

# CORRECTIONS IMPACT STATEMENT

SESSION: 24RS BILL #: HB 132 Introduced. BR #: 485

BILL SPONSOR(S): Rep. S. McPherson

AMENDMENT SPONSOR(S):

TITLE: AN ACT relating to the sale of alcohol to minors.

**SUMMARY OF LEGISLATION:** Amend KRS 244.085 to enhance penalties for any person who aids or assists any person under 21 years of age in purchasing or being delivered or served any alcoholic beverage; amend KRS 244.990 to enhance penalties for violations related to retail sales of alcoholic beverages to any person under 21 years of age; establish that the Act may be cited as the Jordan Bratcher and Chance Goostree Act.

## AMENDMENT:

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**STATE IMPACT:** Class A, B, & C felonies are based on an average daily prison rate of \$116.93. Community Custody Class C and most Class D felons are housed in one of seventy-four (74) full-service or regional jails for up to five (5) years. Department of Corrections cost to incarcerate a felony inmate in jail is \$44.97 per day, which includes \$35.34 per diem, medical costs, and central office administrative costs (substance abuse treatment not included).\*

**Projected Impact:**  NONE  MINIMAL to MODERATE (< \$1 million)  SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million)

The legislation would likely have a minimal impact to operational costs at the state level.

Class D felons are housed in a county jail and DOC pays counties a per diem for housing those inmates.

A Class D Felony sentence is 1 to 5 years – One (1) Class D Felon costs KY \$16,414.05 to \$82,070.25.

**LOCAL IMPACT:** Local governments are responsible for the cost of incarcerating individuals charged with Class A or B misdemeanors and felony defendants until the disposition of the case. The estimated impact will be based on the \$44.97 cost to incarcerate for the Department of Corrections, including \$35.34 per diem and medical that DOC pays jails to house felony offenders. This cost to incarcerate may not be the actual housing cost for the jail.\*

**Projected Impact:**  NONE  MINIMAL to MODERATE (< \$1 million)  SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million)

The legislation would likely have a minimal impact to operational costs.

The enhancement of the violation to a Class D felony when serious injury or death occurs would impact the county jail population. Misdemeanants are the fiscal responsibility of the county.

A Class D Felony sentence is 1 to 5 years – One (1) Class D Felon costs KY \$16,414.05 to \$82,070.25.

A Class B misdemeanor is up to 90 days in jail. One (1) Class B misdemeanor: up to \$4,047.30

A Class A misdemeanor is 90 days to 1 year in jail. One (1) Class A misdemeanor: \$4,047.30 to \$16,414.05

The requirement of those convicted serve at least 50% could impact the overall population in the county jails, as inmates would be required to serve for longer periods of time.

**PROJECTED IMPACT FROM AMENDMENTS:**  NONE  MINIMAL to MODERATE (< \$1 million)  SIGNIFICANT (> \$1 million)

*\*All projections are based on the daily rate x 365 days x number of years. The cost to incarcerate as calculated by the Department is shown here as rounded to the hundredths. Offenders may have multiple offenses or be incarcerated on other charges unless otherwise noted. Unless otherwise noted, numbers will include inchoate offenses at the underlying offense level.*
