1	A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION directing the Legislative Research Commission
2	to study the impact of administrative regulations on the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
3	WHEREAS, administrative regulations are essential to allow the executive branch
4	to carry out its constitutional duties; and
5	WHEREAS, limits on administrative authority are imperative so that a government
6	does not encroach on the liberties of its people; and
7	WHEREAS, clear and precise language defining the boundaries of executive
8	authority is essential to ensure that a government agency does not exceed its authority;
9	and
10	WHEREAS, administrative regulations that do not clearly define parameters of
11	authority create confusion; and
12	WHEREAS, administrative regulations that are unclear may lead to inadvertent
13	noncompliance on the part of citizens and governmental entities; and
14	WHEREAS, if government agencies overstep the bounds of their statutory
15	authority, an abuse of power and a lack of recourse for citizens diminishes confidence in
16	the rule of law;
17	NOW, THEREFORE,
18	Be it resolved by the Senate of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of
19	Kentucky, the House of Representatives concurring therein:
20	→Section 1. The staff of the Legislative Research Commission is directed to
21	complete a study of the effectiveness of administrative regulations in the Commonwealth
22	of Kentucky.
23	Section 2. The study under Section 1 of this Resolution shall include an analysis
24	of:
25	(1) Whether any statutes authorizing the promulgation of administrative
26	regulations are unclear, and what changes are needed to provide more clarity;
27	(2) Whether any administrative regulations are unclear or do not conform to

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statutory authority, and what changes will provide clarity to unclear regulations or bring
 nonconforming regulations into compliance; and

- 3 (3) Whether a truncated injunctive procedure could be added into KRS 13A.130
 4 to expedite relief to a citizen or entity aggrieved by a violation of that section.
- Section 3. The study described in Sections 1 and 2 of this Resolution shall be
 submitted to the Interim Joint Committee on State Government no later than December 1,
 2024.
- Section 4. Provisions of this Resolution to the contrary notwithstanding, the
 Legislative Research Commission shall have the authority to alternatively assign the
 issues identified herein to an interim joint committee or subcommittee thereof, and to
 designate a study completion date.
