The offense of intimidation of a sports official would be established as a Class A misdemeanor.

KRS 518.090.

Misdemeanor offenders are subject to the jurisdiction and cost of the county. Offenders subject to incarceration for this offense would serve their sentence in a county jail at an average daily cost to incarcerate of \$35.43.

KRS 518.090 Assault of Sports Official is a similar offense, with penalties from a Class A misdemeanor to Class D felony.

According to Department of Corrections records, there is one (1) inmate currently incarcerated on Class D KRS 518.090 Assault of Sports Official and one (1) individual under community supervision for a Class D felony offense under this statute.

AOC records indicate one (1) misdemeanor conviction in FY19, one (1) misdemeanor conviction in FY20, and zero (0) convictions in FY21 under KRS 518.090 for the offense of Assault of a Sports Official.

It is not known how many additional misdemeanor offenders would be generated under this legislation, however, given the specific focus of the offense, the number of convictions would likely be few in number.
