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A RESOLUTION condemning any and all manifestations of antisemitism.

2 WHEREAS, the Jewish-American experience is a story of faith, fortitude, and 3 progress and is connected to key tenets of American identity; and

4 WHEREAS, generations of Jewish people have come to this Nation fleeing 5 oppression, discrimination, and persecution in search of a better life for themselves and 6 their children; and

WHEREAS, these Jewish-Americans have created lives for themselves and their
families and played indispensable roles in our Commonwealth's civic and community
life, making invaluable contributions to our Commonwealth through their leadership and
achievements; and

WHEREAS, on August 21, 1790, President George Washington sent a letter to the Hebrew Congregation of Newport, Rhode Island, expressing that the newly formed United States would be a Nation that "gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance" and that the Jewish people should "dwell in this land, [and] continue to merit and enjoy the good will of the other Inhabitants...and there shall be none to make him afraid"; and

WHEREAS, alongside this narrative of achievement and opportunity, there is also a
history, far older than the Nation itself, of racism, bigotry, and other forms of prejudice
manifesting in the scourge of antisemitism; and

WHEREAS, antisemitism is an insidious form of prejudice stretching back millennia that attacks the humanity of the Jewish people and has led to violence, destruction of lives and communities, and genocide; and

WHEREAS, conspiracy theories that Jews are uniquely evil and influential has led to mass killings of Jews throughout time, including the poisonous Nazi ideology that resulted in the murder of 6 million Jews, including 1.5 million Jewish children, and millions of other victims of the Nazis in Europe; and

27 WHEREAS, over the course of the past decade, Holocaust distortion and denial has

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1 grown in intensity; and

WHEREAS, recent surveys of Holocaust knowledge among millennials and Gen Z in the US found a shocking lack of historical information, including 63 percent of respondents who did not know that 6 million Jews were murdered during the Holocaust and 36 percent who thought that "two million or fewer Jews" were killed; and

6 WHEREAS, there is a documented and dangerous rise of antisemitism globally and 7 in the United States, where Jews are increasingly affected by the grotesque spread of 8 misinformation and lies including blame for the spread of COVID–19, false claims 9 including the control of the media and the financial system, accusations of dual loyalty, 10 and a multitude of negative stereotypes; and

WHEREAS, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, there has been a
troubling rise of antisemitism in the United States, including acts of violence,
intimidation, and radicalization on college campuses; and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Jewish Council's Antisemitism Report 2022 recorded over 30 serious incidents of antisemitism in the commonwealth in 2022, including attempted murder, threats against Jewish institutions, and use of dangerous tropes in politics and media; and

WHEREAS, the Kentucky Jewish Council's chairman, Rabbi Shlomo Litvin, presented the Antisemitism Report 2022 to members of the Kentucky Legislature, the Office of the Governor, the Office of the Attorney General, and the public, and included a call for action; and

WHEREAS, this rise in antisemitism is matched by a national trend, including a here the previous year, a terrorist taking members of the Jewish community hostage in Colleyville, Texas, and recurring violence on the streets of New York City; and

WHEREAS, this rise in hate has also been seen online, including promotion of antisemitic cults by NBA player Kyrie Irving, unhinged ranting by neo-Nazi Nick

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1 Fuentes, and most troubling, repeated threats and antisemitic diatribes by international 2 icon Kanye West, which inspired a tremendous wave of antisemitic sentiment; and 3 WHEREAS, this disturbing trend is also seen internationally, with violence against 4 Jews on the streets of London, Berlin, and across France, continued calls for Jewish 5 extermination and Holocaust denial from Iran, and frequent attacks on Jewish civilians in 6 Israel; and 7 WHEREAS, in 2021, Kentucky became the first state in the United States to accept 8 the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance's Definition of Antisemitism, 9 supported by the Jewish community around the world, as a tool to recognize and combat 10 this pernicious hatred; and 11 WHEREAS, the rise in antisemitism goes against the values of the United States of 12 America and the Commonwealth of Kentucky, as well as the morals of our society; 13 NOW, THEREFORE, 14 Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of 15 Kentucky: 16 \rightarrow Section 1. The members of the Senate both individually and collectively, hereby: 17 18 Call on elected officials, faith leaders, and civil society leaders to use their (1)19 bully pulpit to condemn and combat any and all manifestations of antisemitism; 20 Call on elected officials to condemn and combat any and all denials and (2)21 distortions of the Holocaust and to promote Holocaust and antisemitism education; 22 Call on social media platforms and local print media to institute stronger and (3)23 more significant efforts to measure and address antisemitism on their platforms while 24 protecting free speech concerns; 25 Commit to ensuring the safety, security, and dignity of Jewish Kentuckians in (4) 26 all aspects of their lives, including the workplace, college and university campuses, 27 synagogues, and at home, and the development of these measures; and

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- 1 (5) Support the right of Kentuckians to freely exercise their religious beliefs and 2 reject all forms of terror and hate.
