of Education shall conduct a hearing in accordance with
