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1 A JOINT RESOLUTION directing the Transportation Cabinet to study the cost and

- 2 benefits of increasing the maximum interstate highway speed limit.
- WHEREAS, on November 28, 1995, the National Highway System Designation
- 4 Act was signed into law. It repealed the requirement that states, as a condition of
- 5 receiving federal-aid highway assistance, adhere to a national maximum speed limit of 65
- 6 miles per hour;
- WHEREAS, states now have the power to set maximum speed limits on interstate
- 8 highways within their borders;
- 9 WHEREAS, 18 states have set maximum interstate speed limits over 70 miles per
- 10 hour;
- WHEREAS, rural states and areas are more likely to have higher maximum speed
- 12 limits on interstate highways, and most of Kentucky's interstate highways traverse rural
- 13 areas;
- WHEREAS, increasing the maximum speed limit has the potential to make travel
- easier for Kentucky's motorists; and
- WHEREAS, any potential change in the maximum speed limit should be studied by
- 17 professional engineers;
- 18 NOW, THEREFORE,
- 19 Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:
- 20 → Section 1. The Transportation Cabinet is directed to study the cost and benefits
- 21 of increasing the maximum interstate highway speed limit.
- → Section 2. At a minimum, the study shall:
- 23 (1) Determine current average speeds on Kentucky interstate highways;
- 24 (2) Analyze the effect of increased maximum speed limits on traffic congestion,
- 25 motor vehicle collisions, and passenger injuries and fatalities; and
- 26 (3) Identify potential sections of Kentucky's interstate system for which an
- increased maximum speed limit is appropriate.

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→ Section 3. The Transportation Cabinet shall make a recommendation regarding

- 2 increasing speed limits on interstate highways to the Interim Joint Committee on
- 3 Transportation by December 1, 2025.
