A RESOLUTION urging elementary and secondary schools to include information
 about type 1 diabetes if they provide health-related information to the parents or legal
 guardians of students in grades K-12.

WHEREAS, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention the number of young people in Kentucky and the United States with type 1 diabetes is expected to increase more rapidly in the future, possibly by as much as 65 percent in the next 40 years; and

8 WHEREAS, type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune disease for which medical guidelines 9 published by the American Diabetes Association recommend proactive screening to 10 detect and identify the risk of developing the disease as a means to prevent diabetic 11 ketoacidosis (DKA), a life-threatening complication associated with type 1 diabetes, and 12 other costly medical events associated with a type 1 diabetes diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, Kentucky's 2021 Diabetes Report finds that DKA, a complication of diabetes in which ketones or fatty acids builds up in the blood due to a lack of insulin, accounted for 34 percent of all hospitalizations with an average hospital stay of three days, an average charge of \$23,901, and a total average billed charges of \$93,117,008 for Kentucky's Medicaid program; and

WHEREAS, youth diabetes represents the second most costly condition covered by
Kentucky's Medicaid program, with an annual average cost per patient of \$3,922 per year
in 2021; and

WHEREAS, the increasing prevalence of type 1 diabetes, a lifelong autoimmune condition requiring the daily use of insulin injections and other costly medical interventions, presents a unique public health and health financing challenge to the Commonwealth of Kentucky;

25 NOW, THEREFORE,

26 Be it resolved by the House of Representatives of the General Assembly of the 27 Commonwealth of Kentucky: Section 1. The members of the House of Representatives hereby urge
elementary and secondary schools that provide information related to medication policy
or other school health issues at the beginning of each school year to the parents or legal
guardians of students in grades K-12 to include:

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(1) A description of type 1 diabetes;

6 (2) A description of the risk factors and warning signs associated with type 1
7 diabetes;

8 (3) A recommendation that the parents or guardians of students displaying 9 warning signs associated with type 1 diabetes should consult with the student's primary 10 care provider to determine if immediate screening for type 1 diabetes is appropriate;

(4) A description of the screening process for type one diabetes and the
significance of stage 1, stage 2, and stage 3; and

(5) A recommendation that following a type 1 diabetes diagnosis, parents or
guardians should consult with the pupil's primary care provider to develop an appropriate
treatment plan.

Section 2. The Department of Education in cooperation with the Department for
Public Health is encouraged to develop and make available the information described in
Section 1 of this Act.
