BILL SPONSOR(S): Sen. S. West AMENDMENT SPONSOR(S): SUBJECT: AN ACT relating to the direct shipment of wine to consumers.

SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Create a new section of KRS Chapter 243 to establish a wine direct shipper license for wine manufacturers, producers, suppliers, importers, wholesalers, and retailers; establish packaging requirements for shipment, require all taxes due to be paid to the Department of Revenue and grant the Department of Revenue audit authority; permit licensees to ship to addresses located in dry and moist territories; amend KRS 243.030 to establish a \$100 initial licensing fee and a \$50 renewal fee; amend KRS 243.990 to make violation of Section 1 of the Act a Class B misdemeanor for the first offense and a Class A misdemeanor for each subsequent offense.

Shipment from individuals who do not have a valid wine direct shipper license is prohibited. A knowing violation is an unfair trade practice. Violation of section one (1) of the legislation is a Class B misdemeanor for a first offense and a Class A misdemeanor for a second offense, and subject to a fine of up to \$1000 for each offense.

According to AOC data, from FY2015-2017 there was one (1) conviction under KRS 243.990 of Violation of Required Alcohol License 1st offense and zero (0) convictions of Violation of Required Alcohol License 2nd offense. Currently the Department does not have any offenders on supervision for offenses incurred under KRS 243.990.

It is not known how many misdemeanor offenses are incurred under these violations. However, it is assumed that the number of violations incurred under this legislation would be minimal.
