SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Create a new section of KRS Chapter 510 to create the crime of fraudulent assisted reproduction; define terms; establish penalty; amend KRS 311.597 to add fraudulent assisted reproduction to the list of violations that may cause a doctor to lose his or her medical license.

The proposed legislation creates a new criminal offense for Fraudulent Assisted Reproduction. The impact to incarceration from this legislation would be minimal.

The legislation establishes Class D Fraudulent Assisted Reproduction under KRS 510 when health care providers intentionally or knowingly use human reproductive material without consent.

This conduct is also added under KRS 311.597 as conduct violating medical licensure.

A search for similar offenses indicates the following:

- Zero (0) inmates are currently serving on offenses under KRS Chapter 212, 213, 311, or specified offenses under 218A.
- Eleven (11) offenders are on supervision for KRS 311.560 Practice Medicine without a License, KRS 213.991 Possession of Stolen Vital Statistics Certificate, KRS 213.991 Possess/Use False Records of Birth, KRS 218A.320 Criminal Possession of a Medical Record, KRS 218A.322 Theft of a Medical Record, and KRS 218A.324 Criminal Falsification of a Medical Record.

Convictions under the proposed offense would be limited. If incarcerated, offenders convicted under the legislation would be a Class D felon housed in a county jail as a state inmate.

Cost to Incarcerate

A Class D Felony sentence is 1 to 5 years. 10 Class D Felons cost KY \$129,318.61 to \$646,593.03 1 Class D Felon costs KY \$12,931.86 to \$64,659.30 100 Class D Felons cost KY \$1,293,186.06 to \$6,465,930.31

LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. The estimated impact will be based on the \$35.43 cost to incarcerate for the Department of Corrections, including \$31.34 per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders. This cost to incarcerate may not be the actual housing cost for the jail.*

Overall, the impact to local incarceration for the proposed offense, both pre- and post-adjudication, would be expected to be very minimal.	
As a Class D offender, offenders subject to this offense would serve their sentence in a county jail at a cost to the state of \$35.43 per day, with \$31.34 daily reimbursement to the local detention center.
