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AN ACT relating to high school graduation requirements.

2 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

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→ Section 1. KRS 156.160 is amended to read as follows:

- 4 (1) With the advice of the Local Superintendents Advisory Council, the Kentucky
 5 Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations establishing
 6 standards which school districts shall meet in student, program, service, and
 7 operational performance. These regulations shall comply with the expected
 8 outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. Administrative
 9 regulations shall be promulgated for the following:
- (a) Courses of study for the different grades and kinds of common schools
 identifying the common curriculum content directly tied to the goals,
 outcomes, and assessment strategies developed under KRS 158.645,
 158.6451, and 158.6453 and distributed to local school districts and schools.
 The administrative regulations shall provide that [:
- 15 1. If a school offers American sign language, the course shall be accepted as
 16 meeting the foreign language requirements in common schools
 17 notwithstanding other provisions of law;
- If a school offers the Reserve Officers Training Corps program, the course
 shall be accepted as meeting the physical education requirement for high
 school graduation notwithstanding other provisions of law; and
- 3. Jevery public middle and high school's curriculum shall include instruction on
 the Holocaust and other cases of genocide, as defined by the United Nations
 Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide, that
 a court of competent jurisdiction, whether a court in the United States or the
 International Court of Justice, has determined to have been committed by
 applying rigorous standards of due process;
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(b) Courses of study or educational experiences available to students in all middle

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1		and high schools to fulfill the prerequisites for courses in advanced science
2		and mathematics as defined in KRS 158.845;
3	(c)	The acquisition and use of educational equipment for the schools as
4		recommended by the Council for Education Technology;
5	(d)	The minimum requirements for high school graduation in light of the
6		expected outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. The
7		administrative regulations[minimum requirements] shall:
8		<u>1.</u> Not include achieving any postsecondary readiness indicator as
9		described in KRS 158.6455 or any minimum score on a statewide
10		assessment administered under KRS 158.6453 as a graduation
11		requirement. Student scores from any assessment administered under
12		KRS 158.6453 that are determined by the department's technical
13		advisory committee to be valid and reliable at the individual level shall
14		be included on the student transcript. The department's technical
15		advisory committee shall submit its determination to the commissioner
16		of education and the Legislative Research Commission;
17		2. Permit satisfaction of any state or local board's physical education
18		course requirement through participation in:
19		a. Physically demanding interscholastic athletics, or similar
20		activities, including but not limited to cheerleading or marching
21		band, as determined by the local board of education; or
22		b. Completion of a Reserve Officers' Training Corps program
23		course; and
24		3. Permit satisfaction of any state or local board's foreign language
25		course requirement through completion of an American sign
26		language course, if offered by a school;
27	(e)	The requirements for an alternative high school diploma for students with

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- 1disabilities whose individualized education program indicates that, in2accordance with 20 U.S.C. sec. 1414(d)(1)(A):
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1. The student cannot participate in the regular statewide assessment; and

- An appropriate alternate assessment has been selected for the student based upon a modified curriculum and an individualized course of study;
- 7 (f) Taking and keeping a school census, and the forms, blanks, and software to be 8 used in taking and keeping the census and in compiling the required reports. 9 The board shall create a statewide student identification numbering system based on students' Social Security numbers. The system shall provide a 10 11 student identification number similar to, but distinct from, the Social Security 12 number, for each student who does not have a Social Security number or 13 whose parents or guardians choose not to disclose the Social Security number 14 for the student;
- (g) Sanitary and protective construction of public school buildings, toilets,
 physical equipment of school grounds, school buildings, and classrooms. With
 respect to physical standards of sanitary and protective construction for school
 buildings, the Kentucky Board of Education shall adopt the Uniform State
 Building Code;
- 20 (h) Medical inspection, physical and health education and recreation, and other 21 regulations necessary or advisable for the protection of the physical welfare 22 and safety of the public school children. The administrative regulations shall 23 set requirements for student health standards to be met by all students in 24 grades four (4), eight (8), and twelve (12) pursuant to the outcomes described 25 in KRS 158.6451. The administrative regulations shall permit a student who 26 received a physical examination no more than six (6) months prior to his or 27 her initial admission to Head Start to substitute that physical examination for

the physical examination required by the Kentucky Board of Education of all
 students upon initial admission to the public schools, if the physical
 examination given in the Head Start program meets all the requirements of the
 physical examinations prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education;

- (i) A vision examination by an optometrist or ophthalmologist that shall be
 required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative regulations
 shall require evidence that a vision examination that meets the criteria
 prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education has been performed. This
 evidence shall be submitted to the school no later than January 1 of the first
 year that a three (3), four (4), five (5), or six (6) year-old child is enrolled in a
 public school, public preschool, or Head Start program;
- 12 (j) 1. Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, a dental screening or examination by a dentist, dental hygienist, physician, registered nurse, 13 14 advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant that shall be 15 required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative regulations shall require evidence that a dental screening or examination 16 17 that meets the criteria prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education 18 has been performed. This evidence shall be submitted to the school no 19 later than January 1 of the first year that a five (5) or six (6) year-old 20 child is enrolled in a public school.

 2. A child shall be referred to a licensed dentist if a dental screening or
 22 examination performed by anyone other than a licensed dentist identifies
 23 the possibility of dental disease;
- 24 (k) The transportation of children to and from school;
- (1) The fixing of holidays on which schools may be closed and special days to be
 observed, and the pay of teachers during absence because of sickness or
 quarantine or when the schools are closed because of quarantine;

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2 districts under the management and control of the Kentucky Board of Education; 3 A uniform series of forms and blanks, educational and financial, including 4 (n) forms of contracts, for use in the several school districts; 5 6 (0)The disposal of real and personal property owned by local boards of 7 education; and 8 The development and implementation of procedures, for all students who are (p) 9 homeless children and youths as defined in 42 U.S.C. sec. 11434a(2), to do 10 the following: 11 1. Awarding and accepting of credit, including partial credit, for all 12 coursework satisfactorily completed by a student while enrolled at 13 another school; 14 2. Allowing a student who was previously enrolled in a course required for 15 graduation the opportunity, to the extent practicable, to complete the 16 course, at no cost to the student, before the beginning of the next school 17 year; 18 3. Awarding a diploma, at the student's request, by a district from which 19 the student transferred, if the student transfers schools at any time after 20 the completion of the student's second year of high school and the 21 student is ineligible to graduate from the district to which the student 22 transfers, but meets the graduation requirements of the district from 23 which the student transferred; and 24 Exempting the student from all coursework and other requirements 4. 25 imposed by the local board of education that are in addition to the 26 minimum requirements for high school graduation established by the 27 Kentucky Board of Education pursuant to paragraph (d) of this

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1			subsection in the district to which the student transfers, if the student
2			transfers schools at any time after the completion of the student's second
3			year of high school and the student is ineligible to graduate both from
4			the district to which the student transfers and the district from which the
5			student transferred.
6	(2)	(a)	At the request of a local board of education or a school council, a local school
7			district superintendent shall request that the Kentucky Board of Education
8			waive any administrative regulation promulgated by that board. Beginning in
9			the 1996-97 school year, a request for waiver of any administrative regulation
10			shall be submitted to the Kentucky Board of Education in writing with
11			appropriate justification for the waiver. The Kentucky Board of Education
12			may approve the request when the school district or school has demonstrated
13			circumstances that may include but are not limited to the following:
14			1. An alternative approach will achieve the same result required by the
15			administrative regulation;
16			2. Implementation of the administrative regulation will cause a hardship on
17			the school district or school or jeopardize the continuation or
18			development of programs; or
19			3. There is a finding of good cause for the waiver.
20		(b)	The following shall not be subject to waiver:
21			1. Administrative regulations relating to health and safety;
22			2. Administrative regulations relating to civil rights;
23			3. Administrative regulations required by federal law; and
24			4. Administrative regulations promulgated in accordance with KRS
25			158.6451, 158.6453, 158.6455, and this section, relating to measurement
26			of performance outcomes and determination of successful districts or
27			schools, except upon issues relating to the grade configuration of

1			schools.
2		(c)	Any waiver granted under this subsection shall be subject to revocation upon
3			a determination by the Kentucky Board of Education that the school district or
4			school holding the waiver has subsequently failed to meet the intent of the
5			waiver.
6	(3)	Any	private, parochial, or church school may voluntarily comply with curriculum,
7		certi	fication, and textbook standards established by the Kentucky Board of
8		Edu	cation and be certified upon application to the board by such schools.
9	(4)	Any public school that violates the provisions of KRS 158.854 shall be subject to a	
10		pena	lty to be assessed by the commissioner of education as follows:
11		(a)	The first violation shall result in a fine of no less than one (1) week's revenue
12			from the sale of the competitive food;
13		(b)	Subsequent violations shall result in a fine of no less than one (1) month's
14			revenue from the sale of the competitive food;
15		(c)	"Habitual violations," which means five (5) or more violations within a six (6)
16			month period, shall result in a six (6) month ban on competitive food sales for
17			the violating school; and
18		(d)	Revenue collected as a result of the fines in this subsection shall be
19			transferred to the food service fund of the local school district.

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
