HB 71 creates a new misdemeanor which will impact the county jails through creating additional county prisoners, which utilizes a county jail bed for a non-revenue generating county offender. While the Class D offenses generated under this bill would not be expected to be significant, the legislation will impact county jails by increasing the state inmate population, which is a source of revenue, but will also increase inmates in county facilities that are currently at capacity.

Based on the probable number of offenders sentenced for this offense, however, the overall impact to the local jails is expected to be minimal.
