Potential Cost							

This legislation redefines animal torture to include neglect and physical abuse that results in death or serious physical injury.

Under current legislation, Torture of a Dog or Cat 1st Offense is a Class A misdemeanor. This legislation proposes raising the penalty to a Class D felony. Additionally, if a first offense results in the death of or serious physical injury to a dog or cat, the mandatory minimum term of Class D felony imprisonment shall be five (5) years, which term shall not be suspended, probated, conditionally discharged, or subject to any other form of early release.

This legislation proposes raising the penalty of Torture of a Dog or Cat 2nd or subsequent offense from a Class D felony to a Class C felony. The penalty shall also be a Class C felony if the offense 1) involves physical abuse that results in the death of or serious physical injury to a dog or cat and is committed in the presence of a minor, 2) is committed by an employee or agent of an animal shelter, or 3) is committed by an employee or business that works with dogs or cats commercially. The offense would have a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of ten (10) years, which term shall not be suspended, probated, conditionally discharged, or subject to any other form of early release.

Actions against more than one animal shall be charged as individual counts and individuals convicted of more than one offense shall be subject to consecutive sentences.

Data from AOC shows eleven (11) cases of felony Torture of Dog or Cat with Serious Physical Injury or Death and ten (10) cases of misdemeanor Torture of a Dog or Cat 1st Offense in CY2014-2016.

Currently the Department has four (4) offenders on supervision for misdemeanor Torture of a Dog or Cat 1st Offense. Under the proposed legislation, offenders convicted of Torture of a Dog or Cat 1st Offense would be subject to a Class D felony penalty, and if incarcerated, subject to state incarceration costs of \$11,464.07 per year per inmate.

The Department currently has one (1) offender incarcerated for felony Torture of a Dog or Cat with Serious Physical Injury or Death. Under the proposed legislation, an offender convicted of felony Torture of a Dog or Cat with Serious Physical Injury or Death would not be eligible for community supervision. Five (5) years of incarceration would cost \$57,320.35 for one (1) offender. Currently the Department has six (6) offenders incarcerated for Class D Torture of a Dog or Cat 2nd Offense. Under the proposed legislation, offenders convicted of Torture of a Dog or Cat 2nd or subsequent Offense would be subject to Class C felonies. These offenders, in addition to certain 1st Offense offenders, would be subject to a mandatory minimum term of imprisonment of ten (10) years which is not eligible for community supervision. A Class C offender would cost the Department \$24,390.98 per year or \$243,909.80 for a ten (10) year incarceration sentence.

This legislation would have increased incarceration costs; however, the number of offenders expected to be convicted under these offenses are such that the expected impact to the Department would not be significant.

LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.

Potential Impact:

Under current legislation, Torture of a Dog or Cat 1st Offense is a Class A misdemeanor. This legislation proposes raising the penalty to a Class D felony. As a felon, the cost would be incurred by the state, relieving the county jail of the cost. These offenders would likely remain incarcerated at jail facilities as a state inmate, however. Under the proposed legislation, there are some current Class D offenders who would be subject to increased penalties as a Class C offense. These offenders would no longer qualify for housing at a jail facility, which would be a loss of revenue to the county.

The number of offenders convicted under these offenses would likely be low; therefore, the expected impact to the county jails would not be significant.

10 Class A misdemeanants: \$28,270 to \$114,640

100 Class A misdemeanants: \$282,700 to \$1,146,400
