

**Kentucky Department of Insurance
Financial Impact Statement
HM Statement BR 160/HB 408**

- I. Mandating health insurance coverage of BR 160, is not expected to materially increase premiums, based upon our analysis of the proposed mandate and our experience with similar health insurance benefits. The proposed mandate requires that health benefit plans provide coverage for:
- a. Enteral infant and baby formulas prescribed by a physician as medically necessary or a proven effective disease-specific treatment regimen. Coverage may be subjected to a cap of \$3,000.
 - b. Renting or purchasing breastfeeding equipment and comprehensive lactation support and counselling by a trained health care professional during pregnancy and in the postpartum period. Coverage shall not be subject to any cost-sharing requirement.

Our analysis includes health benefit plans, for all fully insured policies in Kentucky, excluding Medicaid and state employees.

The proposed BR 160, as described above, is not expected to materially increase the total cost of health care in the Commonwealth, based upon our analysis of the proposed mandate and our experience with similar health insurance benefits. 
