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1 A RESOLUTION calling on the Tigray People's Liberation Front, Oromo 2 Liberation Front, and other belligerents to cease all hostilities, protect human rights, allow 3 unfettered access for humanitarian relief, and cooperate with independent investigations 4 of credible atrocity allegations pertaining to the conflicts in the Tigray, Amhara, Afar, 5 Oromia and Benishangul-Gumuz regions of Ethiopia.

6 WHEREAS, the noble people of Ethiopia have nurtured and developed languages
7 and religions that have endured harmoniously for three millennia as well as a proud and
8 distinguished culture; and

9 WHEREAS, the United States and the Federal Democratic Republic of Ethiopia
10 share an important relationship and more than a century of diplomatic relations; and

WHEREAS, Ethiopia is the second most populous country in Africa and plays a key role in advancing security and stability across sub-Saharan Africa, including a role as a top contributor of uniformed personnel to United Nations peacekeeping missions; and

WHEREAS, tensions between Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed's Prosperity Party and the Tigray People's Liberation Front (TPLF), which was the dominant party of the ruling coalition in Ethiopia until late 2019, escalated when the TPLF reneged and held elections in the Tigray region of Ethiopia on September 9, 2020, despite the decision by the federal government of Ethiopia to postpone general elections due to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, the TPLF rejected the postponement of general elections and considered the extension of the term of the federal government of Ethiopia to be unconstitutional, while the federal government of Ethiopia deemed the Tigray regional elections as illegitimate, and subsequently, the members of the federal republic's parliament designated the TPLF a terrorist group; and

WHEREAS, the Tigray People's Liberation Front, Oromo Liberation Front, and other belligerents should cease their declaration of war on peace-loving citizens and against the democratically elected government; and

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WHEREAS, in the early hours of November 4, 2020, the TPLF ordered a surprise
 treasonous attack on members of the Northern Command of the Ethiopian National
 Defense Force (ENDF) stationed in camps across Tigray leading to the death of more
 than 6,000 service men and women in the hands of their brothers in arms; and

5 WHEREAS, the Prime Minister of Ethiopia subsequently ordered a law-6 enforcement operation which eventually evolved into an armed conflict between ENDF 7 and its allies on one side and TPLF on the other side, with thousands of deaths reported; 8 and

9 WHEREAS, on November 28, 2020, the government of Ethiopia claimed victory in 10 the conflict after taking Mekelle, the capital city of the Tigray region, with the Prime 11 Minister of Ethiopia indicating a shift of focus to rebuilding the region and providing 12 humanitarian assistance, while federal police worked to apprehend the rebelling leaders 13 of TPLF; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, prior to the outbreak of fighting in the Tigray region, there more than 1.8 million people internally displaced in Ethiopia, and approximately 2 million people in the Tigray region were already in need of humanitarian assistance; and

WHEREAS, the ensuing conflict in the Tigray region has prompted more than 61,000 Ethiopians to seek refuge in Sudan, has displaced as many as 500,000 people internally, and caused severe shortages of food, water, medical supplies, and other necessary goods for those who remain in the region; and

WHEREAS, the conflict has disrupted harvests, livelihoods, and supply chains in all the regions, and in the Amhara and Afar regions food and medical supplies have been looted, medical and school infrastructure have been destroyed, and impediments continue to constrain humanitarian responses with millions of people in need of food assistance in all of the conflict zones; and

WHEREAS, throughout the Tigray and adjacent regions, there has been a shutdown and disruption of electricity, banking, the Internet, and telephone services apparently

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caused by both sides in the conflict with limited restoration of services to date; and

2 WHEREAS, journalists have been restricted from accessing much of the Tigray 3 region, and several journalists have been arrested in connection to their coverage of the 4 conflict, while one journalist working for the Tigray Mass Media Agency was killed; and 5 WHEREAS, although the government of Ethiopia entered into an agreement with 6 the United Nations on November 29, 2020, to facilitate humanitarian access to the Tigray 7 region, that access is not unfettered, and when such access was possible, humanitarian 8 supplies and equipment, including delivery trucks, have been diverted to TPLF's war 9 effort; and

WHEREAS, in March 2021, President Biden asked Senator Christopher Coons of Delaware to serve as an emissary to convey the President's concerns to the Prime Minister of the government of Ethiopia about the humanitarian crisis and human rights abuses in the Tigray region, and the risk of broader instability in the Horn of Africa; and

WHEREAS, President Biden signed an executive order in September 2021
threatening to levy sanctions against the government of Ethiopia if steps were not taken to
end the war in the Tigray region; and

WHEREAS, in November 2021, the Biden Administration removed Ethiopia from participation in the African Growth and Opportunity Act, a program to provide sub-Saharan African nations duty-free access, likely harming the 230,000 low-wage women who work in the purpose-built industrial parks, and having a severe adverse effect on the livelihoods of a total of nearly a million poor people; and

WHEREAS, the Biden Administration has also ensured all sides that the United States is impartial in its search for peace and stability in the Horn of Africa, and that its aim is not to impose a regime change by helping to oust the democratically elected government of Ethiopia; and

WHEREAS, the United States Special Envoy for the Horn of Africa, Jeffrey Feltman, said the parties in the conflict in the Tigray region of Ethiopia "don't seem

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anywhere near" a cease-fire or peace talks and called the humanitarian conditions in the
 Tigray region "unacceptable," and a convoy of forty trucks of humanitarian assistance has
 been allowed since Feltman's return to Washington, D.C.;

4 NOW, THEREFORE,

5 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the 6 Commonwealth of Kentucky:

Section 1. The House of Representatives urges the President and the Congress of the United States to call for the immediate cessation of the invasion by the Tigray People's Liberation Front in the Afar and Amhara regions of Ethiopia and condemns in the strongest terms all violence against civilians. Furthermore, the House of Representatives encourages the strengthening of democratic institutions and improved respect for fundamental human rights in Ethiopia.

13 \rightarrow Section 2. The House of Representatives encourages the President and the 14 Congress of the United States to use every possible means at their command to examine 15 and reexamine the policies relating to the political conditions that exist in Ethiopia with a 16 view to ceasing hostilities among belligerents, protecting human rights, allowing 17 unfettered access for humanitarian relief, and cooperating with independent investigations 18 of credible atrocity allegations pertaining to the conflict in the Tigray and the Amhara and 19 Afar regions of Ethiopia, with the goal of lifting the unnecessary sanctions, under the 20 African Growth and Opportunity Act, on that otherwise friendly and historically 21 responsible country.

Section 3. In the pursuit of peace, the House of Representatives urges the President and the Congress of the United States to make certain that they refrain from acting in such a way as to endanger the unity and territorial integrity of Ethiopia, avoid setting up one Ethiopian ethnic group against another, pursue an unbiased approach to finding a peaceful solution, and allow Ethiopians to have a final say on how their nation is to proceed.
