LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. While the expense varies by jail, this estimated impact will be based on \$31.34 per day, which equals the per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.

This legislation creates a crime of sexual activity with an animal when an individual engages in sexual activity with an animal, aids another person in engaging in sexual activity with an animal, permits sexual activity with an animal to be conducted on a premises under his or her control, participates as an observer or performs any service in the furtherance of an act of sexual activity with an animal for a commercial or recreational purpose, or photographs or films for purposes of sexual gratification a person engaged in sexual activity with an animal.

This legislation creates a misdemeanor offense of Sexual Activity with Animals as a Class A misdemeanor.

Additionally, an offender convicted of this offense may be ordered by the Court against owning or residing in a household where animals are kept, to participate in counseling, or reimburse the animal shelter or humane society for the care and maintenance of animals removed from custody due to the offense. This legislation is not applicable to veterinary medical or animal husbandry practices.

Although not specific to the behavior indicated in this legislation, AOC indicates there were 778 convictions for Cruelty to Animals (including inchoate offenses) in FY2015-2017. The Department does not have any offenders currently incarcerated for Cruelty to Animals and currently has twenty-three (23) offenders on supervision for this offense.

It is unknown how many, if any, of these offenses involve sexual assault on an animal, therefore it is not possible to estimate how many additional offenders this legislation would generate.

As a misdemeanor offense, this offense would be at the cost of the county. Any additional offenders at the local level have a direct impact on current jail overcrowding.

However, given the nature of the offense, it is estimated that the number of offenders convicted under this offense would be limited. Therefore, it is expected that the impact to local jail facilities would be minimal.
