<u>PURPOSE OF MEASURE</u>: The measure exempts children aged 16 and older who have earned a High School Equivalency Diploma from compulsory public-school attendance requirements.

FISCAL EXPLANATION: Kentucky's K-12 funding formula, Support Education Excellence in Kentucky (SEEK), is per-pupil based. There is limited specific and centralized data reporting how many Kentucky students receive high school equivalency diplomas and subsequently exit the public school system; however, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System reported that there were approximately 2,500 General Educational Developments (GEDs) awarded statewide in fiscal year 2023. Given these GED awards include adult learners outside the scope of the measure's exemption and represent less than 0.5% of the state's student enrollment, associated reductions in district enrollment used for state funding calculations are indeterminable yet very minimal.
