



prosequi, a conviction for a nonfelony offense, or if the person successfully completed a pretrial diversion program. The section requires expungement requests to be accompanied by verifying documentation as required by administrative regulations promulgated by the Justice and Public Safety Cabinet.

**Section 4** amends KRS 64.060 to establish a \$5.00 reimbursement rate for each DNA sample collected and transmitted to the Department of Kentucky State Police, provided that the sample results in a usable DNA profile, is not a duplicate, and has not been deemed unacceptable due to a collection error.

**The expected fiscal impact of HB 286 is minimal.** Training all law enforcement personnel and jail personnel how to properly collect DNA samples would require a significant investment of time. However, training would be offered by Kentucky State Police, so it would not require additional expenditures on the part of local law enforcement and jails. Similarly, local jails, police, and sheriff's departments are reimbursed for each DNA sample collected and sent to the Kentucky State Police forensic laboratory, so the cost of the collection kits are not borne at the local level.

The Kentucky State Police was contacted for input on this local mandate, which will be updated upon their response.

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
