<b>SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION:</b> Create a new section of KRS 311.710 to 311.820 to prohibit an abortion on a pregnant woman that will resin the bodily dismemberment, crushing, or human vivisection of the unborn child when the probable post-fertilization age of the unborn child 11 weeks or greater, except in the case of a medical emergency; amend KRS 311.990 to provide that a person who violates the prohibition guilty of a Class D felony; EMERGENCY.	is

<b>STATE IMPACT</b> : Class A, B & C felonies are based on an average daily prison rate of \$70.12. Most Class D felons are housed one of 76 full service jails for up to 5 years. DOC's cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in a jail is \$31.45 per day (includes jail p diem, medical & central office costs), not including substance abuse treatment. Projections are based on the daily rate x 365 number of years.	er

The legislation creates a Class D felony offense for an intentional performance or attempt to perform or induce an abortion that we result in the bodily dismemberment, crushing, or human vivisection of the unborn child and if the probable post-fertilization age the unborn child is eleven (11) weeks or greater. There is an exception for pregnant women on whom an abortion is performed attempted to be performed.	of
Current AOC data reports there are no convictions for Convicted of Performing Abortion After Viability or related KRS 311 statute. The Department of Corrections does not currently have any offenders incarcerated or on supervision for criminal offenses relating to abortion.	
While there is no way to predict the number of new convictions this provision would generate, it is expected the impact to the Department would be minimal.	те
Senate Committee Substitute:	
The Senate Committee Substitute adds a definition of an unborn child as provided in KRS 311.781.	
There is no impact to the Department of Corrections based on the Senate Committee Substitute.

<b>LOCAL IMPACT</b> : Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.
