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A RESOLUTION adjourning the Senate in honor of Wendell Berry.

WHEREAS, Wendell Berry was born in Henry County, Kentucky, on August 5,
1934. The son of a lawyer and tobacco farmer, Wendell Berry has excelled as an
educator, novelist, poet, essayist, farmer, and activist; and

5 WHEREAS, Wendell Berry was educated in the Henry County Public Schools and 6 went to high school at Millersburg Military Institute. He attended the University of 7 Kentucky and earned a bachelor's degree in 1956 and a master's degree in 1957. Wendell 8 Berry received a Wallace Stegner Fellowship from Stanford University in 1958; and

9 WHEREAS, in 1957, Wendell Berry married Tanya Amyx and they raised two 10 children on their farm in Henry County. For over 50 years, the couple continue to live on 11 the farm. Their children have married and carry on the family farming tradition by 12 establishing homesteads in Trimble and Henry counties; and

WHEREAS, Wendell Berry taught at Stanford University, Georgetown College,
New York University, the University of Cincinnati, Bucknell University, and the
University of Kentucky. As a professor, Mr. Berry used the opportunity to contribute to
the academic community while teaching students vital skills and supporting them to reach
their potential; and

18 WHEREAS, Wendell Berry is a renowned published author across many genres. 19 He has written over 60 fiction and nonfiction novels, collections of essays, collections of 20 poetry, and collections of short stories. Through writing, Wendell Berry has addressed 21 issues relating to the environment, race, and economy. In 2018, Library of America 22 published editions of his writing: a fiction volume with his Port William series from the 23 Civil War to World War II, followed by a two-volume edition of his essays, 1969 – 1992, 24 and 1993 – 2017. Library of America has announced plans to publish another volume of 25 fiction and a volume of poetry. In 2022, Mr. Berry published two books: The Need to Be 26 Whole: Patriotism and the History of Prejudice and How it Went: Thirteen More Stories 27 of the Port William Membership; and

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1 WHEREAS, Wendell Berry has been the recipient of numerous awards and honors for his literary works and humanitarian efforts. Some of the more notable ones include a 2 3 Guggenheim Foundation Fellowship (1962), the Vachel Lindsay Prize for Poetry (1962), 4 a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship (1965), a National Institute of Arts and Letters 5 award for writing (1971), the Emily Clark Balch Prize from The Virginia Quarterly 6 Review (1974), the American Academy of Arts and Letters Jean Stein Award (1987), a 7 Lannan Foundation Award for Non-Fiction (1989), membership in the Fellowship of 8 Southern Writers (1991), the Ingersoll Foundation's T. S. Elliot Award (1994), the John 9 Hay Award (1997), the Lyndhurst Prize (1997), the Aitken-Taylor Award for Poetry from 10 The Sewanee Review (1998), the National Humanities Medal (2010), and the Richard C. 11 Holbrooke Distinguished Achievement Award of the Dayton Literary Peace Prize (2013). 12 Mr. Berry was awarded the Franklin D. Roosevelt Four Freedoms Award – the Freedom 13 Medal (2013), the Ivan Sandrof Lifetime Achievement Award by the National Books 14 Critics Circle (2016), the Henry Hope Reed Award from the University of Notre Dame 15 School of Architecture (2022), and the Franklin Founder Award from the Franklin 16 Celebration Committee (2022); and

WHEREAS, in 2012, Mr. Berry was chosen to give the National Endowment for
the Humanities Jefferson Lecture at the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C. In 2015,
Mr. Berry was inducted into the Kentucky Writers Hall of Fame; and

WHEREAS, Wendell Berry continues to work, writing about good agriculture, family farms, the importance of nature, small rural communities, and peaceableness. Mr. Berry believes that properly scaled farming is essential to healthy local economies, and that strong local economies are essential to our survival and the wellbeing of the country and the earth; and

25 WHEREAS, Wendell Berry's work advocating for small farmers and land-26 conserving communities continues at The Berry Center in New Castle, Kentucky;

27 NOW, THEREFORE,

Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

3 → Section 1. The members of the Senate recognize the literary and humanitarian
4 achievements of Wendell Berry and his service to Kentucky and the United States of
5 America.

6 → Section 2. When the Senate adjourns this day, it does so in honor of Wendell
7 Berry.
