**PURPOSE OF MEASURE:** This legislation exempts residential swimming pools rented to guests by the property owner from following the regulations required of public swimming pools.

**FISCAL EXPLANATION:** Because this legislation exempts the use of residential swimming pools rented to guests by the property owner from the regulations required of public swimming pools, there is no fiscal impact. However, the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS) states that residential swimming pools, as with public swimming pools, can potentially become the source of a waterborne outbreak. The cost provided was \$85,000 per incident of a waterborne outbreak. According to CHFS, there have been 16 investigations related to private pools in the last five years. If we assume that each investigation is considered an outbreak, that would be approximately three outbreaks per year, therefore the fiscal impact of this legislation would be zero because the Department for Public Health has funds appropriated in its base budget to accommodate any waterborne outbreak.
