A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 148 IS CREATED TO 4 **READ AS FOLLOWS:** 5 As used in Sections 1 to 5 of this Act, unless the context requires otherwise: 6 "Authority" or "KORRRA" means the Kentucky Ohio River Regional Recreation (1) 7 Authority established in Section 2 of this Act; 8 (2) "Board" means the board of directors of KORRRA; "County" means a county, charter county, urban-county government, unified 9 **(3)** 10 local government, or consolidated local government; 11 "Recreational Area" or "RA" means lands on which there is a system of (4) 12 recreational trails, including streams, rivers, and other waterways, and appurtenant facilities, including trailhead centers, parking areas, camping 13 14 facilities, picnic areas, historic or cultural interpretive sites, and other facilities in 15 Kentucky and designated by the KORRRA as part of the RA; 16 (5) "Land" means roads, water, watercourses, buildings, structures, and machinery or equipment thereon when attached to the realty; 17 "Landowner" means a tenant, lessee, occupant, or person in control of the 18 **(6)** 19 premises; 20 "Participating county" means a county that has qualified under subsection (5) of (7) 21 Section 2 of this Act; "Participating landowner" means a landowner who owns land in a participating 22 (8) 23 county and has a contractual agreement with the KORRRA for trail development 24 as part of the RA; "Recreational purposes" means all-terrain vehicle riding, bicycling, canoeing, 25 (9) hiking, horseback riding, hunting, kayaking, motorcycle riding, rock climbing, 26 27 fishing, swimming, archaeological activities, nature study, off-highway vehicle

1	driving, pleasure driving, watersports, winter sports, visiting or viewing historical
2	or scenic sites, and otherwise using land for purposes pertaining to recreation or
3	trail activities; and
4	(10) ''Target county'' means Ballard, Boone, Boyd, Bracken, Breckinridge, Campbell,
5	Carroll, Crittenden, Daviess, Gallatin, Greenup, Hancock, Hardin, Henderson,
6	Jefferson, Kenton, Lewis, Livingston, Mason, McCracken, Meade, Oldham,
7	Pendleton, Trimble, or Union County.
8	→SECTION 2. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 148 IS CREATED TO
9	READ AS FOLLOWS:
10	(1) The Kentucky Ohio River Regional Recreation Authority is hereby created and
11	established as an independent, de jure municipal corporation and political
12	subdivision of the Commonwealth and shall exercise all of the powers that a
13	corporation may lawfully exercise under the laws of the Commonwealth. The
14	authority shall be a public body corporate and politic and an instrumentality of
15	the Commonwealth, established with all the general corporate powers incidental
16	thereto. The authority shall be attached to the Kentucky Department for Local
17	Government for administrative purposes only. The authority shall be authorized
18	for an initial period of five (5) years from the effective date of this Act and may be
19	renewed by the General Assembly. The authority may adopt by laws and
20	administrative regulations, subject to KRS Chapter 13A, for the orderly conduct
21	<u>of its affairs.</u>
22	(2) The purpose of the authority is to establish, maintain, and promote a recreational
23	trail system throughout the RA to increase economic development, tourism, and
24	outdoor recreation for residents and visitors. The recreational trail system shall
25	be located with significant portions of the system situated on private property
26	made available for use through lease, license, easement, or other appropriate
27	legal form by willing landowners.

1	<u>(3)</u>	The authority shall be governed by a board of directors consisting of
2		representatives from participating counties and the Commonwealth as provided
3		in this section.
4	<u>(4)</u>	The authority and the board shall become operational when eleven (11) target
5		counties complete the requirements established by subsection (5)(a) of this
6		section. When at least eleven (11) target counties become participating counties,
7		the commissioner of the Department for Local Government shall notify the
8		county judge/executive or consolidated local government mayor of each of the
9		participating counties, as well as the board members described in subsection (6)
10		of this section, that the requirements have been met for the authority and board to
11		become operational. The commissioner shall also establish a date, time, and place
12		for an initial organizational meeting of the board, and shall serve as interim
13		chair of the initial organizational meeting until such time as a chair is elected.
14		The chair shall be a resident of a participating county.
15	<u>(5)</u>	Any target county may become a participating county upon adoption of a
16		resolution or ordinance by the governing body of the county specifically
17		approving the county's participation in the KORRRA and submission of the
18		adopted resolution or ordinance to:
19		(a) The commissioner of the Department for Local Government if the
20		resolution or ordinance is adopted prior to the KORRRA becoming
21		operational pursuant to subsection (4) of this section; or
22		(b) The KORRRA if the resolution or ordinance is adopted after KORRRA
23		becomes operational; or
24	<u>(6)</u>	The KORRRA board shall consist of the following members:
25		(a) The secretary of the Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet or his or her
26		<u>designee;</u>
27		(b) The commissioner of the Department for Local Government or his or her

1	designee;
2	(c) The commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources or his
3	or her designee;
4	(d) If an executive director of the authority has been employed under
5	subsection (10) of this section, he or she shall serve as a nonvoting member,
6	except in the event of a tie vote of the board;
7	(e) One (1) representative selected for each of the six (6) participating counties
8	as provided in subsection (8) of this section, who shall be either:
9	1. The county judge/executive or consolidated local government mayor;
10	<u>or</u>
11	2. The county judge/executive's designee or consolidated local
12	government mayor's designee, who shall be an individual involved
13	with economic development, tourism, recreation, or a related area
14	within the county;
15	(f) One (1) state Representative who is from the KORRRA region shall serve as
16	a nonvoting member, appointed to a two (2) year term by the Speaker of the
17	Kentucky House of Representatives, and shall not serve another term
18	consecutively with a prior term; and
19	(g) One (1) state Senator who is from the KORRRA region shall serve as a
20	nonvoting member, appointed to two (2) year term by the President of the
21	<u>Kentucky Senate.</u>
22	(7) A county judge/executive or consolidated local government mayor shall only
23	serve on the board while holding the office for which he or she was elected. If a
24	<u>county/judge executive or consolidated local government mayor ceases to serve as</u>
25	the county judge/executive or consolidated local government mayor prior to the
26	end of his or her term, he or she shall be removed from the board, and his or her
27	replacement as county judge/executive or consolidated local government mayor

1	shall serve on the board for the remainder of the term.
2	(8) (a) The nine (9) voting members of the board shall be:
3	1. The six (6) county judges/executive, consolidated local government
4	mayor, or their designees, from different KORRRA participating
5	counties as described in subsection (6)(e) of this section;
6	2. The secretary of the Tourism, Arts and Heritage Cabinet or his or her
7	<u>designee;</u>
8	3. The commissioner of the Department for Local Government or his or
9	her designee; and
10	4. The commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources
11	<u>or his or her designee.</u>
12	(b) The six (6) initial county representatives shall be the county
13	judges/executive or consolidated local government mayor of Boone,
14	Campbell, Daviess, Jefferson, Kenton, and Mason Counties or their
15	designees in that order. The first three (3) representatives listed shall serve a
16	three (3) year term as voting members, the next three (3) representatives
17	shall serve a two (2) year term as voting members, and the remaining three
18	(3) representatives shall serve a one (1) year term as voting members.
19	(c) After each term ends, the voting county representative shall be replaced by
20	one (1) of the county judges/executive, consolidated local government
21	mayor, or his or her designee from one (1) of the target counties whose
22	representative has not yet served as a voting member.
23	(d) After the third year of operation, each new voting member shall serve a
24	term of three (3) years, then step down and let a representative from a
25	county whose representative has not served as a voting member take his or
26	<u>her place.</u>
27	(e) Once representatives from all participating counties within RA have each

1		served one (1) term, the rotation shall begin again.
2	<u>(9)</u> (a)	The board shall meet at least once every quarter to elect officers, establish a
3		regular meeting schedule, and perform other duties as may be prescribed in
4		the authority's bylaws. The board chair may call special meetings at any
5		<u>time.</u>
6	<u>(b)</u>	Notice of each meeting shall be made in writing and delivered to board
7		members at least seven (7) days before the scheduled meeting date.
8		Electronic mail is an acceptable form of notice of special meetings, so long
9		as it is sent to directors at least seven (7) days before the scheduled meeting
10		<u>date.</u>
11	<u>(c)</u>	Accommodations shall be made for remote attendance for each board
12		<u>meeting, whether regular or special, through means such as video</u>
13		<u>conferencing, conference call, or similar services.</u>
14	<u>(d)</u>	The presence of a majority of the total voting members of the KORRRA
15		board shall constitute a quorum. Vacant board positions shall be counted
16		against the quorum total necessary for board action.
17	<u>(e)</u>	Board meetings shall be held exclusively within the KORRRA participating
18		counties, and each meeting shall be held in a different participating county
19		until every participating county has hosted a meeting, at which time the
20		<u>cycle shall begin again.</u>
21	<u>(10) The</u>	KORRRA board:
22	<u>(a)</u>	Shall elect a chair, vice chair, secretary, treasurer, and any other officers as
23		established in the bylaws of the board;
24	<u>(b)</u>	May appoint temporary and standing committees to accomplish the
25		purposes of Sections 1 to 5 of this Act and shall clearly describe the role,
26		responsibilities, and tenure of each committee so created;
27	<u>(c)</u>	Shall adopt bylaws for the management and regulation of its affairs and all

1	other matters necessary to effect proper management and accountability of
2	the board. The bylaws shall include, at a minimum, the following:
3	1. The powers and duties of the board's members and the manner and
4	number of officers to be elected from among the board members; and
5	2. The terms, conditions, and manner in which a board member will be
6	<u>removed.</u>
7	(d) Shall review and approve an annual budget;
8	(e) Shall ensure that all administrative costs for operating the authority are
9	paid from funds accruing to the authority. The authority, its board, and its
10	staff shall incur no liability or obligation beyond the extent to which
11	revenues have been provided under Sections 1 to 5 of this Act;
12	(f) May seek administrative and management assistance through written
13	agreement with state agencies, local area development districts, or local
14	governing bodies until such time as the board has secured sufficient
15	funding through grants, loans, fee systems, or any other funding source to
16	hire staff; and
17	(g) Shall employ an executive director to act as its chief executive officer to
18	serve at its will and pleasure.
19	(11) The authority shall comply with the provisions of KRS Chapter 65A.
20	(12) The executive director:
21	(a) Shall be a person who is domiciled in a KORRRA participating county;
22	(b) May, with permission of the board and approval of the commissioner of the
23	Department for Local Government or his or her designee, employ any other
24	hourly personnel considered necessary and retain temporary services. Pay
25	raises for any personnel shall require approval of the board and the
26	commissioner of the Department for Local Government or his or her
27	<u>designee;</u>

1	(c) Shall carry out plans to implement Sections 1 to 5 of this Act and to exercise
2	those powers enumerated in the bylaws of the board;
3	(d) Shall, along with any staff with responsibilities so delegated by the executive
4	director, ensure that all minutes, records, and orders of the authority and its
5	board are complete and available for public inspection, if necessary;
6	(e) Shall prepare narrative and financial reports of the authority's fiscal
7	obligations and submit these reports to the board at regularly scheduled
8	meetings or as otherwise directed; and
9	(f) May cast a tiebreaking vote in board decisions, but shall not be permitted to
10	cast a vote under any other circumstances. Until such time as an executive
11	director is hired, the chairperson of the board shall make the final
12	determination in the event of a tie vote of the board.
13	(13) The executive director, all full-time or part-time personnel, all seasonal
14	employees, and all contractual employees, if any, shall be paid from funds
15	accruing to the authority and authorized in a budget approved by the board,
16	unless the Department for Local Government has temporarily taken on the
17	responsibility of paying any of those employees.
18	(14) Board members shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for
19	actual and necessary travel expenses incurred in the performance of their duties,
20	subject to Finance and Administration Cabinet administrative regulations. Board
21	members may have their lodging reimbursed by KORRRA. Any reimbursement
22	requests exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) per person shall be submitted to
23	the Department for Local Government for approval.
24	→SECTION 3. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 148 IS CREATED TO
25	READ AS FOLLOWS:
26	(1) The KORRRA shall:
27	(a) Supervise the design and construction of trail systems within the RA and

1	provide all management functions for the trails and for any other property
2	built, acquired, or leased pursuant to its powers under Sections 1 to 5 of this
3	<u>Act;</u>
4	(b) Construct, develop, manage, maintain, operate, improve, renovate, finance,
5	or otherwise provide for recreational and trail-related activities and
6	facilities on designated public lands and private lands of participating
7	landowners who have voluntarily entered into use agreements with the
8	<u>board;</u>
9	(c) Promote the growth and development of the trail system, tourism, and the
10	hotel, restaurant, and entertainment industry within the RA and the
11	Commonwealth, through marketing RA to enhance local economic and
12	<u>tourism development;</u>
13	(d) Establish agreements with other persons, businesses, agencies,
14	organizations, or any other entity to levy a surcharge on tickets for events,
15	activities, festivals, or functions that are cosponsored with other entities and
16	contribute to the authority's operating revenue; and
17	(e) Procure insurance against any losses in connection with its property,
18	licenses, easements, or contracts, including hold-harmless agreements,
19	operations, or assets in such amounts and from such insurers as the board
20	<u>considers desirable.</u>
21	(2) The board's management program shall prioritize contractual arrangements with
22	private landowners to use land for recreational purposes, which shall not
23	diminish the participating landowner's interest, control, or profitability of the
24	land. If necessary to implement a comprehensive trail system, the board may also
25	contract with public landowners through contractual agreements that recognize
26	the primary mission for which the public entity controls and manages the land.
27	(3) The board may carry out any of the following to accomplish the purposes of

1	Sections 1 to 5 of this Act:
2	(a) Acquire, own, and hold property, and all interests therein, by deed,
3	purchase, gift, devise, bequest, or lease, or by transfer from the State
4	Property and Buildings Commission, except that the authority shall not
5	acquire property through the exercise of the power of eminent domain;
6	(b) Dispose of any property acquired in any manner provided by law;
7	(c) Lease property, whether as lessee or lessor, and acquire or grant through
8	easement, license, or other appropriate legal form, the right to develop and
9	use property and open it to the use of the public;
10	(d) Mortgage or otherwise grant security interests in its property;
11	(e) Maintain sinking funds and reserves as the board determines appropriate
12	for the purposes of meeting future monetary obligations and needs of the
13	authority; however, contributions to a sinking fund during a fiscal year
14	shall not exceed ten percent (10%) of the total fees collected during the
15	prior year;
16	(f) Sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, and complain and defend in any
17	<u>court;</u>
18	(g) Make contracts and execute instruments necessary for carrying on its
19	business, including contracts with any Kentucky state agency, the federal
20	government, or any person, individual, partnership, or corporation to effect
21	any or all of the purposes of Sections 1 to 5 of this Act as follows:
22	1. Contracts shall go through a public bidding process;
23	2. Contracts for one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or more shall be sent,
24	with at least three (3) bids from separate entities, to the Department
25	for Local Government for review and final approval;
26	3. Bids from entities with KORRRA participating counties are to be given
27	preference over competing bidders from outside of KORRRA

1	participating counties; and
2	4. If the Department for Local Government has not given a response in
3	the form of an approval or rejection after five (5) business days from
4	the date the department received the contract to be reviewed, it shall be
5	considered approved;
6	(h) Accept grants and loans from and enter into contracts and other
7	transactions with any federal agency, regional commission, or state agency
8	for accomplishing the purposes of Sections 1 to 5 of this Act;
9	(i) Borrow money and issue bonds, security interests, or notes;
10	(j) Provide for and secure the payment of the bonds, security interests, or
11	<u>notes;</u>
12	(k) Provide for the rights of the holders of the bonds, security interests, or
13	<u>notes;</u>
14	(1) Purchase, hold, and dispose of any of its bonds, security interests, or notes;
15	(m) Accept gifts or grants of property, security interests, money, labor, supplies,
16	<u>or services from any governmental unit or from any person, firm, or</u>
17	corporation;
18	(n) Establish a regional recreational trail system based upon contracts and
19	agreements with participating landowners. The board may enter into
20	contracts with landowners, and other persons holding an interest in the
21	land being used for its recreational facilities, to hold those landowners
22	harmless with respect to any claim in tort growing out of the use of the land
23	for public recreation or growing out of the recreational activities operated
24	or managed by the board from any claim, except a claim for damages
25	proximately caused by the willful or malicious conduct of the landowner or
26	any of his or her agents or employees;
27	(o) 1. Establish a fee-based system of permits, user registrations, or other

2		2. The fees may be imposed for access to and use	of the trails, parking
3		facilities, visitor centers, or other trail-related	recreational purpose
4		facilities or recreation activities that are part	of the RA or as an
5		admission to an event.	
6		3. The fees shall be decided by the board.	
7		4. The KORRRA shall retain and use the revent	ie from fees for any
8		purposes consistent with Sections 1 to 5 of thi	s Act and within the
9		guidelines in subsection (4) of this section;	
10		(p) Promulgate administrative regulations in accordance	<u>e with KRS Chapter</u>
11		13A to govern use and maintenance of the RA and	any other matters for
12		effective management of the RA;	
13		(q) Cooperate and contract with the regional recreation of	uthorities of Illinois,
14		Indiana, Ohio, West Virginia, and other contiguous	states to connect the
15		trails in Kentucky with similar recreation facilities in t	hose states; and
16		(r) Exercise all of the powers that a corporation may la	wfully exercise under
17		the laws of the Commonwealth.	
18	(4)	The fees collected by the KORRRA are to be used within the	<u>following guidelines;</u>
19		(a) To pay the salary of the executive director and all staff	of the KORRRA;
20		(b) To reimburse travel expenses of board members inclu	ding lodging, subject
21		to Finance and Administration Cabinet administrative	<u>regulations;</u>
22		(c) To fund the construction, maintenance, and all nece	ssary expenses of the
23		KORRRA trail system;	
24		(d) To maintain a sinking fund with contributions to the	fund during a fiscal
25		year not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the total fees	collected during the
26		prior year and the total fund not to exceed a balance	of one million dollars
27		(\$1,000,000) at the end of any fiscal year; and	

1	(e) Any remaining moneys not already appropriated in accordance with
2	Sections 1 to 5 of this Act at the end of the fiscal year are to be sent to the
3	Department for Local Government to be placed into an account to be used
4	exclusively for economic development grants in KORRRA participating
5	counties. These grants shall give preference to projects in economically
6	distressed counties, then to at-risk counties, then to transitional counties, as
7	defined by Kentucky Council of Area Development Districts.
8	(5) Nothing in this section shall be construed as a waiver of sovereign immunity.
9	→ SECTION 4. A NEW SECTION OF KRS CHAPTER 148 IS CREATED TO
10	READ AS FOLLOWS:
11	(1) Revenue bonds and revenue refunding bonds of the authority issued under
12	Sections 1 to 5 of this Act do not constitute a debt of the Commonwealth or of any
13	political subdivision of the Commonwealth or a pledge of the faith and credit of
14	the Commonwealth or of any political subdivision, but the bonds shall be payable
