STATE IMPACT : Class A, B & C felonies are based on an average daily prison rate of \$66.82. Most Class D felons are housed in one of 76 full service jails for up to 5 years. DOC's cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in a jail is \$31.41 per day (includes jail per diem, medical & central office costs), not including substance abuse treatment. Projections are based on the daily rate x 365 x number of years.

Potential Impact:						
The proposed legislation allows for day reporting programs to be operated by a county jail and for use as an alternative sentence by the Court. Felony offenders eligible for placement in a county jail would also be eligible for a day reporting program, creating an opportunity for cost savings for the Department of Corrections associated with housing inmates. The state would likely incur a program cost proportionate to the services provided to felony inmates, while still realizing a cost savings from the current inmate per diem.						
<u>LOCAL IMPACT</u> : Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.

Potential Impact:						
The impact on local facilities is unclear at this time. The operation of a day reporting center would affect jailers through program costs, program space, and staffing. Additionally, the possible reduction of state inmate beds would result in a loss of revenue for jails. Currently, there are 85 offenders in jail custody for violations of supervision that could be eligible for a day reporting program as an alternative sentence.
