PURPOSE OF MEASURE: This measure establishes the EMS Professionals Foundation Program fund, from which eligible EMS professionals would receive an annual training incentive payment of \$4,800, reimbursement for mental health costs stemming from their employment, as well as associated employer contributions to retirement plans not to exceed that of the County Employees Retirement System hazardous duty plan.

HB 416 defines an EMS professional as an employee licensed as an emergency medical technician (EMT), advanced emergency medical technician (AEMT), paramedic, or an advanced practice paramedic of an ambulance service. It is unclear whether an emergency medical responder (EMR) would qualify for eligibility.

<u>FISCAL EXPLANATION</u>: The precise cost of HB 416 is subject to 1) the annual number of eligible recipients, as determined by the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services, and subject to no other incentive payment being provided by the KLEFPF or FFPF, 2) the retirement plan each recipient participates in, and 3) the number of participants who seek reimbursement for mental health costs stemming from qualified, job-related incidents.

Based on these caveats, below is a cost analysis of the maximum potential impact based on available data.

The above cost analysis does not factor in any participant's potential reimbursement for mental health services and is indeterminable.

Please note that because the EMS Professionals Foundation Program fund will share revenues with the KLEFPF and FFPF, current revenues are unable to support all three funds at the current insurance premium surcharge rate (1.8%). Therefore, HB 416 would require an increase in the insurance premium surcharge rate.
