- → Section 1. KRS 158.060 is amended to read as follows:
- 4 (1)Twenty (20) school days, or days in which teachers are actually employed in the 5 schoolroom, shall constitute a school month in the common schools.

- 7 (250) minutes of noninstructional planning time each five (5) day school 8 week, which shall be used at the teacher's discretion and may include but is
- 9 not limited to grading, instructional planning, curriculum development, and
- 10 outreach activities involving the teacher's students. If a school week does
- 11 not contain five (5) instructional days, the required minimum number of 12 minutes may be reduced proportionally.

- 19 Each full-time teacher shall receive additional compensation of at least his (c)20 or her usual hourly rate of pay for all duties assigned during the 21 noninstructional planning time required by paragraph (a) of this subsection 22 or duty-free lunch required by paragraph (b) of this subsection. A full-time 23 teacher may be assigned *duties*[to lunch room duty during the regularly 24 scheduled student lunch period] during any[only for an amount of time equal 25 to the] noninstructional time in excess of the minimum time required by 26 paragraph (a) of this subsection without additional compensation [fifty five 27
 - (55) minutes included in the teacher's daily schedule].

Kindergarten programs may be operated for less than six (6) hours without state board approval. The Kentucky Board of 16 17 Education, upon recommendation of the chief state school officer, shall develop and 18 approve regulations governing make up by school districts of whole days missed 19 due to emergencies, or partial days missed as a result of shortening regularly 20 scheduled school days due to emergencies.

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1 (b) The scholarship amount awarded to an eligible workforce student for an 2 academic term shall be the amount remaining after subtracting the student's 3 federal and state grants and scholarships from the maximum scholarship amount. The maximum scholarship amount shall be the per credit hour in-4 state tuition rate at the Kentucky Community and Technical College System 5 6 multiplied by the number of credit hours in which the student is enrolled and 7 the fees charged to the student. All moneys 17 included in the fund shall be appropriated for the purposes set forth in this section. 18 19 (c) Any unallotted or unencumbered balances in the trust fund shall be invested 20 as provided in KRS 42.500(9). Income earned from the investments shall be 21 credited to the trust fund. 22 (d) Notwithstanding KRS 45.229, any fund balance at the close of the fiscal year 23 shall not lapse but shall be carried forward to the next fiscal year and 24 continuously appropriated only for the purposes specified in this section.
