BILL SPONSOR(S): Rep. C. Morgan AMENDMENT SPONSOR(S): SUBJECT: AN ACT relating to the creation of an animal abuse registry and making an appropriation therefor. SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Creates a new section of KRS Chapter 17 to establish the animal abuse offender registry; requires the Kentucky State Police to maintain a registry of offenders who commit an animal abuse offense; creates a new section of KRS Chapter 17 to establish the animal abuse offender registry fund; APPROPRIATION. Most Class D felons are housed in one of 76 full service jails for up to 5 years. DOC's cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in a jail is \$31.45 per day (includes jail per diem, medical & central office costs), not including substance abuse treatment. Projections are based on the daily rate x 365 x number of years. **Projected Impact:** NONE MODERATE (< \$1 million) SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million) This legislation establishes an animal abuse registry to be maintained by the Kentucky State Police. Animal abuse offense is established as convictions under KRS 525.125 Cruelty To Animals 1st Degree, 525.130 Cruelty To Animals-2nd Degree, 525.135 Torture Of A Dog Or Cat, 1st Offense, 2nd Or > Offense, Or Torture Dog/Cat W/Serial Physical Injury Or Death, 525.200 Assault On Service Animal, 1st Degree, or 525.205 Assault On Service Animal, 2nd Degree. Offenders will be required to register for five (5) years. Offenders shall be registered by the releasing agency or at the time of conviction by a Court. A registration fee of \$100 annually is imposed, but subject to waiver for indigency. The registry shall include a public website, as well as offender information provided to each county sheriff and local school district superintendent. There is a good faith exemption for Department employees for registration and dissemination of registry information. The bill also establishes an animal abuse offender registry. Data from AOC for FY2015-2017 shows twenty (20) convictions for Torture of Dog or Cat, forty-five (45) convictions for Cruelty to Animals, and sixteen (16) convictions of Assault on a Service Animal (includes inchoate offenses). Currently the Department has ten (10) offenders and thirty-four (34) offenders on supervision for these offenses. Though the Department of Corrections will register required individuals for the animal abuse offender registry who are released from custody or placed on supervision by the court, however, there is no direct impact to incarceration under this legislation. LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders. NONE MODERATE (< \$1 million) ☐ SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million) **Projected Impact:** Local detention facilities would also be required to register individuals upon release who are statutorily required to register with the animal abuse offender registry.

The legislation establishes a Class A misdemeanor for failure to register or providing false, misleading, or incomplete information.
