## Part II: Bill Provisions and the Estimated Fiscal Impact Relating to Local Government

HB 66 HCS 1 requires that public agencies publish information relating to board or commission members' name, term, and official method of contact.

HB 66 HCS 1 allows for the use of video teleconference meetings to conduct routine public business. A board or commission would be required to have a quorum of members to convene for in-person meeting, and other members to participate virtually through video teleconference when the public agency conducts business that establishes or modifies laws, regulations, taxes, taking action on a nonroutine expenditure, or a grant or award greater than \$100,000.

HB 66 HCS 1 would exempt in-person requirements during a declared state of emergency and require a public agency to develop policies and procedures governing attendance and participation policies for video teleconference meetings.

**HB 66 HCS 1 is likely to have little to no cost to local governments.** Most public agencies currently have websites to publish the information on its appointed or elected

members to as required by HB 66 HCS 1. Those public agencies that do not have a website will be able to publish the required information on the website of a related public agency. Any costs associated with that would likely to be very minimal.

HB 66 HCS 1 allows a public agency the option to use video teleconference technology for public agency meetings, but does not require it. A public agency may choose to incur the costs associated with video teleconference implementation, but those costs are not mandated under HB 66 HCS 1.
