SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION: Amend KRS 510.010 to include alcohol in the definition of "physically helpless"; amend KRS 510.060 to create an additional element of rape in the third degree; amend KRS 510.090 to create an additional element of sodomy in the third degree.

STATE IMPACT: Class A, B, & C felonies are based on an average daily prison rate of \$97.60. Community Custody Class C and most Class D felons are housed in one of seventy-four (74) full service or regional jails for up to five (5) years. Department of Corrections' cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in a jail is \$35.43 per day, which includes \$31.34 per diem, medical costs, & central office administrative costs (substance abuse treatment not included).*

The legislation widens conduct which would be applied to sexual offenses under KRS Chapter 510. The estimated impact from the legislation is unknown, though it could have a considerable impact on incarceration.

The legislation would allow voluntary intoxication causing physical helplessness as an element of the offenses of Rape 1st Degree & Sodomy 1st Degree.

- The legislation adds alcohol to the definition of physically helpless under KRS 510.010, which currently only applies as a result of being under the influence of a controlled substance or legend drug.
- Physically helpless is an element in the offenses of Rape 1st Degree and Sodomy 1st Degree (Class B level of the felony offenses).
- Current statute language for Rape and Sodomy 2nd Degree (Class C felonies) encompasses victims who are mentally incapacitated, defined under KRS 510.010 as being rendered temporarily incapable of assessing or controlling their own conduct as a result of the influence of an intoxicating substance administered without his or her consent.

The legislation also adds voluntary intoxication causing substantial impairment of his or her conduct as an element of the offenses of Rape 3rd Degree & Sodomy 3rd Degree.

The legislation adds language to KRS 510.060 Rape 3rd Degree & KRS 510.090 Sodomy 3rd Degree (Class D felonies) prohibiting sexual intercourse with another person knowing his or her ability to appraise or control his or her own conduct is substantially impaired.

The following indicates those currently incarcerated or on supervision under the Department of Corrections for which the offense code indicates physically helpless. It should be noted that not all convictions may be coded in such a manner that allows this identification.

It is unknown how many additional convictions may be incurred based on these changes. The inclusion of someone as physically helpless or unable to assess their own conduct due to alcohol intoxication may result in additional conduct being prosecuted under the offense of Rape. The change to the legislation may increase reporting for occurrences of this nature. Additionally, if this conduct is currently prosecuted at a lower felony level, under the legislation, there would be a substantial increase in days incarcerated at the higher felony level.

LOCAL IMPACT: Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until disposition of the case. The estimated impact will be based on the \$35.43 cost to incarcerate for the Department of Corrections, including \$31.34 per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders.
