

1 AN ACT relating to school foods.

2 ***Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:***

3 ➔Section 1. KRS 158.854 is amended to read as follows:

4 (1) The Kentucky Board of Education shall promulgate an administrative regulation in
5 accordance with KRS Chapter 13A to specify the minimum nutritional standards
6 for all foods and beverages that are sold outside the National School Breakfast and
7 National School Lunch programs, whether in vending machines, school stores,
8 canteens, or a la carte cafeteria sales. Minimum nutritional standards shall be based
9 on the most recent edition of the United States Department of Agriculture's Dietary
10 Guidelines for Americans. The administrative regulation shall address serving size,
11 sugar, and fat content of the foods and beverages. School districts may impose more
12 stringent standards than the standards implemented under the administrative
13 regulation. A school shall follow the minimum standards specified in the
14 administrative regulation unless a waiver has been requested under KRS 156.161 by
15 the school district for the school from the Kentucky Board of Education.
16 Notwithstanding the duration of a waiver granted under KRS 156.161, any waiver
17 approved by the Board of Education relating to this section shall be reviewed on an
18 annual basis.

19 (2) As used in this section:

20 (a) "Competitive food" means any food or beverage item sold in competition with
21 the National School Breakfast and National School Lunch programs. The term
22 does not include any food or beverage sold a la carte in the cafeteria;

23 (b) "School day" means the period of time between the arrival of the first student
24 at the school building and the end of the last instructional period;~~and~~

25 (c) "School-day-approved beverage" means water, one hundred percent (100%)
26 fruit juice, lowfat milk, and any beverage that contains no more than ten (10)
27 grams of sugar per serving; ***and***

1 (d) "Student-based enterprise" means a district-approved program operated by
2 a school district's students as part of a course designed to provide students
3 with knowledge and experience of the operation of a business.

4 (3) No school may sell competitive foods or beverages from the time of the arrival of
5 the first student at the school building until thirty (30) minutes after the last lunch
6 period.

7 (4) Only school-day-approved beverages shall be sold in elementary schools during the
8 school day in vending machines, school stores, canteens, or fundraisers that sell
9 beverages by students, teachers, or groups.

10 (5) Nothing in this section or KRS 158.850 shall be construed to limit the sale of any
11 foods or beverages by fundraisers off school property.

12 (6) Notwithstanding subsection (3) of this section, a local board of education may
13 identify a student-based enterprise to sell competitive foods throughout the school
14 day. The local board may establish policies for the operation of the student-based
15 enterprise and for the use of the proceeds from the operation of the student-based
16 enterprise.

17 ➔Section 2. KRS 156.160 is amended to read as follows:

18 (1) With the advice of the Local Superintendents Advisory Council, the Kentucky
19 Board of Education shall promulgate administrative regulations establishing
20 standards which school districts shall meet in student, program, service, and
21 operational performance. These regulations shall comply with the expected
22 outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. Administrative
23 regulations shall be promulgated for the following:

24 (a) Courses of study for the different grades and kinds of common schools
25 identifying the common curriculum content directly tied to the goals,
26 outcomes, and assessment strategies developed under KRS 158.645,
27 158.6451, and 158.6453 and distributed to local school districts and schools.

1 The administrative regulations shall provide that:

- 2 1. If a school offers American sign language, the course shall be accepted
3 as meeting the foreign language requirements in common schools
4 notwithstanding other provisions of law;
- 5 2. If a school offers the Reserve Officers Training Corps program, the
6 course shall be accepted as meeting the physical education requirement
7 for high school graduation notwithstanding other provisions of law;
- 8 3. Every public middle and high school's curriculum shall include
9 instruction on the Holocaust and other cases of genocide, as defined by
10 the United Nations Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the
11 Crime of Genocide, that a court of competent jurisdiction, whether a
12 court in the United States or the International Court of Justice, has
13 determined to have been committed by applying rigorous standards of
14 due process; and
- 15 4. Beginning in the 2025-2026 school year, cursive writing shall be
16 included as a course of study in all elementary schools and shall be
17 designed to ensure proficiency in cursive writing by the end of grade
18 five (5);
- 19 (b) Courses of study or educational experiences available to students in all middle
20 and high schools to fulfill the prerequisites for courses in advanced science
21 and mathematics as defined in KRS 158.845;
- 22 (c) The acquisition and use of educational equipment for the schools as
23 recommended by the Council for Education Technology;
- 24 (d) The minimum requirements for high school graduation in light of the
25 expected outcomes for students and schools set forth in KRS 158.6451. The
26 minimum requirements shall not include achieving any postsecondary
27 readiness indicator as described in KRS 158.6455 or any minimum score on a

- 1 statewide assessment administered under KRS 158.6453. Student scores from
2 any assessment administered under KRS 158.6453 that are determined by the
3 department's technical advisory committee to be valid and reliable at the
4 individual level shall be included on the student transcript. The department's
5 technical advisory committee shall submit its determination to the
6 commissioner of education and the Legislative Research Commission;
- 7 (e) The requirements for an alternative high school diploma for students with
8 disabilities whose individualized education program indicates that, in
9 accordance with 20 U.S.C. sec. 1414(d)(1)(A):
- 10 1. The student cannot participate in the regular statewide assessment; and
 - 11 2. An appropriate alternate assessment has been selected for the student
12 based upon a modified curriculum and an individualized course of
13 study;
- 14 (f) Taking and keeping a school census, and the forms, blanks, and software to be
15 used in taking and keeping the census and in compiling the required reports.
16 The board shall create a statewide student identification numbering system
17 based on students' Social Security numbers. The system shall provide a
18 student identification number similar to, but distinct from, the Social Security
19 number, for each student who does not have a Social Security number or
20 whose parents or guardians choose not to disclose the Social Security number
21 for the student;
- 22 (g) Sanitary and protective construction of public school buildings, toilets,
23 physical equipment of school grounds, school buildings, and classrooms. With
24 respect to physical standards of sanitary and protective construction for school
25 buildings, the Kentucky Board of Education shall adopt the Uniform State
26 Building Code;
- 27 (h) Medical inspection, physical and health education and recreation, and other

1 regulations necessary or advisable for the protection of the physical welfare
2 and safety of the public school children. The administrative regulations shall
3 set requirements for student health standards to be met by all students in
4 grades four (4), eight (8), and twelve (12) pursuant to the outcomes described
5 in KRS 158.6451. The administrative regulations shall permit a student who
6 received a physical examination no more than six (6) months prior to his or
7 her initial admission to Head Start to substitute that physical examination for
8 the physical examination required by the Kentucky Board of Education of all
9 students upon initial admission to the public schools, if the physical
10 examination given in the Head Start program meets all the requirements of the
11 physical examinations prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education;

12 (i) A vision examination by an optometrist or ophthalmologist that shall be
13 required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative regulations
14 shall require evidence that a vision examination that meets the criteria
15 prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education has been performed. This
16 evidence shall be submitted to the school no later than January 1 of the first
17 year that a three (3), four (4), five (5), or six (6) year-old child is enrolled in a
18 public school, public preschool, or Head Start program;

19 (j) 1. Beginning with the 2010-2011 school year, a dental screening or
20 examination by a dentist, dental hygienist, physician, registered nurse,
21 advanced practice registered nurse, or physician assistant that shall be
22 required by the Kentucky Board of Education. The administrative
23 regulations shall require evidence that a dental screening or examination
24 that meets the criteria prescribed by the Kentucky Board of Education
25 has been performed. This evidence shall be submitted to the school no
26 later than January 1 of the first year that a five (5) or six (6) year-old
27 child is enrolled in a public school.

- 1 2. A child shall be referred to a licensed dentist if a dental screening or
2 examination performed by anyone other than a licensed dentist identifies
3 the possibility of dental disease;
- 4 (k) The transportation of children to and from school;
- 5 (l) The fixing of holidays on which schools may be closed and special days to be
6 observed, and the pay of teachers during absence because of sickness or
7 quarantine or when the schools are closed because of quarantine;
- 8 (m) The preparation of budgets and salary schedules for the several school
9 districts under the management and control of the Kentucky Board of
10 Education;
- 11 (n) A uniform series of forms and blanks, educational and financial, including
12 forms of contracts, for use in the several school districts;
- 13 (o) The disposal of real and personal property owned by local boards of
14 education; and
- 15 (p) The development and implementation of procedures, for all students who are
16 homeless children and youths as defined in 42 U.S.C. sec. 11434a(2), to do
17 the following:
- 18 1. Awarding and accepting of credit, including partial credit, for all
19 coursework satisfactorily completed by a student while enrolled at
20 another school;
- 21 2. Allowing a student who was previously enrolled in a course required for
22 graduation the opportunity, to the extent practicable, to complete the
23 course, at no cost to the student, before the beginning of the next school
24 year;
- 25 3. Awarding a diploma, at the student's request, by a district from which
26 the student transferred, if the student transfers schools at any time after
27 the completion of the student's second year of high school and the

- 1 student is ineligible to graduate from the district to which the student
2 transfers, but meets the graduation requirements of the district from
3 which the student transferred; and
- 4 4. Exempting the student from all coursework and other requirements
5 imposed by the local board of education that are in addition to the
6 minimum requirements for high school graduation established by the
7 Kentucky Board of Education pursuant to paragraph (d) of this
8 subsection in the district to which the student transfers, if the student
9 transfers schools at any time after the completion of the student's second
10 year of high school and the student is ineligible to graduate both from
11 the district to which the student transfers and the district from which the
12 student transferred.
- 13 (2) Any private, parochial, or church school may voluntarily comply with curriculum,
14 certification, and textbook standards established by the Kentucky Board of
15 Education and be certified upon application to the board by such schools.
- 16 (3) (a) Any public school that violates the provisions of KRS 158.854 shall be
17 subject to a penalty to be assessed by the commissioner of education as
18 follows:
- 19 1.[(a)] The first violation shall result in a fine of no less than one (1)
20 week's revenue from the sale of the competitive food;
- 21 2.[(b)] Subsequent violations shall result in a fine of no less than one (1)
22 month's revenue from the sale of the competitive food;
- 23 3.[(c)] "Habitual violations," which means five (5) or more violations
24 within a six (6) month period, shall result in a six (6) month ban on
25 competitive food sales for the violating school; and
- 26 4.[(d)] Revenue collected as a result of the fines in this subsection shall be
27 transferred to the food service fund of the local school district.

- 1 (b) Penalties under this subsection shall not be applicable to a student-based
2 enterprise operating under subsection (6) of Section 1 of this Act.
