Projected Impact:

MODERATE (< \$1 million) SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million)

LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.

MODERATE (< \$1 million) SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million) **Projected Impact: NONE**

HB 514 amends KRS 367.46955 to add an additional prohibition for telephone solicitation using deceptive caller identification information. Telephone solicitation using misleading or incorrect caller identification information when placing an unsolicited telephone solicitation call would be prohibited.

KRS 367.46999 establishes the penalty for violations under KRS 367.46955. A telemarketer or salesperson who knowingly violates this provision or engages in a course of business which operates or would operate as fraud or deceit shall be guilty of a Class B misdemeanor for the first offense and a Class A misdemeanor for any subsequent offense.

Currently the Department does not have any offenders incarcerated or on supervision for these offenses. AOC records do not reflect any charges or convictions for KRS 367.46955 in FY2015-2017.

It is unknown how many misdemeanor convictions would occur under this legislation, however, it is expected that the impact to incarceration at the local level would be minimal.
