2	positive and beneficial future for all citizens.		
3	WHEREAS, since before its founding, the United States of America has benefited		
4	from and been enhanced by the integral role Black Americans have played in our		
5	country's history and contributions to the world; and		
6	WHEREAS, Black history does not begin in the Americas. It can be traced back to		
7	the great empires of West Africa beginning in A.D. 790, which aided the establishmen		
8	and survival of colonies in America and the New World, generally, and fought against		
9	European oppression; and		
10	WHEREAS, Black Americans have represented a significant portion of the		
11	American population, constituting nearly 20 percent at the time of the signing of the		
12	Declaration of Independence, almost all of whom, if not all, were victims of the largest		
13	forced deportation in recorded history, the transatlantic slave trade and resulting African		
14	diaspora. It is estimated over 10,000,000 free Africans were enslaved between the mid-		
15	fifteenth and nineteenth centuries during the diaspora; and		
16	WHEREAS, Black Americans continue to fight discrimination, structural racism,		
17	economic inequities, and benign and overt omission of the integral role they played in our		
18	country's rise to greatness; and		
19	WHEREAS, racism has long been and continues to be deeply rooted in our society;		
20	and		
21	WHEREAS, the Commonwealth of Kentucky has in the past celebrated racist		
22	individuals and institutions and, despite some progress, remains a Commonwealth with		
23	more work to do, including eliminating microaggressions and other forms of exclusion		
24	consistently endured by Black Kentuckians; and		
25	WHEREAS, historic and ongoing structural and systemic barriers in our society		
26	prevent Black Americans and communities of color from thriving in our country; and

3	WHEREAS, all of those with privileges and power should take full responsibility to			
4	continuously work in partnership with communities of color to recognize, examine, and			
5	address our own beliefs, biases, and privileges as we reaffirm our values of justice and			
6	equity; and			
7	WHEREAS, to avoid repeating the mistakes of the past we must hold our leaders			
8	accountable to evaluate themselves and the systems over which they have power to			
9	actively combat and dismantle racism and oppression in all forms and to embrace unity,			
10	build bridges between communities, and heal divisions; and			
11	WHEREAS, we all must take a pledge to advance reforms to address years of			
12	neglectful and apathetic policies that have led to poor health outcomes for communities			
13	of color; and			
14	WHEREAS, to help ensure a positive and beneficial future for all citizens, these			
15	must not simply be words on a page but must represent enduring structural change and a			
16	willingness to dismantle systems that perpetuate racial inequities to create justice for the			
17	Black comminity and all other minority communities; and			
18	WHEREAS, we should not accept apathy, indifference, or silence to such ongoing			
19	violence and inequities, which otherwise allows hatred, prejudice, and intolerance to			
20	fester and grow; and			
21	WHEREAS, we must break down our own personal barriers and embrace the need			
22	to have uncomfortable talks and real, honest, and transparent conversations directed			
23	towards addressing these injustices; and			
24	WHEREAS, these actions will allow us to learn from our history, prevent us from			
25	repeating the same mistakes, and arm us with the knowledge to create a meaningful			
26	impact for all citizens;
