1 AN ACT relating to coal mining.

## 2 Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

- 3 → Section 1. KRS 351.010 is amended to read as follows:
- 4 (1) As used in this chapter, unless the context requires otherwise:
- 5 (a) "Adulterated specimen" means a specimen containing a substance that is not a normal constituent or containing an endogenous substance at a concentration
- 7 that is not a normal physiological concentration;
- 8 (b) "Approved" means that a device, apparatus, equipment, or machinery, or
  9 practice employed in the mining of coal has been approved by the
  10 commissioner of the Department for Natural Resources;
- 11 (c) "Assistant mine foreman" means a certified person designated to assist the
  12 mine foreman in the supervision of a portion or the whole of a mine or of the
  13 persons employed therein;
  - (d) "Commercial mine" means any coal mine from which coal is mined for sale, commercial use, or exchange. This term shall in no instance be construed to include a mine where coal is produced for own use;
- 17 (e) "Commission" means the Mine Safety Review Commission created by KRS 351.1041;
- 19 (f) "Commissioner" means commissioner of the Department for Natural 20 Resources;
- 21 (g) "Department" means the Department for Natural Resources;
- 22 (h) "Drift" means an opening through strata or coal seams with opening grades 23 sufficient to permit coal to be hauled therefrom or which is used for the 24 purpose of ventilation, drainage, ingress, egress, and other purposes in 25 connection with the mining of coal;
- 26 (i) "Excavations and workings" means the excavated portions of a mine;
- 27 (j) "Fire boss" (often referred to as mine examiner) means a person certified as a

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1		mine foreman or assistant mine foreman who is designated by management to
2		examine a mine or part of a mine for explosive gas or other dangers before a
3		shift crew enters;
4	(k)	"Gassy mine." All mines shall be classified as gassy or gaseous;
5	(1)	"Illicit substances" includes prescription drugs used illegally or in excess of
6		therapeutic levels as well as illegal drugs;
7	(m)	"Intake air" means air that has not passed through the last working place of
8		the split or by the unsealed entrances to abandoned workings and by analysis
9		contains not less than nineteen and one-half percent (19.5%) oxygen, no
10		dangerous quantities of flammable gas, and no harmful amounts of poisonous
11		gas or dust;
12	(n)	"Licensee" means any owner, operator, lessee, corporation, partnership, or
13		other person who procures a license from the department to operate a coal
14		mine;
15	(0)	"Medical review officer" or "MRO" means a licensed physician with
16		knowledge of substance abuse disorders, laboratory testing, chain of custody,
17		collection procedures, and the ability to verify positive, confirmed test results.
18		The MRO shall possess the necessary medical training to interpret and
19		evaluate a positive test result in relation to the person's medical history or any
20		other relevant biomedical information;
21	(p)	"Mine" means any open pit or any underground workings from which coal is
22		produced for sale, exchange, or commercial use, and all shafts, slopes, drifts,
23		or inclines leading thereto, and includes all buildings and equipment, above or
24		below the surface of the ground, used in connection with the workings.
25		Workings that are adjacent to each other and under the same management, but
26		which are administered as distinct units, shall be considered a separate mine;
27	(q)	"Mine foreman" means a certified person whom the licensee or superintendent

1		places in charge of the workings of the mine and of the persons employed
2		therein;
3	(r)	"Mine manager" means a certified or noncertified person whom the licensee
4		places in charge of a mine or mines and whose duties include but are not
5		limited to operations at the mine or mines and supervision of personnel when
6		qualified to do so;
7	(s)	"Open-pit mine" shall include open excavations and open-cut workings,
8		including but not limited to auger operations and highwall mining systems for
9		the extraction of coal. However, excavation of refuse from a coarse coal
10		refuse fill for reprocessing of the refuse, which is permitted and bonded under
11		KRS Chapter 350 and is regulated by the Mine Safety and Health
12		Administration, shall not be required to obtain a license under this chapter;
13	(t)	"Operator" means the licensee, owner, lessee, or other person who operates or
14		controls a coal mine;
15	(u)	"Permissible" refers to any equipment, device, or explosive that has been
16		approved by the United States Bureau of Mines, the Mining Enforcement and
17		Safety Administration, or the Mine Safety and Health Administration and that
18		meets all requirements, restrictions, exceptions, limitations, and conditions
19		attached to the classification by the approving agency;
20	(v)	"Preshift examination" means the examination of a mine or any portion
21		thereof where miners are scheduled to work or travel, which shall be
22		conducted not more than three (3) hours before any oncoming shift;
23	(w)	"Return air" means air that has passed through the last active working place
24		on each split, or air that has passed through abandoned, inaccessible, or
25		pillared workings;
26	(x)	"Serious physical injury" means an injury which has a reasonable potential to
27		cause death;

1		(y)	"Shaft" means a vertical opening through the strata that is used in connection
2			with the mining of coal, for the purpose of ventilation or drainage, or for
3			hoisting men, coal, or materials;
4		(z)	"Slope" means an inclined opening used for the same purpose as a shaft;
5		(aa)	"Superintendent" means the person who, on behalf of the licensee, has
6			immediate supervision of one (1) or more mines;
7		(ab)	"Supervisory personnel" means a person certified under the provisions of this
8			chapter to assist in the supervision of a portion or the whole of the mine or of
9			the persons employed therein;
10		(ac)	"Division" means the Division of Mine Safety;
11		(ad)	"Director" means the director of the Division of Mine Safety;
12		(ae)	"Probation" means the status of a certification or license issued by the
13			Division of Mine Safety that conditions the validity of the certification or
14			license upon compliance with orders of the Mine Safety Review Commission;
15			<del>[and]</del>
16		(af)	"Final order of the commission" means an order which has not been appealed
17			to the Franklin Circuit Court within thirty (30) days of entry, or an order
18			affirming the commission's order that has been entered by any court within
19			the Commonwealth and for which all appeals have been exhausted:
20		<u>(ag)</u>	"Emergency medical technician" has the same meaning as in KRS
21			311A.010; and
22		<u>(ah)</u>	"Mine emergency technician" means a person that holds a current surface
23			or underground miner's certification in the Commonwealth and that has
24			been certified as having met all the requirements prescribed by the Division
25			of Mine Safety for that certification.
26	(2)	Exce	ept as the context otherwise requires, this chapter applies only to commercial
27		coal mines.

3		<b>→</b> Se	ection 2. KRS 351.127 is amended to read as follows:		
4	(1)	Certi	fied emergency medical technicians or mine emergency technicians shall be		
5		empl	oyed at every licensed coal mine whose employees are actively engaged in the		
6		extra	ction, production, or preparation of coal. Persons employed as mine		
7		emer	gency technicians shall be trained in a manner established in an administrative		
8		regul	regulation promulgated by the department. Persons seeking certification as a mine		
9		emergency medical technician or mine emergency technician shall be subject to the			
10		follo	wing additional requirements:		
11		(a)	All persons seeking certification as a mine emergency technician shall		
12			demonstrate drug- and alcohol-free status in accordance with KRS 351.182		
13			and 351.183;		
14		(b)	The drug and alcohol testing for those seeking certification as mine		
15			emergency technicians shall be administered prior to the examination for the		
16			certification, in accordance with KRS 351.182 and 351.183; and		
17		(c)	Certification as a mine emergency technician shall not be issued until the		
18			results of the drug and alcohol testing have been obtained. Notification shall		
19			be given to the person in accordance with KRS 351.184.		
20	(2)	These	e emergency medical technicians or mine emergency technicians shall be		
21		empl	oyed in the following manner:		
22		(a)	Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, for every		
23			shift engaged in the production of coal at a surface or underground coal		
24			mining operation, there shall be:		
25			1. One (1) emergency medical or mine emergency technician employed		
26			on every shift with fifteen (15) or fewer miners employed on the shift;		
27			and		

> 2. Two (2) emergency medical or mine emergency technicians employed on every shift with more than fifteen (15) but fewer than fifty-one (51) miners employed on the shift; and [At least two (2) emergency medical or mine emergency technicians shall be employed on every shift engaged in the production of coal, and at least one (1) emergency medical or mine emergency technician shall be employed on every nonproduction shift];

(b) For underground mines only, on every shift with more than fifty (50) miners working on the shift, there shall be one (1) additional emergency medical technician or mine emergency technician for each additional fifty (50) miners, or any portion thereof, engaged in the extraction, production, or preparation of coal and [For underground mines], at least one (1) fof the two (2) Jemergency <u>medical</u> or mine emergency <u>technician</u> [technicians] shall be underground at all times while miners are working in the mines regardless of how many miners are working on the shift. An additional emergency medical technician or mine emergency technician shall be employed for every additional fifty (50), or any portion thereof, employees per shift who are actively engaged in the extraction, production, or preparation of coal.]

- If these emergency medical technicians or mine emergency technicians are also employed in other capacities at the coal mine, they shall be available for quick response to emergencies and shall have available to them at all times the equipment necessary to respond to emergencies, as prescribed by the commissioner.
- 23 (4) If the licensee selects existing employees to be trained as emergency medical 24 technicians or mine emergency technicians, the employees selected shall be paid 25 their regular wages during training.
- 26 (5) Certified emergency medical technicians and mine emergency technicians shall receive annual retraining in the manner established in an administrative regulation

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1 promulgated by the department, during which they shall receive their regular

wages.
